AN IMPORTANT PURCHASE.—Judge Sumnerfield, of Chicago, was in this place last week and purchased the Drago farm, at the foot of Moccasin bluff, comprising 100 acres, for \$2,500. It is announced as his intention to erect an immense sanitarium thereon and take advantage of two powerful mineral springs not far from the buildings, and make a health resort of the farm. He has had samples of the water from the two springs analyzed, and being satisfied with the valuable medicinal qualities of the water and the romantic surroundings of the place decided upon the purchase.
