Manila, March 16.-3:55 p. m.-The strongly fortified village of Caitai, northwest of Pasig, was captured today after a desperate fight, by the Twentieth regular infantry. The Americans lost 17 wounded, while the rebels' loss was heavy.

Killed One American.

Manila, March 16, 1:30 p. m .- The insurgents at the outposts and in the trenches beyond Caloocan fired several volleys last night upon the Kansasvolunteers and a part of the Fourth regulars, desiring, it is supposed, to discover if the American line had been thinned by the movement of Gen. Wheaton's command. The Americans in the trenches replied warmly to the fire. H. Y. Beecher, of company A, of the Montana regiment, was killed in the engagement. A battalion of the Twentieth regular infantry routed a small band of Filipinos on the Laguna road and some sharpshooters who were firing from a house over which a French flag was flying were dislodged. A gunboat entered the lake and silenced a one-gun battery in the foothills.

Wheaton Occupies Pateros. Washington, March 16 .- The following dispatch from Gen. Otis has been received: Manila, March 15.-Adjutant Gener-

al, Washington: Three thousand insurgents moved down last night to towns of Pasig and Pateros. on shore of Laguanda bay, fronting Wheaton's troops on Pasig river line. By heavy fighting Wheaton has dislodged and driven them back, taking 400 prisoners and inflicting heavy loss in killed and wounded. He reports his loss as very moderate. He now occupies these towns with sufficient force to hold them.

The asperging of Julian in Gaul by a priest is perhaps the carliest instance of the introduction of this corruption, which became a source

of superstition in the fifth century. says Blackwood's Magazine. The wonder-working power of the relics of martyrs began to be believed toward the close of the fourth century and almost immediately after we find complaint made of the sale of forged relics, both in the east and in the west.

The sale of relics was forhidden by Theodosius, yet they constantly increased in numbers and in importance until the holy table was converted into an altar to hold them. In the fifth century also ex voto offerings began to be kung on ekurch walls-a custom which was of heathen origin. The use of lights, which, as above said, was forbidden in the second century in the daytime, crept in in the fifth century.
