1871, he died on April 7, 1901. His mother, Mrs. Helmick and three sisters survive him.  
Most of his life was spent in this community. When nearly grown to manhood he went with his people to Kansas where he lived seven years. At the age of 18, while living in Kansas he was converted in the Salvation Army and entering heart and soul into religious work with his comrades soon became a captain among them. His company was successful in their work, and among the converts they gained mention is made of a prominent business man who was a notorious infidel; this man has since proved to be a great power for righteousness in that State.  
At the age of 21 the deceased was united in marriage to Kittie Godfrey of Buchanan with whom he lived happily for three years when death claimed her and about three months later their little one followed the mother to the other shore. This bereavement cast a deep gloom over the heart and life of young Holliday. The light has faded out from his hearthstone and the sun of his Faith was obscured by the dark clouds. He went from place to place but was not able to find peace or rest. A year ago he was carried through a siege of typhoid fever in the hospital at Minneapolis; he finally came back to his mother's home last January and in March engaged with others in fishing in the river. Exposure brought on the typhoid fever again. The gentle and skillful hands of mother and sisters administered to his comfort but odds were against him. The devoted mother had been praying day and night that he might find the Savior again and have peace in believing on Him. Early on Easter morning as the sun was clothing the world in beauty those about him heard him engaged in earnest prayer. He sought his Savior and found joy and peace in Him. A few minutes later a minister living near by called in and found a scene like the first Easter morning among the friends of Jesus—Fear and sorrow had been turned to gladness. Praises were on the devoted mother's lips and a load had been lifted from the hearts of all the friends. In answer to a question by the minister as to his confidence the dying man said, "Oh Yes! I am trusting Jesus with all my heart. I have never been so happy as when I was faithfully serving Him." In the twilight of that bright Easter day he quietly fell asleep resting on the bosom of the "Lover of his Soul."  
The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Douglas, pastor of the M. E. church assisted by Rev. Thomson of the Christian church, at the residence of Allen Helmick.

**Dr. McOmber Sells Out.**  
The Berrien Springs *Era* has been sold by Dr. Fred McOmber to George and Dewey Benson, two young men of that village. Editor Perkins will be retained by the new owners. He is one of the best known journalists in the county and will keep up the value of the *Era* to its present high standard.  
The *Era* was founded a quarter of a century ago by Dr. McOmber. When Berrien Springs was the county seat the *Era* was one of the best known papers in this part of the state but with the growth of the cities in the county of course it lost the distinction of being the most widely quoted of the bunch of papers in the district. 
