



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

THE FUTURE SUNDAY

SIGNIFICANCE OF THE VICTORY FOR THE DAY AT THE FAIR.

Rev. Thomas Dixon, Jr., Continues His New Series of Sermons on "The Prophccies of the World's Fair"-Man Needs Even More Hours For Rest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.-Rev. Thomas Dixon, jr., continued in Association hall this morning the new series of sermons on "The Prophecies of the World's Fair." The subject of the discourse today he called "The Future of the American Sabbath, as indicated by tho Sunday Opening Fiasco." He declared that the action of the fair anthorities on this question was the one fly in the ointment of the great exposition. Their thimble rigging policy he declared was a disgrace which came near ruining the fair at a critical period. The working people had repudiated the Sunday opening when accomplished, and the public refused to have it. He declared that this conflict which focused the national sentiment upon the problem for the first time had demonstrated some things pretty clearly-among them certainly that the great truth of the Christian Sabbath-one day's rest in sevenhas been re-emphasized as a primal ordinance of humanity, to whose sanctity ecclesiasticism can add nothing and from whose glory infidelity can subtract nothing.

The text chosen was from Mark ii, 27, "The Sabbath was made for man."

Jesus Christ was not orthodox on the Sabbath question. The heresy hunters were continuously after him for his failure to comply with the form of cermonial and institutional religion. With special emphasis did the pharisces accuse him of breaking the Sabbath. And they had good grounds for their charge from the pharisaic point of view. Upon this question as upon others he was a reformer. He was the bearer of a new light. He did not destroy. He fulfilled and expounded. He found a Sabbath buried bencath dead ceremonialism. He reaffirmed its original divine purpose. He broke the letter. He kept the spirit. He lifted the day from the degradation of pharisaic form and made it radiant with the beauty and freedom of love. As vet. in America. while as a notion we have proved our reverence and loyalty to the day, we have not given the unbeliever the true basis of our faith. We have haggled over the legalism of a Mosaic statute, while we professed the fuller revelation of the Christ. The chief source of conflict upon this question is found in this confusion.

THE OUESTION AT CHICAGO. Grave were the fears of the faithful what would be the outcome of a na-

tional struggle on this question at Chicago At this World's fair, for the first time since the republic was founded, the whole nation came together in one place with one purpose. In the truest sense of the word this fair was representative. Nearly 4.000,000 of people, representing every state and district of the continent, came to one spot, filled with the consciousness of a common national pride in a common national life. The means and the extremes met. The blood of every nation of earth mingles in our veins or yet floats unobserved upon the surface of our life. We are a composite people, with the elements of composition yet unassimilated

have said, Moses or no Moses, commandment or no commandment, Bible or no Bible, right or wrong, orthodox or heterodox, whatever dogs and cats may be able to do, as for man, the Sabbath with its rest is to him an absolute necessity of nature! Such a necessity indeed that, if God did not establish a Sabbath, he surely committed the crime of creating a being who can not live without one. And this is but a re-affirmation of the unvarying record of history. France went mad with rage once against ecclesiasticism. They mistook the Sabbath for an invention of priesteraft to cheat them out of a day. They abolished it by law, only to wake in a short time from their delusion to find that God had founded the Sabbath in love for man and had written it in the red blood of nature's eter nal decree. They found the law of the Sabbath written on their vired hands and feet, in quivering muscle and throbbing nerves.

What any nation of the old world has found a necessity for rest to the human body is a double necessity to the people of America. While the old world travels one mile we rush over two. We are a nation of maniacs in rush and drive. The pressure of life with us is becoming more and more an insanity. Of all the people God has created we should cherish the Sabbath. It is the one oasis in the desert of our feverish host. It is our one remaining bulwark against the greed of the century. Our lust for gold is taking the heart out of the nation. The Sabbath is the one pause in the mad rush. It is the one hour left when we may return to reason for the moment-gain the conscionsness of our humanity. Every effort we have made in our national life to drive through this day with the rush and roar of the week has proved or is proving a failure. Men who are forced to work on Sundays never give the best service. They break down early. Their overwrought nerves and muscles are the cause of many fatal accidents in which the nation pays life for taking life. NOT THE WORKINGMAN'S WISH.

Every attempt to break down the rest of the Sabbath in the name of the American workingman is a subterfuge and a lie. The workingman does not desire to work seven days in the week. The hue and cry set up in his name is

the thinly guised hypocrisy of greed crying for the last possible tribute of his muscle and his heart's blood. The men who seek to break down the Sabbath as a day of complete rest are the enemies of labor; their twaddle on the subject is but the echo of some capitalistic glutton behind the scene who wishes to work them to the last drop of blood in their veins. No class of workingmen desire to work on Sunday. A fool editor of a weekly sheet in New York tried to get up a sensation to sell his paper some time ago by advocating the opening of the theaters on Sunday. Let us confess that with the reputation of the west for recklessness on the Sabbath we felt sad over the possible victory of the lawless element in this conflict, coming as it did and when it did. The verdict would necessarily be national in its bearing. The way this question was handled by the directorate of the fair forms the one serious blot upon its history. It is the one fly in the ointment of the greatest exposition the civilized world ever saw. Let us try to remove this in the beginning of our study.

The fact is, we have cause for congratulation after all, for in the end God has taught the nation with a new emphasis a great and solemn lesson. The directors were, after all, fallible men. and in trying to increase their revenue at the expense of the nation's conscience by opening on Sunday they collided with the nation's honor, and in the hour of a possible peril brought honor and decency to the rescue of a poorly enlightened conscience. They went before the nation assembled at Washington and asked for an appropriation. The Sunday question was sprung and brought to a finish in congress. The Sunday observers won an overwhelming victory, voicing the unques tioned sentiment of a vast majority of all the people. They accepted the appropriation and promised to close the fair on Sunday.

Then they lied and for the sake of money opened it.

They outraged the sense of honor and decency of the nation.

The people would not have it-people who knew little or cared little about the question of opening or not opening on Sunday did care as to whether we should exhibit ourselves as a nation of liars and tricksters. The success of the exposition was seriously threatened.

And before the gathering storm of a nation's contempt the managers retreated and closed their gates.

Then came the enemy and invoked the magic jugglery of the law and the personal equation of the judiciary. Through the legal technicalities of a local law the gates were again forced open and the managers thus relieved of the stain of voluntary dishonor. But the people did not go into the opened gates. Sunday opening continued to be to the last week a conspicuous fizzle.

The hue and cry raised by a certain class in behalf of the workingmen proved by actual demonstration to be a fake pure and simple. The workingmen did not want the fair opened on Sunday, and they did not go when it was opened. The thimble rigging methods of the management on this question not only failed to deceive, but failed to give any advantage in the end to the performers. The management have been tanght a valuable lessonthat there is such a thing as being too smart. 

Coloring Food Products


Sausages-both meat and skin-are dyed with aniline colors for the purpose of hiding the color of unhealthy or stale meat which may have been used. Jams, especially plum jams, are generally dyed with aniline colors, and sugar confectionery is hardly ever without such artificial dye. Ale is darkened with burned sugar, as also are brandies and whiskies. It must be admitted that in by fai


the majority of these cases the color used is entirely harmless and has no influence on the health of the consumer. Yet there are a number of aniline colors which are positively poisonous even when pure. Such colors are picric acid and its salts, martius yellow, safranine, methvien blue, dinitrocresol and aurantia.


Others, unobjectionable in themselves, become poisonous owing to their mode of manufacture, which leaves in the products poisonous impurities, such as arsenic (rarely), salts of copper, tin or zinc. The manufacturer of sausages or jams has not the least idea whether the color he uses may not belong to one or other of the above, to which doubtless many others could be added, and even if the quality of color consumed by one individual may be exceedingly small it is palpably evident that no such manufacturer should have the right to use such colors.-Drugs.
