### TWO BIG DAYS IN ONE

Big Labor Day Demonstration and Merchants' Free Street Carnival will "Make Rome Howl" in Dowagiac Monday Sept. 1.

"Rome will howl!" in our neighboring city Dowagiac on Monday, Sept. 1, as, in addition to the grand Labor Day demonstration which the big manufacturing institutions of that city have been making ready for some time, it will be the opening day of the Merchants Free Street Carnival which also promises to be the biggest event of this kind Dowagiac has ever seen.

The Labor Day program includes among other attractions a grand industrial pageant at 11:00 in the forenoon which will contain four bands of music, over 1,000 working men employed in the factories of that city, many blocks of floats, numerous civic societies, fire companies and other attractions. The afternoon will be given over to band concerts in four different parts of the city, speech-making, and numerous and truly marvelous attractions carried by the Robinson Carnival Company which includes the ninety foot dive by Prof. Millegan; a daring bicycle ride down a flight of stairs 200 feet long, where at the end the cyclist performs the marvelous cycle whirl, which brings him to an almost horizontal position with the wheel, and will be exhibited in Dowagiac for the first time in Southwestern Michigan. Middle. Orocco will ascend and descend the high spiral tower on a wooden ball. Middle. Josephine will give her famous exhibition in mid-air, and besides these and numerous other free spectacular attractions, there will be fourteen new, novel and moral shows all of an absolutely high class furnished by the Robinson Carnival Company.
