To Re-organize the Buchanan Power & Electric Company.

Negotiations have been progressing
for some time looking toward the ac-
quisition of considerable more work-
ing capital for the Buchanan Power &
Electric Company, and it is stated that
parties with abundant means have sig-
nified a willingness to invest capital in
the concern, but before doing so in-
stead that the affairs of the company be
settled in order to find out just how
the company stood. In order to do this
in a legal manner and avoid any possi-
bility of future litigation, the Power
& Electric Company, on Saturday af-
ternoon, made an assignment of all
their interests to Mr. Joseph L. Rich-
ards of the Zinc Collar Pad Company.
As soon as the claims are all filed and
matters are satisfactorily fixed up, the
parties referred to, it is expected, will
advance sufficient funds to clear up all
indebtedness, taking in exchange a one-
half interest in the concern, Messrs.
Holmes & English retaining the other
one half interest.

The Hatch Cutlery Company In a Receiver's Hands.

Last September the Hatch Cutlery
Company gave the Michigan Trust Co.,
of Grand Rapids, a trust mortgage to
secure payment of 150 bonds of \$500
each, at seven per cent interest payable
semi-annually. The first installment
of interest became due March 10th,
1895, but for some reason the Hatch
Cutlery Company failed to make provision
for its payment. On Friday last the Mich-
igan Trust Company commenced fore-
closure proceedings, and petition was
made for the appointment of a receiver.
Mr. Lewis H. Withey, president of the
Trust Company, was made receiver,
and came down and took possession of
the plant on Saturday afternoon.

The factory was shut down Monday
and Tuesday for the purpose of taking
an inventory, but commenced running
again Wednesday morning. Mr. F. J.
Miller, Secretary of the Cutlery Com-
pany has been placed in charge by Mr.
Withey and states that the company
expects to continue and that all claims
will be paid in full. We trust for the
sake of our merchants that such will
be the outcome.

Mr. Miller stated this morning that
the payroll was being made up and
preparations made for paying the
help in full up to the time of the re-
ceivership. Inquiry has developed the
facts that the appointment of a receiver
was necessitated by the inability of
all the various interests in the com-
pany, to arrange and agree on a reor-
ganization plan, which contemplated
making some sweeping reductions in
the expense of operating the plant, and
looking toward placing the concern on
a solid financial basis. At any event
there is no doubt but that the Hatch
factory will be operated either by a re-
organized Hatch Cutlery Company or
by the Michigan Trust Company in the
interest of the holders of the bonds.

The South Bend Tribune is evident-
ly getting sarcastic, as the following
extract will show:

The latest rumor regarding this
much talked of line from Napanee to
Boston Harbor, is that it will come in
on the big hills south-east of the city
and then elevate over the town to the
next high range west of Bertrand. A
station will be built around the stand-
pipe about seventy feet from the
ground, and another in the top of a big
white oak tree at Pine Hook. By go-
ing over the city, the railroad company
will have no trouble with the council
about planting at street crossings, or
the right of way across other roads.
Then what a charming view of the
surrounding country could be obtained
from such an exalted plane. It would
certainly be a fine coup d'oeil for
summer travel, and there would be no
snow blockades to contend with in
winter. It is not known positively
when work will begin on the elevated
line.
