



Think Lawton Was Driven Back. Paris, April 20.-Interest here in American affairs is now transferred from Samoa to the Philippines again. The impression already existed that Gen. Lawton had been forced to retreat, and his declaration that 100.009 men would be required to pacify the islands strengthens this opinion. While it is freely admitted that the resources of the United States and the bravery of the Americans are sufficient to conquer the archipelago, it is believed that the distance and the necessity of employing volunteers will finally cause the Washington government to modify its policy. It is the private opinion of French publicists who profess to understand the question that President McKinley will fail to subjugate the Filipinos.

To Send 14,000 Regulars. New York, April 20.- A special to the Tribune from Washington says that 14,-000 regulars are to be sent to reenforce Gen. Otis at Manila as soon as the necessary marine transportation can be provided. It is not expected that the bulk of the large body of reenforcements can reach Manila until the end of the rainy season, which has just begun, but they will closely follow the departure from the Philippines of the volunteers. With the regular troops already ordered and on the way to Manila, Gen. Otis will have an effective force of 21.728 men in addition to the recruits being sent every few days for the regiments already in the Philippines. This force is to be raised to 35,000 men by the time aggressive operations can be pressed in the early autumn. A special to the Journal from Wash-

ington says that President McKinley has indorsed a proposition to suspend active field operations against the insurgents in the Philippines until fall and in the meantime to institute a strict blockade by the navy to prevent Aguinaldo receiving war supplies. This can be done successfully, it is maintained, when the fleet under Admiral Dewey is augmented by the small vessels which have been ordered there recently. May Come Home in June,

Des Moines, Ia., April 20.-Adjt. Gen. Byers has advices from Washington on which he announces in all probability the Fifty-first Iowa regiment, now in the Philippines, will be sent home in June or July. He believes a majority of the regiment will reenlist if given opportunity.

Another Tax on Beer. Jefferson City, Mo., April 20.-The Missouri house passed the senate bill levying an inspection tax of one cent per gallon and two cents for each package of beer sold in the state. The bill passed by the close vote of 71 to 51, after a hot fight.

Have Their Own Share of Courage.

The Filipinos are certainly showing that they have their full share of courage. In the latest hard fighting around Manila they were forced to give way before the determined American advance, but the losses they endured proved how well they stood their ground against the forces far superior in equipment, arms, leadership and skill in the use of modern weapons, says the

Cleveland Leader. The soldiers who served Aguinaldo had the advantage of fighting on the defensive and of knowing the country better than the Americans. . The climate was also in their favor. But the difference in the losses sustained shows that they were essentially overmatched. Few natives of semi-civilized or savage countries would have stood their ground so well, under like conditions. Nothing more can be asked of men, as a test of

courage, than their willingness to fight until they die, and it is clear that many of the Malays in Luzon have been ready for that supreme test of bravery.

It is evident that the fighting powers of the Filipinos were much underestimated, at first, by the American officers who held commands in Manila. Their stubborn resistance to the Spaniards was too largely attributed to the inefficiency of the Spanish soldiers. It seems rather to have been due to the courage and natural prowess of the Filipinos themselves. The Spanish infantry proved at Santiago that it could do deadly work in battle, and the losses of the Filipinos in their last rebellion against Spain were heavy.

The session just ended has been distinguished by the passage of a rail-road commission bill authorizing the construction of a new million-dollar well. state capitol and the enactment of the

Gomez' Position. Havana, April 20. - Gen. Maximo Gomez has determined to announce to the people of Cuba his support of an

American protectorate until such time as a stable, independent government may be founded. Gen. Gomez made it known that he intends to take this step after consulting the views of the leading men in his following. He is content to cooperate with the Americans until the island is pacified, the rural police organized, the Cuban soldiery at work and insular reconstruction far advanced.


