SCOTT WHITMAN

Was born in Cayuga Co., Ohio, April 22 1840. In his boyhood days he removed with his parents to South Bend, Ind. In 1861 in response to the first call of his country he enlisted in the 15 Indiana regiment, on his twenty-first birthday. He served in the army for three years and three months. He married Mis: Franc Totten of Buchanan Nov. 9 1865, since which-time he has lived in this place. This union was blessed with two children, one dying in infancy and the other, Frank, remaining with the widow to mourn their loss. Mrs Wm Roe and Mrs. Jesse Roe are sisters of the deceased.

For many years Mr. Whitman was a stock bujer, and was well known through out the county. On the 15th day of August, he quietly slept away to rest, thus ending many years of patient suffering,

It can be said of Mr. Whitman that he was a loyal friend, a loving husband and a kind and indulgent father. As a neighbor he endeared himself to all, leaving behind a memory which will never be forgotten. In his unostentatious manner he lived the principles of his higher belief, until he sank away into his long and peace-
