ference, held at York, Pa., in 1889. The vote for the revised Confession of Faith was 51,070 and 3,310 against. The vote for the section, permitting members to belong to secret societies, was 46,994 in favor and 7,298 against. Pursuant to this action, the General Conference adopted these sections by a vote of 110 in favor and 20 against. Bishop Wright, Presiding Elder H. T. Barnaby of the West Dtstrict of Michigan and ten others seceded from the General Conference and met at another place in York, and

proclaimed . themselves the true General Conference of the United Brethren in Christ, and proceded to take steps to secure possession of all church properties of the denomination. The seceding body and their followers became known as the Radicals, while those who remained in the General Conference were termed Liberals.

In accord with their program, the Radicals proceeded with their attempt to secure the various church propertics, etc. Much litigation resulted in which every Supreme Court in every state, with the single exception of Michigan, have decided in favor of the Liberals. The Supreme Court of

Michigan rendered a decision in favor the Radicals. with Justice Grant dissenting and Justice Montgomery not sitting. The Radicals attempted tempted to secure possession of the Olive Branch church, in 1892, when the Liberal wing of the hoard of part,


