ORDER IS RESTORED.

This Thrilling Drama About a Diver and a Shark... No Further Disturbances Occur in the French Capital.

SITUATION IS EARNESTLY DISCUSSED.

President Faure Has Been Unable as Yet to Decide Between Ribot and De Freycinet as the Premier.

Chicago, Oct. 27, 6 a. m.—A bulletin from Paris declares that the story from London that President Faure had been assassinated is absolutely false.

Paris, Oct. 27.—Although there is evidence of suppressed excitement on all sides here, there was no disturbance of public order.

President Faure received in audience Senator Loubet, president of the senate, and M. Deschanel, president of the chamber of deputies.

It is the intention of M. Faure to form a cabinet as rapidly as possible, and the names of MM. Ribot and De Freycinet are the most prominently mentioned in connection with the premiership.

During the afternoon M. Faure consulted with the vice president of the chamber of deputies, who advised the formation of a concentration cabinet, to include among its members MM. Ribot and Dupuy as the principal ministers.

The cabinet of the chamber of deputies Wednesday the deputies of all shades of opinion expressed the conviction that M. Delcasse should remain at the head of the foreign office, in the direct assurance of the continuity of the French negotiatory.

Ready to Yield Fashoda. Paris, Oct. 27.—The Sforz hears in diplomatic circles that France is prepared to evacuate Fashoda, with the reservation that she shall receive some compensation to be arranged hereafter.

A feeling distinctly more prevalent regarding the Fashoda affair prevails in Paris. President Faure is taking the crisis quietly and the belief is stronger than it was that M. Brisson fell before the cabinet.

Salisbury Cannot Recede. London, Oct. 27.—Wednesday evening witnessed a great outpouring of oratory on the Fashoda question.

APPROACH THE END.
