adding more when too much is evaporated. While boiling add half a pint of soaked beans, the same of rice and the same of linseed meal. When the whole is cooked, add salt to taste and thicken with two parts of ground oats, one part bran, one part middlings, and one part cornmeal. Add the mixed ground grain until the mess has thickened to a stiff dough. If it burns a little no harm will be done. Then stir in a pint of bone meal. If milk be convenient it may also be added as curds, buttermilk or any other shape. When boiling add a tablespoonful of bread soda to the water. This food may be cooked in the shape of cakes and crumblsd for the fowls or fed in the soft state. A tablespoonful is sufficient for each hen. Just before adding the ground grain, chop-, ped clover may be placed in the boiler also. Another good mess is to cut the clover fine and steep it over night in boiling water. In the morning let the water come to a boil and thicken with mixed ground grain as before and feed. Condiments, such as red peper, ginger, etc., should be fed sparingly. Once or twice a week is often enough to feed the mess and all the soft food should be salted to suit the taste, as salt is as essential to poultry as to larger stock. DUCKS AND HENS AS LAYERS. That the duck is a superior table fowl, and fully equal to the hens. cannot be denicd, and that one will lay as many eggs, and larger eggs is also another fact in her favor. The question then is: Why is the hen preferred to the duck? That the hen is given the preference is shown by a glance at every farmyard in which the hen will be seen and the duck absent. One reason favorable to the hen is that she lays at all seasons of the year, which cannot be said of the duck, but in the duck's favoi it may be said that when she begins to lay she lays nearly every day while at it, and will, from February to September, lay as many eggs as the her will during the whole year. In fact, some ducks will lay 100 eggs during four months. The duck will give better results with her eggs and young than will the hen. Duck eggs are nearly always fertile, and it is not unusual to get 100 young ones from 100 eggs, while a little extra care will bring 95 of them to a marketable age.

It is claimed that eggs produced early in the season have a better flaor than those which hens lay after they run at large and live mainly on grass and insects; that is, when both are used equally fresh. The character of the feed has much to do with

the quality of the eggs, however. Sometimes meat has become too stale for the market and is cut up and cooked for the hens, but though they eat it ravenously one who knows the feed would not care to eat the eggs it produces. Cheap meats, if fresh and wholesome, are good, but judi cious feeding of milk, wheat, bran, oats, and other nitrogenous foods will lessen the demand for meat. 

THE COLOR OF EGGS.

American Troops Fail to Reach Washington, Dec. 29. - Arrangements for the funeral of the late Senator Morrill, of Vermont, who died at

> an early hour in the morning, were completed Wednesday. The funeral ceremony will be held in the senate chamber on Saturday next at 12 o'clock noon. Until then the body will remain at the family residence on Massachusetts avenue, and will be borne to the capitol early Saturday morning. The services at the senate will be conducted by Rev. E. Bradford Leavitt, of All Souls Unitarian church, where Senator Morrill was an attendant for a number of years, assisted by Rev. Dr. Milburn. the blind chaplain of the senate. The remains will be taken to the family home at Strafford, Vt., for burial along-

side the remains of Mrs. Morrill. At the family residence of the deceased there were many evidences of affectionate regard during the day. Senators and representatives who had served alongside the venerable statesman for years called to pay their trib ute of respect. Senator Proctor, the colleague of Senator Morrill for the last five years, spent the morning at the house comforting the members of the family, and aiding in the last offices to the deceased. During the morning Dr. Swann, the brother-in-law, and Miss Swann, the sister-in-law of the senator, and for some time a member of the household, arrived from Boston. Besides the personal callers many messages of condolence came by telegraph from all parts of the country. The dispatches from old friends in Vermont breathed that warm personal esteem which was felt for the senator at his home. 
