## KITCHEN HELPS.

Don't wipe out the coffeepot with the dishcloth. Don't let the, breakfast grounds stand half a day. Put wornout pie tins in the sink cupboard and use them to set crockery kettles in. •

Did you ever try brick dust to clean agate ware? It is less expensive than other articles sold for such purposes and far more effectual.

To clean a kettle in which onions or other rank vegetables have been cooked  $\epsilon$  (0) rub with a cloth dipped in hot, strong soda water; then wash in soapy water. The smell of onions may be removed from a saucepan if it is filled with cold water and into it is put a slice of bread -a stale crust will answer the purpose. Boil the water and bread together for half an hour.

To clean greasy kettles warm the pot or kettle, then throw in a handful of cornmeal and rub well. You will find the meal will absorb all the fat so that soap and water will make your kettle perfectly clean.



The bridle reins on the horse had been broken. I satisfied myself that he had been tied to a tree and when assailed by hunger and thirst had broken away. Nothing pointed to robbery as the motive. There wasn't one chance in a thousand that any one outside of his mother and sister knew of the money. According to my analysis, it was a chance meeting. There had been words, and the squire had dismounted. Then there had been a grapple, and he had been struck down. The robbery of the corpse had been an afterthought and was done to disarm suspicion. Nineteen times out of twenty the
