

Important causes of deaths were as follows: Tuberculosis of lungs, 162; other forms of tuberculosis, 26; typhoid fever, 80; diphtheria and roup, 48; scarlet fever, 17; measles, 4; whooping cough, 24; pneumonia 119; diarrheal diseases, under 2 years, 329, cancer, 114; accidents and vio lence, 152, Typhoid fever nearly doubled in mortality as compared with the preceding month, and diph theria and pneumonia showed coneiderable amounts of increase.

venienced by having no skimmilk to feed their calves and pigs. The paper comforts them by stating that the price received per 100 pounds of milk is enough greater than that paid by the creamery to more than make up the value of the skimmilk.

Hoard's Dairyman makes the following comment on the above statement: We have never yet seen a price paid by the condensaries high enough to cover the combined butter and feed value of the whole milk.

One great reason the condensaries get as much milk as they do is that the farmers are ignorant of the feeding value of skimmilk or of the proper methods to make it of value. The number of men who pretend to be dairymen who report the value of skimmilk at 10 cents per 100 is proof of the truth of our statement. There is no help for men who are ignorant of the value of what they produce and who in addition do not care to know any

better. That sort of farmer refuses to invest a dollar for valuable knowledge and contentedly loses \$10 in the value of his product.

There are lots of big dividends declared by corporations every day on the contented ignorance of farmers of that kind

#### Milking Before Calving.

Almost every week we see evidence from those who have found it necessary to milk their cows and heifers before they drop their calves. A writer in the Baltimore American says all of his best cows had to be milked before calving and some of them a month before. Last winter he had a fine heifer that looked as if she ought to be milking two weeks before calving, but about that time he read an article in which the writer claimed that it was a positive injury to milk a cow before calving and he decided he would not do it with the result that she lost the use of one-quarter of her udder. A heifer needs milking before calving more than an old cow, for a cow that begins to make an udder that needs milking a month before she drops her calf might as well be called a continuous milker and not be dried off at all. This is one of those old superstitions that ought to have gone out with the idea that it spoils a cow to give her grain food while in milk, or to keep her in a comfortably warm stable in cold and stormy weather.-American Cultivator.





Magazine Reviews.

#### Nature's Own Capital City.

. The above phrase is used by John Muir in characterizing the Grand Canon of the Colorado, of the architectural features of which he writes thus in the November Century:

In trying to describe the great pines and sequoiss of the Sierra, I have often thought that if one of those tree could be set by itself in some city park, its grandeur might there be impressively realized; while in its home forest, where all magnitudes are great, the weary, satiated travelers see none of them truly. It is so with these majestic rock structures.

Though mere residual masses of the plateau, they are dowered with the grandeur and repose of mountains, together with the finely chiseled carving and modeling of man's temple and palaces, and often, to a considerable extent, with their symmetry Some, closely observed, look like ruins; but even these stand plum and true, and show architectural forms loaded with lines strictly regular and decorative, and are all arrayed in colors that storms and time seem only to brighten. They are not placed in regular rows in line with the river, but "a' through ither," as the Scotch say, in lavish, exuberant crowds, as if nature in wildest extravagence held her heaviest structures as heavy as gravel piles. Yonder stands a spiry cathedral nearly five thousand feet in height, nobly symmetrical, with sheer buttressed walls and arched doors and windows, as richly finished and decorated with sculptures as the great rock temple of India in Egypt. Beside it rises a huge castle with arched gateway, turrets, watch-towers, ramparts, etc., and to right and left palaces, obelisks, and pyramids fairly fill the gulf, all colossal and all lavishly painted and carved. Here and there a flat topped structure may be seen, or one imperfectly domed; but the prevailing style is ornate Gothic, with many hints of Egyptian and Indian. Throughout this vast extent of wild architecture-nature's own capital city-there seem to be no ordinary dwellings. All look like grand and important public structures, except perhaps some of the lower byiamids, broad-based and sharp-pointed. covered with down-flowing talus like loosely set tents with hollow sagging sides. The roofs often have disintegrated rocks heaped and dragged over them, but in the main the masonry is firm and laid in regular courses, as if done by square and rule.  $\diamond$   $\diamond$   $\diamond$


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



5. As the Lord commanded Moses so the children of Israel did, and they divided the land.

While at one time there remained yet very much land to be possessed, yet in due time the Lord gave unto Israel all the land which He sware to give unto their fathers, and they possessed it and dwelt therein. There failed not aught of any good thing which the Lord had spoken unto the house of Israel. All came to pass. The Lord gave them rest, the Lord delivered all their enemies into their hand. The Lord God of Israel fought for Israel. They had only to obediently go forward (xiii, 1; xxi, 43-45; x, 42).

6. Thou knowest the thing that the Lord said unto Moses the man of God concerning me and thee in Kadesh-barnea.

Thus said Caleb, Joshua's old companion, when together they went with the other ten to spy out the land, as he now appears before Joshua on behalf of Judah, to which tribe he belonged (Num. xiii, 6). It is refreshing. whether in the Bible story or in the daily life of our own day, to meet people who believe God, who desire only to know what God has said and who rest on a "thus saith the Lord" as on the solid rock.

7, 8. I brought him word again as it was in my heart. I wholly followed the Lord my Gođ.

He looks back with gratitude to the time when he was a young man, forty years of age, and praises the grace of God which enabled him to be sincere before God and to follow Him fully. This is the only thing on which one can look back with real comfort as we advance in years-that without any thought of man's frown or favor we have been able to stand humbly, but sincerely, with God.

9. The land whereon thy feet have trodden shall be thine inheritance and thy children's forever.

All through the wilderness wanderings, as the many thousands died who were men when Joshua and Caleb spied out the land, Caleb held fast the word of Jehovah by the mouth of Moses that whoever else might die His servant Caleb would enter the land and possess it, because he wholly followed the Lord. We think of Paul in the storm at sea when all hope was given up, saying to the souls on that ship as he gave them the Lord's message, "I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me" (Acts xxvii, 25).

10. And now behold the Lord hath kept me alive, as He said, these forty and five years.


Caleb realized the truth of these words, though not written in his day: "He giveth to all life and breath and all things, for in Him we live and move and have our being" (Acts xvii, 25, 28). He is the God in whose hand our breath is and whose are all our ways (Dan. v, 23), but how few seem to think of this! It is well to remember that we continue of irom day to day only becourse the Lord sees fit to keep us alive. Happy are those who, like Caleb, keep themselves set apart for Himself, His own possession (Ps. iv, 3; Tit. ii, 14, R. V.).

11. As yet I am as strong this day as I was in the day that Moses sent me.

Although eighty-five years of age, yet feeling as strong and well as at the age of forty! It is written of Moses that he was a hundred and twenty years old when he died. His eye was not dim nor his natural force abated (Deut. xxxiv, 7). There is a renewing of strength and youth ofttimes enjoyed by those who wait upon the Lord, but we can quietly leave it all with Him to give us all the days here in the mortal body that will be for His glory and our good.

12. If so be the Lord will be with me. then I shall be able to drive them out, as the Lord said.

He asked for mountains where the giants were, for he learned as a young man that giants and walled cities were nothing to God. At the age of forty he had said: "The Lord is with us. Fear them not" (Num. xiv, 9), and in forty-five years he had found no reason to change his mind. He had no confidence in himself, but he had unbounded confidence in the Lord God. 13-15. Hebron therefore became the in-heritance of Caleb \* \* \* because that he wholly followed the Lord God of Israel. It is unwillingness to follow fully that hinders the Lord from working in His people as He would like to, for His eyes run to and fro through the whole earth to show Himself strong on behalf of those whose hearts are whole toward Him (II Chron. xvi, 9). But where are the whole hearts? How few seem willing to stand with God against the wisdom of this world. against culture, society, popular opinion and against the false teachers who are found in theological seminaries and in many a pulpit perhaps as never before! Hebron suggests fellowship, and the other name, Kirjath-Arba, while it means city of Arba, may mean also "the city of four," as the word arba is the Hebrew for four. Any one who follows fully as Caleb did will realize something of true fellowship with the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit and, however alone apparently. can always truthfully say. "There are try her HOME MADE four of us." This also is proved by John xiv, 17, 23. It is more than all that earth can give to be able to say. "Truly our fellowship is with the Father and with His Son Jesus Christ" (I John i, 3). Not conformed to this world, not pleasing men, but God, is the only way of peace and victory in this life,





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#### COST OF PRODUCTION INCREASED

By Various Causes Resulting from the Strike, Says Baer-First

Philadelphia, Oct. 24.—In view of the resumption of mining of anthracite coal the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad company last night issued the following statement, addressed to C. E. Henderson, general manager:

"Dear Sir-The reports of the superintendents in charge of the mines show that as a result of the strike the mines and mining plants have sustained considerable injury, and their respective working organizations have been impaired. For some time to come the collieries cannot be worked to produce their average quantity of coal. This will increase the cost of production. Estimates have been submitted showing the probable increase in cost per ton at the several groups of collieries. The general average exceeds

"You will, therefore, add to the circular price 50 cents per ton-this additional price to continue until the 1st of January, 1903, by which time we hope to reach a normal condition of mining and production. Notwithstanding the fact that during the strike no coal was sold by our company at an advance over the circular price the price has been unreasonably advanced to the public by some retail dealers. In the distribution of the coal, therefore, you will so far as practicable supply the dealers who are willing to sell coal to the public at reasonable prices. Where dealers seek to obtain an unfair profit from the public you will promptly take steps to supply the reasonable demands of the public directly." This is signed by George F. Baer.

#### Amounts to Consumers Restricted.

An effort will be made to arrange the distribution of coal so that parties in need may at least receive a small portion of their wants, and with this purpose in view dealers will be requested to restrict the amount which will for the present be sold to any consumer within the limits of his reasonable immediate requirements. The opinion is expressed by Henderson that the prices for white-ash egg, stove and chesnut coal, delivered to householders in the city of Philadelphia, should not in any case exceed \$6.75. Orders accepted for coal will be subject to the company's ability to ship, during October and all unfilled orders will be cancelled at the end of the month.

The counter-proposition provides for a general reduction in wages of 3 per cent. The proposition of the company was that the men should work up the orders to fill the drawback trade at a rate of 25 per cent. below regular rates of wages. It is stated that the American company will accept the counter-proposition without hestitation.

#### Many Things To Be Done Before Coal Will Be Coming Out in Normal Style.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 24 .-- The resumption of mining throughout the anthracite region was not as general yesterday as was expected. Unlooked for difficulties were encountered in the shape of water and accumulated gas, and dangerous roofs which threatened to fall and entomb the workers were also discovered in many of the collieries. In quite a few of the collieries the machinery and everything else connected with the hoisting of coal acted badly and it was found necessary to close down after steam had been raised. The number of mines in operation is given as a little less than two-thirds of the total number, but the output of coal was less than half the normal.

As was to be expected there was more or less dissatisfaction among the old employes over the reopening of the mines. Where it was decided not to resume work for a few days the men took it that the coal companies did not want their services, and many complaints reached President Mitchell's headquarters. But as the day wore on and the true situation became known there was a better feeling all around. It looks as though the union engineers were going to have some difficulty getting back their old places. At nearly every mine where the striking engineers made applications for work they were told that there were no vacancies. A large number of carpenters are also out in the cold.

A delegation of carpenters waited on Presiden. Mitchell and told him of their grievances. The chief of the miners' union advised his callers to wait a few days and see if employment would not be offered them. President Mitchell believes that when general resumption takes place there will be few of the mine employes idle. The only friction reported between union and non-union men was at several collieries in the Wyoming region, where the miners objected to be lowered into the mines by non-union engineers.
