The First Wyoming advanced directly on the insurgent position in front. Meanwhile the Laguna de Bay pounded the foe from the river.

Thus taken on three sides, the insurgents, after some resistance, were driven back.

Strain Tells on Dewey. Vancouver, B. C., March 9.-Capt. Fraser, of London, late of the British imperial forces, arrived Wednesday didect from Manila, where he had the honor of dining with Admiral Dewey. Capt. Fraser said:

"The war at Manila will have to end soon or the life of the great American admiral will be worth nothing. I dined with him at Manila within a month, and am convinced that if he is not relieved of the terrible strain imposed upon him he cannot last a month longer. As he sat at the banquet table, surrounded by his staff, he looked to me like a dying man. His hair is snowy white, his face ashen, and he ate hardly anything. I had the pleasure of a few minutes' conversation with him when we retired to the smoking-room. Having in mind his enfeebled appearance, I asked him if he thought of returning to America soon. "I would like to, but my work is by no means finished here. When it is, and only

then, will I return.' "I am thoroughly convinced that only the admiral's indomitable will has kept him up so long. The strain on him is ter-rible, and the climatic conditions have reduced him to a shadow. His officers and worship him. As an English officer, and knowing the magnificient work he has done, I have the greatest admiration for

'One of his officers said to me just before I left Manila: The war will be ended by the admiral soon, or it will end him. No man can stand such a strain as he does in this climate and live long."

A Valuable Grant.

Corpus Christi, Tex., March 9 .- Dr. J. Diaz Prieto, Mexican consul at this place, has just been granted the sole right to reclaim 33,000,000 acres of government land in the districts of Montesuma, Sahuaesipa and Arispe, Sonoro, Mexico, comprising some of the gold lands of the Yaqui country. The agricultural tracts of this vast grant are to be colonized by Spanish ex-soldier: from Porto Rico and Cuba. A conservative estimate placed the value of the grant at about \$40,000,000. The grant was made by the Mexican government as a testimonial of its appreciation of Dr. Prieto's success in bringing foreign capital into Mexico.

Queen Grows Worse.

Brussels, March 9.-Extra editions of the evening papers assert that the condition of Queen Marie Henriette has grown worse.

London, March 9.-The Brussels correspondent of the Daily Mail says the greatest secrecy is maintained as to the queen's malady and that the sentinels have been ordered to fire upon any unauthorized person who attempts to enter the precincts of the palace.

### Bryan in Texas.

'Austin, Tex., March 9.-Hon. William Jennings Bryan spoke in the capitol Wednesday night to both houses of the Texas legislature and 6,000 people. His speech was along the lines of his previous utterances, favoring the further advocacy of silver and opposed to the creation of a large standing army and of the expansion theory.

Price of Brooms Advanced. Chicago, March 9.-The convention of manufacturers of brooms, after a two-days' session, adjourned Wednesday, having decided to raise the price of brooms throughout the United States 50 cents a dozen on all grades under \$3.50 per dozen.
