Through the kindness of A. J. Slater we copy from the Plymouth Journal, Iowa, the following in regard to a former citizen of Buchanan which will be of interest to the older people:

Joseph Meryin Molsberry came to his death Sunday Aug. 10, at about one o'clock p. m., being internally injured by a maddened bull at about 7 a. m. of the same day. He was born in Knox Co., Ohio. At the age of 16 he moved with his parents to Berrien Co., Mich., and there resided with his parents until his marriage in Feb. 1841 to Jennie Jane Putman. To this union were born ten sons and one daughter, the daughter and three sons died in infancy and there remain a widow and seven sons. For six years he engaged in farming near Buchanan, Mich., when he sold his farm and opened a livery stable at that place. In 1854 he sold out his business and came to Iowa. The following season he moved his family to Rock Falls, Iowa, and in 1856 he moved to Worth Co., where he lived the remainder of his life.

### RECORD HARD TO BEAT

For Seventy Years J. S. Helmick has Worked Each Harvest.

HAS NEVER MISSED ONE

In all the Seventy Years and Feels as if he Were Good for More.

John S. Helmick of the village of Buchanan is a man well known and respected by all. He was born in Warren Co., Ohio, February 28, 1833. In the tenth year of his life his father bought him a boy's sickle and he helped his father in the harvest field. In those days the wheat field was laid out in lands large enough for 2 men to reap along side of each other. This first year of reaping he did what was called gouging, he would run ahead and cut on his father's side of the land. The next year he and his father took a land together, he cut as much as he could perhaps a third or less and his father did the rest. In his twelfth year he took a man's place and made a full hand. When he was fourteen years old he came to Michigan with his father who settled in the woods six miles north of Buchanan. He, with his father, cut the first stick of wood ever cut on the place.

Soon after coming to Michigan the cradle came into use and the sickle was laid aside. For a number of years while the cleared land was not many acres his father did the harvesting at home and he and his brother would go to Portage prairie and harvest about three weeks. The names of the men he worked for will probably be new to most of our readers, James Miller, Christian Haller and David Lur.

After helping clear the farm his father gave him 80 acres. He cleared that up and married. Soon after his marriage the reaper began to take the place of the cradle. He has seen the reaper in all its stages; first the one that dropped the sheaves and the binder followed, up to the present self binder. All his life since coming to Michigan has been spent here except four years in Dakota. Then he reaped with a header and five men and a boy gathered 30 acres and stacked it in a day.

In all the seventy harvests he has never missed one. Once he saw eighteen cradles abreast in one harvest field. This is a record hard to beat. We would like to hear from the man that can beat it.

### M. B. H. & C. ROAD

Will use the new Union Depot, will join the Pere Marquette and Big Four Roads. Little Road will put on as Much Style as the Neighbors do.

The Milwaukee, Benton Harbor & Columbus railroad trains will run in to the new union passenger station now being built by the Pere Marquette and big Four railroads. This statement was made last night by S. H. Kelley, attorney for the M. B. H. & C. road, who has had in charge all of the legal proceedings connected with the deal. There has been some property held by the Pere Marquette which the M. B. H. & C. wished to condemn so as to get through to a piece of desirable property and build a new depot. The matter was adjusted by an arrangement which brings the M. B. H. & C. into the new union depot.

It was on this account that the M. B. H. & C. wanted another track across Territorial street. Attorney Kelley stated that this track was necessary for the road to get to the union depot.—Benton Harbor Evening News, Aug. 19.

### Bakertown Drain Notice

Notice of Review of Apportionment of and As-  
essment for Benefits in Establishment of Bak-  
ertown Drain in township of Bertrand (town  
eight south, range eighteen west.) Whereas, a  
certain date known as the Bakertown Drain  
was by the Township drain commissioner of the  
Township of Bertrand, in said Berrien County,  
Michigan, heretofore located, established and  
the work of construction thereof completed, and

Whereas, the proceedings taken by the said  
drain commissioner to locate and establish said  
drain have been declared illegal and void by the  
Circuit Court for the County of Berrien, by an  
order or decree of said Court, dated April 13, 1900,  
a filed in said Court, a copy whereof being also  
filed in the office of the county Clerk of said  
county, for the irregularities and causes specified  
in said order or decree and said proceedings  
were by said order or decree declared illegal  
wholly for causes other than that such drain is  
unnecessary and not conducive to the public  
health, convenience or welfare.

Now therefore, I, James Morrow, county drain  
commissioner did proceed to reestablish said drain  
in answer to prayer of petitions according to sur-  
vey and measurement as follows:

Commencing at a point 132 feet west on the town  
line from the north 1/4 corner section three, town  
eight south range eighteen west, at station "o".  
Stations each 100 feet. Station 10 is 300 feet.  
Thence south 18 degrees 19 minutes west to sta-  
tion 13 plus 40 feet.

Thence south 63 degrees 50 minutes, west to sta-  
tion 16 plus 92 feet.

Thence south 82 degrees 15 minutes, west to  
station 20 plus 10 feet.

Thence south 79 degrees 30 minutes, west to  
station 24 plus 18 feet.

Thence south 51 degrees 34 minutes, west to  
station 27 plus 37 feet.

Thence south 81 degrees 20 minutes, west to  
station 30 plus 10 feet.

Thence south 19 degrees 32 minutes, west to  
station 47 plus 35 feet.

Thence south 62 degrees 17 minutes, west to  
station 60 plus 10 feet.

Thence south 37 degrees 44 minutes, west to  
station 70 plus 12 feet.

Thence south 18 degrees, east to station 99 plus

Thence south 19 degrees 31 minutes, east to  
station 189 plus 14 feet.

Station 189 plus 14 feet is 208 feet west from  
south-east corner of the north-east 1/4 of the south-  
east quarter of section sixteen, town eight south  
range eighteen west.

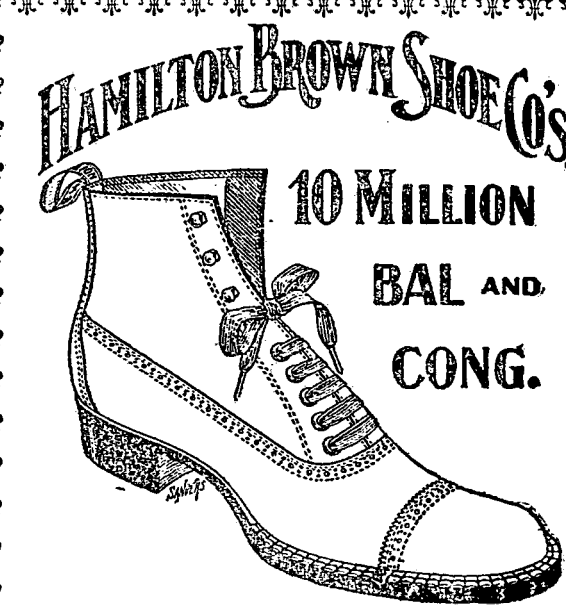


