

## On Guard.

Congressman Burrows appeared before the committee on rivers and harbors this morning and made arguments in favor of liberal appropriations for St. Joseph and Benton Harbor and the St. Joseph River. He covered the entire range of reasoning in those matters. Mr. Burrows discovered this morning that during his absence at Brooklyn Saturday the democrats called up and passed the bill which Mr. Burrows had scorched last week, a bill for the protection of Moonshine whiskey makers and for the nullification of federal election laws. Mr. Burrows went to the senate committee on judiciary this afternoon and stated the case, and now feels confident that the infamous measure will never become a law.—Detroit Tribune Report.



Exterminatizz the Food Fish. The cupidity of the fisherman on the Atlantic coast is rapidly destroying nearly every kind of sea food upon which the people have been accustomed to rely. The complaints of the men who control the fish markets are long and loud that the supply of fish is much less for this season than it was the last. The lobster factories on the Maine coast are all closed, and one has to go down as far east as Prince Edward island to find a lobster with a shell on his back at a fair price. The herring factories have begun to exhaust the immense schools of herring that gather around Grand Manan and work their way into the Bay of Fundy.

The mackerel have been so scarce during the season, from the wholesale de-struction of schools, that a single mackcrel is today more expensive than a pound of beef. The bluefish are still plenty, but there are signs that even this species of fish is beginning to be preyed upon by the methods employed by the fishermen in catching them. The fisher men say that they are obliged to use these destructive methods in order to protect themselves from the encroachments of those who refuse to keep to the old methods, and so the wholesale destruction goes on without restraint.

The time has come when if the sea is to yield to us much longer the delicious food which makes life on the Atlantic coast a delight to the people of the west, as well as to the natives, different methods of catching the fish, and a protection for them in the close season. must be established by law, for which the proper enforcement must be arranged. The necessity is argent. There is not a single species of fish used for the table which is not now in great danger of extinction. The salmon and the shad have been protected, but protection is equally demanded for the cod, the herring, the lobster and the mackerel.-Boston Herald.

-Fight Between Shark and Whale. On the trip to Fiji and back of the steamer Ovalau, just concluded, Captain A. W. Cameron and his officers saw a strange encounter. The steamer was going along at about ten knots in midocean, when a commotion was observed in the water ahead and the body of a huge marine animal or fish, with what appeared to be great dippers, was to be seen rising and falling. Captain Cameron steered direct for the stranger. On approaching close the commotion was found to be caused by a whale, over thirty feet long, fighting with a thrasher shark.

The latter apparently was having the best of the combat, as the whale kept on the surface of the water comparatively quiet while the shark ever and anon threw itself out of the water and brought its tail down with a terrible blow upon the whale. The Ovalau was so close to the animals, which were too much occupied to heed the vessel, that either could have been touched with a pole. The captain could not stop his ship long enough to observe the result of the conflict.-New Zealand Herald.



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

# Coal Output for 1891.

The coal consumption is generally con sidered to be the best measure of the industrial activity of a country. This rule would hold good for this country during the past year, when general industry was active and prosperous, though a few branches suffered a reaction. We find that the output of anthracite, of which we have full and accurate returns, amounted in 1891 to 42,839,779 tons of 2.240 pounds, while the production of bituminous coal, which is in part estimated, amounted to 98,000,000 tons. Prices of coal were, in general, lower than in 1890, though the anthracite trade being "regulated" maintained, during a portion of the year, rather higher prices than in the previous year.-Engineering and Mining Journal.

## Time to Deposit.




