FRESH EGGS FOR CONSUMERS

In all cases where persons have made a specialty of furnishing strictly fresh eggs to customers they have invariably secured good prices. We venture to claim, however, that no person can "guarantee" eggs to be fresh if he is compelled to buy them from others in order to sell them, for the most careful persons often make mistakes, and a bad egg will occasionally find its way among the lot.

HOW MUCH WILL A DUCK GAIN? Twenty Pekin ducks were put up in a small yard and fed by way of experiment, continuing for eight weeks. On the eighth week they weighed four pounds each, some weeks they having gained as much as fifteen ounces in one week.

Game Warden Morse has issued his first monthly report. It shows that out of 51 prosecutions in April there were 41 convictions. The fines and costs amounted to \$559. More than \$1,600 worth of nets and fish were seized and will be condemned.

GOES TO WEST POINT.

Irving Phillips, of Dowagiac, has Highest Standing—Willis C. Stephens Standing Second.

The result of the West Point competitive examination, which was held at Niles several days ago, was learned this afternoon. It was seen that Irving, son of Emanuel Phillips, of Dowagiac, stands first and has won the prize, while Willis C. Stephens, of this city, is second and will be named as alternate.

There is not the slightest question that the examination was conducted in the fairest possible manner by the examining committee, and the result, while it is pleasing to the friends of Mr. Stephens and his widowed mother, would have been more so had one of those from this city won the cadetship. It is not as yet known on exactly what study Mr. Stephens was a little shy.—St. Joseph Press, May 6.

than the swine. As skim milk and buttermilk contains nearly all the elements of food the eggs are more easily produced by hens fed upon such than when they are not otherwise provided, and every farmer should allow the hens a share of the skim milk and buttermilk.

Roosts for heavy fowls should be wide. A four-inch wide board, one inch thick, will be better for large Asiatics as a roost than anything else, but the smaller breeds will be satisfied with a round pole, or a piece of 3x4 scantling, rounded on the ends. The large breeds prefer to have a support for the breast as it tires them to hold the weight entirely on the legs, while a wide roost enables to balance themselves more easily.

R. G. Dan & Co's. Review says:—The failures in April were the smallest in any month since records by months began, 88 per cent. smaller than in April of last year, not a third of the amount in 1897, and not half the amount in April of any previous year. Both in manufacturing and in trading they were the smallest ever known in that month, and in trading the smallest ever known in any month, as in manufacturing they were if the larger failures were omitted, the ratio of defaulted liabilities to solvent payments through clearing houses was less than 70 cts. per \$1,000, against 90 cts. in January and \$1.19 in March, \$7.89 in August, and \$8.02 in September, 1896. A great share of the risk in the business world has been eliminated.

It is not inconsistent nor strange if business halts, because it has been crowded to its utmost for four months in anticipating future needs on account of new combinations proposed. In some cases prices have been advanced as to check new business, and in others works have been engaged so far ahead that new orders cannot now be taken. Yet new business in amount which would have been astonishing two years ago is still coming forward and the voluntary advance in wages by the sixteen Bessemer firms of the Central Association, and by the Frick coke works whose shipments in April, 30,452 cars, were the heaviest ever known, show confidence in the future. At Buffalo and in Idaho strikes are causing trouble, but labor questions elsewhere do not affect general business.

The May McClure's is especially notable for its articles of sharp present interest. J. L. Steffens supplies a valuable, and often dramatic, chapter in recent politics in the story (never before fully told) of Theodore Roosevelt's experiences with the warring political reformers and party politicians during his recent canvass for the governorship of New York and since. A new and fuller view of Admiral Dewey and his way of dealing with affairs in the Philippines is given in Oscar King Davis's "Stories of Admiral Dewey," Mr. Davis writing from his own personal knowledge, acquired as the Manila correspondent of the New York Sun. Ray Stannard Baker gives a popular exposition of Dr. T. J. J. See's important new theory, that as a gaseous body shrinks its temperature increases, and that, contrary to the common opinion, the sun is at present not growing colder but rapidly hotter.

Other notable things in the number are a paper by Charles Dana Gibson relating personal experiences in Egypt and illustrated with his own drawings; a good railroad story by John A. Hill; and Miss Tarbell's collection of new anecdotes and reminiscences exhibiting Lincoln's personal relations and dealings with the commanders of the Army, from McClellan to Grant.

Mr. Frank Moss, in spite of his arduous duties in connection with the Mazet Investigating Committee, has found time to write for the May Forum an interesting article on "The Problem of Police Administration." He points out that whereas in the State of New York there are many codifications of law, under such titles as Banking, Insurance, Public Health, etc., there is no Police Law, nor any semblance of it. Mr. Moss contends that if the State should undertake, by a properly equipped bureau, the collection of criminal statistics, the observation of criminal conditions, the examination of law enforcement and police administration in localities, and the summary removal of incompetent and unfaithful police heads, leaving the localities to replace them, no corrupt police department could stand.
