CASTRO SEEMS TO BE MISSING

But His Press Agent Keeps the Venezuela Rebels Busy Most of the Time.

Willemstad, Curacao, Nov. 7.—The report of a great victory over the insurgents spread by the government of Venezuela was incorrect. The priests refused to ring the bells of the churches in celebration of the alleged defeat of the Matos forces, and he police were compelled to ring them.

The revolutionary army simply withdrew from San Mateo, and on Friday last passed through Villa de Cura, going towards Cua, which commands the road to Los Teques, where 2,000 revolutionists are now engaging a government force which protected the executive of Venezuela, whose whereabouts is now unknown.

Down Go Cable Rates.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 7.—The rate per word from all points in Canada to all Australia and New Zealand on the Pacific cable will be 2 shillings and 4 pence per word. The present rate is 99 cents from Ottawa, and the old rate before the cut was \$1.50 per word.

UNION STREET CAR MEN

Got About All They Demanded from an
Arbitration Board's Decision
at Chicago.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—Twenty-five hundred trainmen in the employ of the Union Traction and Consolidated Street Railway companies are to receive an increase in wages of more than 10 per cent., dating from Sept. 15, according to the findings of a board of arbitration, which made its report last night, after having had the demands of the street car men under consideration for nearly two months.

The men get about what they demanded as to wages, and the scale is to remain in force until May 31, 1904. The company had the non-union men organized in a benevolent association, and this is to be dissolved, so that the union will control the employment of men, and men who work will have to have a union card.

Minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and approved.

The Annual Report of the County Drain Commissioner (which is as follows) was read by the Clerk and on motion of Mr. Babcock was accepted and adopted.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNTY DRAIN COMMISSIONER

To the Board of Supervisors:

GENTLEMEN:

In accordance with the provisions of the statutes in such case made and provided, I have the honor to submit my annual report as County Drain Commissioner of the County of Berrien, covering the period from the Fifteenth day of October A. D. 1901 to the Fifteenth day of October A. D. 1902.

The following named Drains were found unfinished when I entered upon the duties of this office, Jan. 1st, 1902.

1- Big Meadow Drain, Oronoko and Royalton. That has now passed into the hands of the contractors and one part is already finished. The preparations are being made to begin the dredging.

2 The Bort and Lambrecht Drain of Royalton and Lincoln townships still has one contract unfinished.

3 Williamson, Lake and Lincoln. Finished and accepted in April 1902. That was cleaned, deepened and extended.

4 "Wooten and Bishop" Drain in Bainbridge and Pipestone, to be a tiled drain. The contractor has failed to finish the work in the year allowed and forfeiture of the contract has been declared.

5 "Smith and Nowlan." Two drains united under one name in Weesaw and Lake townships. Finished and assessment made.

6 "Keeler Creek" Lake and Lincoln cleaned, deepened and extended. The contract finished in August of present year.

7 "Fish and Stanley" Benton township, a tile drain. Finished and accepted after requiring deeper covering of tile.

8 "Wolf Creek" drain Weesaw township, had one contract for construction forfeited in 1899 or 1900 yet unfinished. The work was relet in April of 1902. The work has been finished and assessment made to meet expenses.

9 Painterville drain assessment had been overlooked since 1900, also.

10 Mead and Watson, Benton township. Both assessment rolls have been presented, to be spread for the tax collection.

11 Bakertown drain in Bertrand. The people had petitioned for re-establishing the drain. The necessary forms have all been attended to and the drain established. The assessment roll handed to proper authorities.

12 Blue Jay Creek people had petitioned for deepening the channel from the junction of the North and South branches to Galien River. The work has been begun on the construction.

13 Curtis drain, in Hagar. One contract yet unfinished.

14 Bihlmire and Nelson, in Oronoko Township. Finished and accepted in May 1900.

15 Elm Flat in Royalton. Clearing out was finished too late for assessment in 1901. Assessment had to be made in 1902.

The following named drains have been begun, constructed and completed by me during the present year, 1902, since January 1st.

1 Morelock and Scherer in Watervliet, 120 rods located and established. Completed in June of present year 1902.

2 Wall drain in Lincoln township, cleaned, widened, deepened and extended. Completed in September of present year 1902.

3 Evans drain in Lincoln, cleaned, widened and deepened, was completed in August, 1902.

4 Lintner, Allen and Renbarger drain in Galien, petition for cleaning out. That was cleaned out and completed in June 1902, with funds on hand.

5 Beeson and Muddock drain in Weesaw, was cleaned out with funds remaining in treasury.

6 "Stover Drain" Oronoko, petition for cleaning. The parties agreed among themselves to clean out the drain. The Commissioner and Surveyor were to be paid by assessment.

The following named drains have been begun by me, during the year, and are only partly completed, to wit:

1 "Town Drain Number two" Watervliet, to be cleaned and deepened. In process of construction. A large part completed.

2 "Badgley and Beveridge" Benton. A tile drain located but not yet established. Contract has not been fulfilled.

3 "Haller Drain" Lake township. A tile drain to be cleaned out. The contract has been let for the work.

4 "J. F. B. Thompson" Lincoln, Royalton and St. Joseph. To be widened and deepened. The proceedings have gone into Probate Court on a call for special Commissioners. Can proceed now to finish.

5 "Pipestone Lake Drain" in Bainbridge and Pipestone. The proceedings ready for final order of determination.

6 Pipestone Creek drain is to be cleaned, deepened and extended. Proceedings in Probate Court on call for special Commissioners to determine necessity and awards for extension.

7 The "King Drain" in Bainbridge and Sodus, to be cleaned. Upon the report of Surveyor the petition was deemed insufficient and work was delayed.

8 "Close Drain" for Three Oaks, Galien and Weesaw, to be deepened and widened. Proceedings carried as far as Drains Letting and a second postponement to Oct. 15.

9 A drain in Benton and Sodus townships to drain Mud lake into the St. Joseph River. Proceedings delayed by waiting for settlement of property litigation in which a part of the right of way was included.

10 A drain in Bainbridge to be located and established. A tile drain, proceedings as far as First Order of Determination.

11 Parker drain in Lincoln township. To be cleaned and deepened, has been surveyed and waiting for a time to attend to it.

12 "Spring Valley Drain" Niles township, located by the survey but waiting further proceedings.

13 A drain to be Located and Established in Lake township, extending through two or three sections, 23 and 26 and farther South.

The following named Drains have been applied for, but not established, during the year, for the reasons given in each instance, to wit:

1 "Ox Creek Drain" Benton Harbor, upon survey that was found impracticable by reason of insufficient fall for an outlet and too many obstructions also. Dismissed and waiting settlement.

2 "Galien River." Petition asked to have logs and drift wood cleaned out. The cost of removal would be too much for assessment district. Dismissed as impracticable.

3 An application on file for uniting the "Houser" and "Hendrix" and Wetzel drains under one name and to have them cleaned out as one drain, in Lake township. Necessity determined.

4 Petition for locating and establishing a drain in Watervliet, on County line of Berrien and Van Buren counties.

5 Application for cleaning, widening and deepening "Wilson Drain," in Watervliet township in Section 24.

6 Application for locating and establishing a drain in Section 33 in Benton township.

7 Application for cleaning out a drain name unknown to petitioner, in Benton township between Sections 15 and 22.

8 For locating and establishing a drain in Section 14 and 15 Pipestone.

9 For locating and establishing drain Section 8 Weesaw township.

10 Application for cleaning and deepening Hess drain in Weesaw.

11 Application for cleaning out Norris Lake drain in Weesaw.

12 Application for locating and establishing a drain in Lincoln beginning in Section 35.

13 Application for cleaning, deepening and widening "Morrow Drain No. 2, in Lincoln and Royalton townships.

14 Application for cleaning, widening and deepening "Richardson Drain" in Lincoln.

15 Bell and Yore Drain. For cleaning and deepening, Benton.

16 North Branch Bell and Yore.

17 Petition for Drain in Bainbridge along highway to drain sink hole. The above named Drain Applications have most of them had one visit, to determine necessity, and have been neglected only because there has been no time to do more than I have.

Two or three drains have taken so much time and attention that there was little time for any others.

And I do hereby certify that the above embraces a full and true report of all the Drains constructed, finished or begun under my supervision, or applied for during the year now ending, and that the financial statement of each Drain, which accompanies this report, is true and correct.

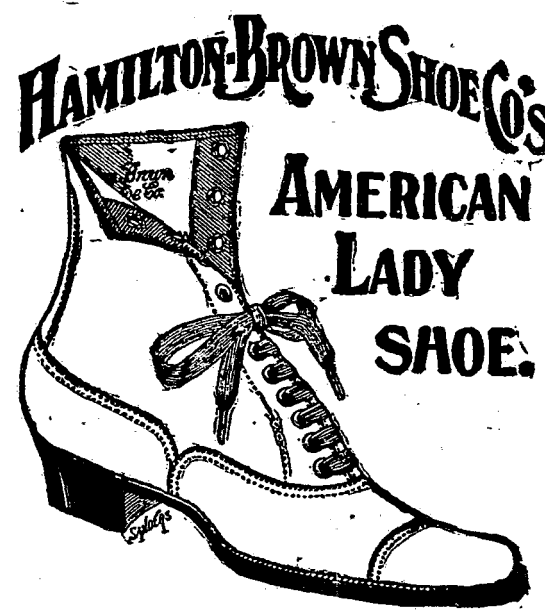
Blue in the Hydrangea.

American Gardening expresses the opinion that the color of Hydrangea hortensis around New York and a few neighboring cities was this year more generally blue than had been noticed for some years previous. The normal color is a clear, light pink, not by any means definitely fixed, but seemingly having a certain degree of intensity in individual plants. By many gardeners and, indeed, most amateurs the blue color is regarded as the acme of perfection. Blue in a flower always calls forth admiration. It is the rarest of all floral colors and besides its aesthetic value serves a purpose which renders it particularly valuable in small gardens. The effect of blue, as is well known, is to increase the apparent distance; thus blue in a landscape seems to add enormously to the depth of the view; therefore in a garden blue gives the effect of breadth and depth which is otherwise lacking.

Religion in Our Daily Lives.

There are a few ordained women who have made religion their life work, but there are too few women who make their life work a religion. We provide books for Sunday schools and for free libraries, but how many of us ever think of furnishing books for our own servants—books which could be of help to them, which would provide an evening's refreshment for their minds after their days of manual labor? In the mapping out of domestic arrangements many of us thoughtlessly have the heaviest cooking and do the most entertaining on the day of the week set apart as a day of rest. Nor can we escape the difficulty by ordering our Sunday meals from caterers, since we thus become responsible for the Sunday labor exacted from employees.
