## Grass Honses of the Wiehita Indians.

The finest house ever designed by redskin is the grass house of the
Wichitas, a tribe that at present live
in in southern Oklahoma. They are the
only tribe that ever accomplished only tribe that ever accomplished
successfully the erection of a grass
structure. Soon they are to abondon these hats and take up their hum-
drum reservation life in two-room frame shacks, which are being built
them by the government, The grass them by the government, The grass
house, it is claimed, is far from being
healthful; but it is certainly comforhealthful; but it is certainly comfor-
table.
There are but about fifty old men of the tribe alive to-day who under-
stand the art of building one of these houses so that it will stand. And
these refuse to work, even for gener-
ous wages. The government ous wages. The government has
offered these grass lucrative employment to construc
some houses that may be preseved as
models of an ancient art. But they refuse, and the grass huts that used
to dot the prariers of the Wichita
resoration are now being torn down
The Wichitas are determined that their huts shall not survive them.
Appearaces are often deceiving. One can look upon a grass house and
imagine it an easy thing to magine so an easy thing to build
But not so. It is indeed most intri But not so. It is indeed most intri-
cate. The grass is gathered early in the spring, when it is yet fresh. The
sod cutting usually takes place immediately after a rain, the sod being
removed to a thickness of about eight inches. Buffalo grass sod is the onl kind that will answer the purpose of
the builder. He commennes to la the builder. He commennes to lay
the foundation as does the stonemason, digging away the earth to a
deptli of about a foot. The grass portion of the chunks of sod is laid
to the outside, and the house is built
to o a height of twelve to fifteen feet, in the form of a pointed dome.
There is no hole in the top for smoke
to pass out, the latter being carrie away through a pipe on the outside of the hut. The door is usually in
the south, and there are no windows Throngh each .tuft of sod is run willow reed string, and these strings are bound clear around the structure. The grass, and will grow if there is
plenty of rain. It is not at all uncommon to see the sides of these grass houses turn green as spring
