The Board of Supervisors have been in session this week and much routine work has been turned out. Drain Commissioner Morrow rendered his report on the work done on the various drains in the county during the year. The report is very lengthy, covering 42 typewritten pages.

The board allowed a bill presented by the city of St. Joseph for paving and sewerage amounting to \$1,465.96. The committee having the bill in charge stated that the county could have five years to pay the bill in, but recommended that it be paid at once. The petition of the Berrien county W. C. T. U., asking for \$20 to assist in holding religious meetings at the county poor house, was granted. Meetings of this character are held on the first Sunday in each month. John Carmody, of the Berrien Springs schools, was elected to the office of county school examiner, for-

merly held by Mr. Swem, of New Buffalo.

The report of the county jail inspectors, on the inspection of the jail during the month of September, was read, accepted and placed on file. The report shows that since the last inspection, in February, 226 prison ers have been confined therein, of which four were females, one being for disorderly conduct and three insane.

The most important committee report will be that upon the equalization of taxes in the county.

Mitchell Declares His Adhesion. From the time the news was received late Wednesday night until about about 10 a.m. yesterday there was some doubt as to how the miners would receive the modified plan. President Mitchell was pressed by the correspondents for a statement, and final-

ly at 10 a.m. he issued a bulletin, of I. W. Rifford has been challenged which the following is the material part: "I was unalterably opposed to the acceptance of or acquiescence in the form of settlement proposed by the coal operators, because it restricted the president of the United States in mak ing selection of the men who were to determine the questions involved in the coal strike. These restrictions having been removed and representation given to organized labor as well as to organized capital, I * * * shall recommend to the executive officers of districts 1, 7 and 9 * * * that an immediate call be issued for a convention, whose authorization is nec-

essary to declare the strike at an end." Gave General Satisfaction.

When this was read to the arriving district leaders and groups of miners who came to headquarters that Mitchell was willing to accept the modified plan, and from that time on there was no doubt that the strike would be brought to a speedy close. At 2 p. m. the thirty-seven members of the three districts boards were called into session. There was some opposition manifested in the meeting against certain features of the plan, but after a full discussion of the objectionable parts a unanimous vote was taken to recommend the convention the acceptance of the proposition.

TALK OF RESUMPTION OF WORK

Probable Next Thursday, but May Go Over Until Friday.

If the plans of the strike leaders are not disarranged a general resumption of mining will take place about next Thursday. It is expected that the convention will last two days, and that there will be an interval of one day from the time the convention adjourns until the time set for the men to go back to the mines. If the convention should be in session on Wednesday it is probable that resumption would not take place until Friday. There will not be enough work at first for all the strikers, as it is the intention of the companies not to dismiss non-union men, who have stood by them during the strife. The organization will take care of such other men as are unable to find work. It is estimated that all the strikers will not find work until two or three months have elapsed. This is due to the conditions of the mines. Some of them are wholly or partly flooded, and He was last seen at the first Na other need repairing. The coal compa-

TEN MEN WENT DOWN

C. B. Lockwood's Missing Boat Picked Up Off Ashtabula-Names of the Men Drowned.

Cleveland, Oct. 17.-All hope that the ten men who had left the foundering steamer C. B. Lockwood off the port of Ashtabula in Lake Erie Monday night were still alive was dispelled when the overturned boat that they had embarked in was picked up late yesterday afternoon off that port by the boat J. G. Grammer.

The names of the missing men are: Second Mate John Brittz, of Toledo; Chief Engineer David Burns, of Marine City; Henry Rossman, second engineer, Fairhaven; Fireman Fred Green, Marine City; Fireman Julius Schmidt, residence not known; Joseph Porey, oiler, Fairhaven; William Miller, deck hand; residence not known. and two deck hands and one fireman names not known.

To Formulate a Model Law.

Cincinnati, Oct. 17 .- At the recent meeting of the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' association President Freiburg, of this city, was directed to appoint a committee to formulate a model uniform liquor license law to be presented to all state legislatures for enactment.
