**Church Dedication.**  
The Presbyterians of Buchanan dedicated their new church last Sunday and it was crowded to its utmost capacity by those desirous of taking part in the dedicatory service. The building cost \$4,800, is situated on Front street, near the center of the village and is the neatest church edifice in the county in its internal arrangements.

The service opened with an organ voluntary, then an anthem was sung by Mr. and Mrs. Del. Boardman Joseph P. Beistle and Miss Ida Mowbray. The opening prayer was made by Rev. I. Wilson, of the M. E. Church; Scripture reading by Rev. B. M. Allen, of the Christian; Rev. B. B. Sherwood, D. D., who was his pastor from 1859 to 1862, gave some interesting reminiscences of the early days of the church. Rev. W. W. Wells, for many years pastor of the church, delivered the dedicatory prayer, and Rev. A. F. Brunske, D. D., president of Alma college, delivered a grand discourse from 2d Cor. IX 15. Rev. H. H. Flory of the U. B. church lauded the greetings of the other churches in a neat, unique address; then Rev. A. F. Brunske stated that there was a debt of \$2,500 on the building, about half of which was provided for on the condition that the remainder be raised that afternoon. \$340 was subscribed in a short time, when after singing the congregation was dismissed with the Benediction.

The service in the evening had an equally large attendance. Rev. H. P. Welton, D. D., of Detroit, delivering the discourse. The new building is an honor to Buchanan, to the society who have erected it and especially to the pastor, Rev. O. J. Roberts, who has been the zealous and untiring instrument in bringing it about.

**The Horticulturists.**  
The Michigan State Horticultural society has been in session in Benton Harbor since Tuesday evening. The meeting has been a very interesting and profitable one, and many prominent fruit growers from different localities have been in attendance. Many topics of vital interest have been discussed among which we note "Present Conditions of Horticultural Interests in Berrien county" which brought out some very interesting facts and statistics. W. A. Brown of Stevensville stated that about 10,000 acres in this county was set to strawberries, raspberries and blackberries. Boland McGill, of Benton Harbor, stated that at least 500,000 peach trees had been set last year in the territory tributary to Benton Harbor, and the outlook for a crop next year was encouraging. He also said that this market paid out last year for fruit \$1,250,000 which was circulated within an area within sound of our home whistles, and undoubtedly the entire amount paid at this port exceeded \$2,000,000.—Benton Harbor Banner.
