



outward. Two adjusting chains limit the outward swing when the cart is used as a spreader. Steel wings are attached to either side of the cart at the tailboard for the purpose of spreading the stone to the entire width of the track of wheels. The stone as it escapes from the cart is leveled by means of a steel scraper attached to the

bottom of the tailboard. This scraper is pivoted at the center and is adjustable at either end by means of a horizontal lever on back of tailboard. This feature is of great value, as in the construction of stone streets it is necessary in many cases to spread thicker In the middle of the road than at the sides. If the scraper was stationary, this could not be done, but as it is adjustable it can be spread thicker on one side than on the other. This adjustable scraper will also be found very useful when it is desired to spread but half the width of the cart. Thus, if the road to be constructed is 12 feet in width, the smaller size cart will spread to a width

of five feet, and it will readily be seen that after the cart has spread two widths there will be two feet of roadway yet to spread, or three feet less than the width of the cart. By adjusting the scraper and driving one wheel on the stone already spread about three feet from the edge the remaining two feet can be easily spread.—Good Roads.


WORKING OUT TAXES.

So Long as This System Prevails There Is No Hope For Better Roads. This is the season in which the farmer discovers no roads in his section fit to travel on, and realizes also that the supervisors chosen the year before are just as bad as the roads, says the Philadelphia Times. Country highways are never worse than in the spring. Between frost and moisture the mixture on the roadbed is either mud or mortar, and this must dry away as the snn finds time to do the work of the supervisors. as there usually is no drainage. One of the first effects is to quarantine the country against the town, as few farmers will risk breaking that sort of blockade. It means ruin for wagons, perhaps the loss of the team and in some instances death or injury to the farmer.

And yet farm holders, tenants and landholders are content that things shall continue in this strain. They insist on the vicious rule of working out

taxes. They persist in shoveling and scraping earth and stuff from the sides of the road into the middle of the roadbed when the weather is clear, only to see it washed back again by storm and flood, and they stand opposed to any system of public road improvement to be paid for out of their own pockets, in face of the fact that it is just that sort of improvement that provides the best

kind of insurance to stock and property. Corduroy roads were necessary in the pioneer period. No other sort would do. But these are not the days of the wilderness and first settlements. The lumbering Conestoga turnpike wagons ceased to rumble half a century ago. The lighter substitutes, however, run on nearly the same old roads. Reform in roadbuilding must be, from the nature of the subject, gradual, but there must be beginnings. When the farmers realbegin.

SETTING ONION PLANTS.

Conveniences by Which This Tedious Work Is Rendered Easy.

Now that the "new onion culture" is so generally employed the planting of onion seedlings is an important subject for consideration. As most readers know, under the new system the onion seed is sown under glass and the seedlings transplanted to the open ground as soon as the season permits. Where many plants have to be set it is a long



DIBBER FOR SETTING ONION PLANTS. job, and wo should make it as easy as possible by preparing the soil in such a way as to enable the operator to plant without dibber.

The index finger answers every purpose when the land is fresh and "mellow as an ash heap." Sometimes a rain comes and packs the soil after it was already marked out and in best shape for planting. Then a dibber will have to be used. American Gardening illustrates a dibber made from a pieco of apple tree limb or other tough hardwood. Four or five inches is long enough for a dibber for setting onion plants. If we wish to make improvements on it, we can tack a piece of bright tin to the point and also furnish it with a guage, consisting of a piece of stiff wire, with a perpendicular bend at the free end, and the other inserted through a hole just above the tin at the point. The wire will then make a mark to indicate the place for the next plant. It can be adjusted to mark the distance desired-from two to three inches.

During the season of plant setting a light barrow is a convenient help in carting the plants from the greenhouse or frames to the garden or field. In many cases we have much soil on the roots of plants. On an ordinary wheelbarrow the plants are subjected to many jars and often hard knocks, which are liable to loosen the soil and perhaps

give a chance for best cultivation. Shallow cultivation has given better results than deep, the average yield for fivo. years being 5.9 bushels greater for the shallow cultivation than for the deep. Root pruning, has always reduced the yield. Very frequent cultivation has never shown sufficiently better results to justify its practice. Better crops can be produced without other cultivation than merely scraping the surface to destroy weeds than by deep cultivation. The largest average yield of corn has been obtained by the liberal annual application of barnyard manure, while much larger yields have been secured by rotation than by continuous cropping, either without any manure or by the use of commercial fertilizers. Barnyard manure has given poorest results

in very dry years. Crossing varieties has usually increased the yield. Removing tassels in 1894 increased the yield 13 per cent, while in two former years there was no advantage found in detasseling. At other stations the results have most frequently been detrimental. The good results occurred when there was little -rainfall during the period of removing the tassels.

Peppermint Growing. In Michigan the coming season acre-

age will be much as that of a year ago, although damago to the roots is feared, owing to ravages of the cutworms. To avoid loss of this kind many of the best growers reset plants after the second season. The low prices will induce large growers to plant sparingly, many of them regarding the business rather unprofitable at the best, but in other instances new ground is being thus appropriated, which will do much to make up any possible deficiency. This holds true of Indiana, where the business is young, but the extent of the acreage, while probably larger, will be uncertain until the present critical period of thawing and freezing is over. In view of present low prices for oth-

er products of the soil, mint growing is generally considered fairly profitable in the west. Probably 90 per cent of the oil consumed in the United States is home production. York state oil commands the best price, partly because of its excellent reputation. A fact not generally known, which hurts the price in certain parts of Michigan, is the les sened intrinsic merit of the oil because a large proportion of the active principle "menthol" has been extracted .--American Agriculurist.






