



here, are not Scotch at all, but are Irish. Shipments are made from Dublin and Belfast in small coasting schooners to the Clyde, and there the potatoes are taken aboard the vessels of the Anchor and State lines, and brought to this country as Scotch potatoes. They are consigned by weight and not by measure, and over 7,000 tons of them have been imported since the 1st of December.-E. J. Edwards in Philadelphia Press.

How London Grows.

Some idea of the immense size of London may be gathered from the fact that there were registered during one week 2.780 births and 2.212 deaths. The births were 123 below and the deaths 168 above the average for the last ten years. Here we have people enough born into the world in one week to constitute a "city" in the ambitious phraseology of western English, and enough deaths in a time of profound peace to render memorable a battlefield. But the most striking fact in this table is that not one of all the 2,212 died of smallpox.-London Globe.

A Strange Vault.

A strange discovery was made at San Francisco the other day by the workmen engaged in tearing down the old landmark at the northwest corner of Montgomery and Commercial streets. While removing the marble slabs which covered the floor, a stairway was discovered which led down to a vault under the building, the existence of which was unknown. The vault extends the entire length and breadth of the superstructure. It is built of bricks placed lengthways, which were separated by pieces of slate, the whole being firmly cemented into a solid mass. The roof was arched and constructed in the same manner. At one end of the vault was an apartment, built in an unusually solid manner, to which an entrance was effected by a door of iron a quarter of an inch thick and riveted with bolts.

A pioneer furnished the information that the building, or at least the first story, was erected in 1851. for the occupation of August Belmont & Co.s' banking house. The conflagration of 1849 had swept every structure in the vicinity out of existence, and when the building was erected it was determined to make





Biblical Discoveries of Great Interest.

A lecture of the greatest interest, not only to orientalists, but likewise to all interested in Biblical research, has just been delivered at the Verein Niederwald of Vienna by that most distinguished orientialist and linguistic scholar, the Rev. William Hechler, caplain to the British embassy.

Ever since his student days he has been seeking for the key to harmonize the dates of the kings of Judah and Israel given in the Bible, and the dates of the kings of Babylon, Assyria, Egypt and Persia. As he observed in the course of

his lecture: "Whoever has carefully studied the histories of the ancient empires must be struck with the wonderfully truthlike appearance of the chron ological and syncronistic data. No historian has ever ventured to give such a large number of dates as the Bible, which are made to synchronize with the dates of kings of other nations, thereby enabling accurate control. Thus the kings of Judah are made to synchronize with the kings of Israel, and many of

Babylon, Assyria, Egypt and Persia." At the last orientalists' congress in Vienna the learned gentleman presented the first part of his researches, extending over twenty years. No doubt his charts. when published, will startle many a professor of theology all over the worldat least such as have taught their pupils that it was impossible to put in order and harmonize these confused dates.

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
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
