After reconnoitering and finding that there were over 300 pillager Indians ready to resist the government, Lieut. Humphrey reported the seriousness of the situation, and Gen. Bacon, with 80 additional men, was ordered to Walker. They left St. Paul on Tuesday morning and arrived here in a snowstorm Tuesday evening Tuesday night Gen. Bacon and Marshal O'Connor held a conference lasting until far after midnight and plans were laid for the day. These were that the troops should go to the island with the marshal, who should demand the surrender of Bush Ear, the chief, and if there was resistance the troops should do the rest. At daylight the steamers Flora and Chief were boarded by a full company of regulars in command of Gen. Bacon and Col. The store peace. pillagers let up on their firing somewhat, too, and thus the battle ran on until nearly three o'clock, when firing ceased altogether. The regulars withdrew to the neighborhood of the dock and threw up breastworks, and one of the steamers, the Flora, was sent back to this point with the marshal of Walker and George Helmuth, who was wounded in the hip in the engagement. Helmuth says the Indians acted in a most cowardly manner, firing on the troops without giving them the slightest warning.
