NARROW ESCAPE

Chas. A. Miller Has a Serious Accident at the Power House.

Chas A Miller, employed in the construction of the new power house had a narrow escape from death on Monday, while engaged with the boss in raising a heavy piece of timber.

The boss at one end was pulling on a rope and he was lifting on the other end and had the piece as high as his breast when he put his foot out on a board which broke and landed him a distance of over 20 ft into the water below. In falling he clutched whatever came in his way but failed to stop his fall. When rescued his hip was out of joint and the bones of the leg fractured; his physician, Dr. Garland, is still unable to determine the extent of the internal injuries.

BENTON HARBOR

Those who do not attend our Chautauqua Assembly are missing a grand treat. We would like to report still more fully, if we could have space.

Wednesday was the banner day of the Assembly. A vast crowd filled the big tent to overflowing and many were obliged to stand. Miss Ellen M. Stone was introduced by Rev. W. J. Cady, a brother Congregationalist. Some have been reading her story as it is given in Mc Clure's but it is far more interesting to hear it from her own lips.

By far the most interesting musical number was the African boys concerts; the five boys who represent five different tribes were born in Africa as was the pianist, Miss Elsie Clark who had a white father and a Kaffir mother. She, like the boys was dressed in native costume heavily beaded. The men of the tribes do bead work and the women do the drudgery such as plowing, sowing, etc. Miss Clark is fair, beautiful and well educated. She told how she adopted the Bushman, the oldest of the boys 8 years ago, when he was a forsaken little fellow, half starved and so dirty he could hardly see. She cared for and educated him till now he speaks Kaffir, Hottentot, and English and is very trustworthy and useful Bushman, very few of whom are left, are of ancient origin; traces of their drawings on stones may be seen, the colors of which are still bright though they are probably 3000 years old.

Friday afternoon Lorado Taft the eminent sculptor delighted us with skilful manipulations of the plastic clay, bringing smiles, frowns, and despair in rapid succession from the human face divine. He showed how plaster casts and death masks are made. While he talked and worked his assistant, who is very skilful, in modelling children's faces, reproduced the face of a little girl sitting near by, which was instantly recognized. Saturday evening his talk was illustrated by views of the best American statuary. The lecturer thought Augustus St. Gaudens our greatest living sculptor.

On Sunday morning despite the unfavorable weather, 2000 people gathered to hear Dr. J. Wilbur Chapman the eminent preacher and evangelist.
