



Big Demand for Paper Money. Washington, Nov. 10 .--- The treasury yesterday lost \$27,000 in gold coin and \$21,000 in bars which leaves the true amount of reserve \$121,526,364. The resources of the treasury are being severely taxed to meet the demand for paper notes of all denominations in exchange for gold.

WHY WHEAT IS UP.

Because of Reduced Supply and Increased southern agent for Phelps, Dodge & Demand. In 1891 the wheat harvests of Europe Forsythe was said to be a cousin of President Cleveland, who has many

were extraordinarily bad, and as our crop was the largest we ever harvested we had an enormous export. But since then our exports have been steadily diminishing, from 225,000,000 bushels in 1891-2 to 126,000,000 bushels in 1895-6. During this period of decreased demand for our wheat the Argentine Republic came to the front as an exporter, and the price of wheat naturally enough tended downward. Beerbohm, one of the highest authorities upon the wheat market, computes that the world's wheat crop averaged 262,000,000 quarters, of eight bushels, for the four years 1883-6, 279,000,000 for the four years 1887-90, and 304,000,000 quarters for the four

years, 1891-4. The estimated increase in the demand for wheat for food is 2,000 -000 quarters a year, and in eight years the supply increased not 16,000,000 quarters, but 42,600,000 quarters. That the price should fall was inevitable. But the world's available supply of

wheat on July 1, according to Bradstreet's, was 25,000,000 bushels less than it was one year before, and the world's crop for this year is estimated by the Liverpool Corn Trade News at 90,000,-000 bushels less than last year. This makes the supply 115,000,000 bushes less than the supply a year ago. The es-

timate of this year's crop is 95,000,000 bushels less than the average crop for the four years 1891-4. The normal increase of demand due to increase of population since the middle or average point in that four-year period would be about 65,000,000 bushels. The conditions are very favorable, therefore, for an advance in price. This advance, due to the buying of American grain for Europe, began very slowly. As the purchases increased, the price rose faster. When American wheat was shipped to

Australia and India, both of which are accustomed to export wheat, the price jumped suddenly. Vessel room for outgoing wheat was well engaged early in the season, and only when it became

evident that Europe had got to buy all we could sell and had already engaged the ships to carry it to her, did the price here rise rapidly. The following are the lowest and highest quotations on the New York

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
