



Lansing, Mich., Nov. 12.-Gov. Bliss to-day issued the following Thanksgiving proclamation: To the People of the State of Michigan; Greeting:

The year 1902 will soon have passed into history. It has been a year of wonderful prosperity for the nation, a prosperity in which Michigan has fully shared, in evidence of which is the development of new and the ex-

pansion of old industries, the general employment and contentment of her citizens, and the advancement of every material interest in which this state is concerned. It is meet that hands of Almighty God; therefore, in pursuance of the custom handed down by the fathers of the Republic, and in accordance with the authority vested in me, I do hereby designate and set apart Thursday, the 27th day of the present month, as a day in which to give praise to the divine Father for His mercies and to pray that He will continue, as in the past, to direct the destinies of this people, and aiding them in their great work as a liberty loving and liberty giving nation Around the Thanksgiving altars in the churches and homes of Michigan let reunited families assemble to renew home ties and associations, so that the day may increase in its value for good.


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

God and His truth and His worship and who is working so hard in our day in many theological seminaries and pulpits to turn people away from God. 14, 15. Whithersoever they went out the hand of the Lord was against them for evil, as the Lord had said, \* \* \* and they were greatly distressed.

The testimony of one of their rulers about a thousand years after this was, "The hand of our God is upon all them for good that seek Him, but His power and His wrath is against all them that forsake Him" (Ez. viii, 22). In Lev. xxvi and Deut. xxviii God gave an abundant warning as to what He would do if they forscok Him, but for all this they sinned still and believed not for His wondrous works. They believed not in God and trusted not in His salvation (Ps. ixxviii, 32, 22). The whole Bible teaches that since sin entered the carnal mind is enmity against God; the heart is deceitful and desperately wicked; every imagination of his heart is only evil continually (Rom. viii, 7; Jer. xvii, 9; Gen. vi, 5).

16. Nevertheless the Lord raised up judges which delivered them out of the hand of those that spoiled them.

We have just referred to the wonderful sinfulness of man and his rebellion against God, but the Bible is full of the more wonderful love of God, who loved us even when we were dead in sins, who commendeth His love toward us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us (Eph. ii, 4, 5; Rom. v, 8). That "God is Love" is the great foundation truth of Scripture, and, being such. He is not willing that any should perish (I John iv, 8, 16; II Pet. iii, 9). Many a time He turned His anger away from this people, and, being full of compassion, He forgave their iniquity and destroyed them not (Ps. lxxviii, 38). He sought and found Adam and Eve when in their sin they turned away from Him, and He has ever since been seeking and saving the lost.

they went from bad to worse. But why pick out one state or a dozen or thirty-three when we know the result for the whole country? The preliminary census report on manufactures says that the increase in wage earners has been 25 per cent and the increase in wages 23 per cent. Here is an apparent slightly greater increase in wage earners than wages, but the increase in materials used has been 42 per cent, and as most of this is wages

It makes the increase in all wages considerably more than the increase in wage earners. Farm wages, too, have increased very much, and, besides all this, hours of labor have declined at least 10 per cent and in many industries 15 and 20 per cent. In fact, then, our wage earners in greatly increased number are getting more for eight and nine hours' labor in 1900 than they did for nine and ten hours' labor in 1890. Mr. Holt's calculations and figures are not only all wrong, but absurdly so. There is no consistency in his article, as he uses his percentages at random, as a child does his first blocks, and his structure topples over at the slightest breath of truth. The portion of his article given to wages is wholly wrong and worthless.

As regards prices, we admit that some kinds of food are dearer today than five years ago, or in 1890; but rents are no higher and clothing is no dearer, and as every one is fully employed and our wage earners are getting several billions more than a few years ago they can well stand the increased cost of some food, which price all comes back from the prosperous farmer.

Don't worry, Mr. Holt, because pig iron and steel rails are higher. Neither freight nor passenger rates have increased, but, on the contrary, are on the decline constantly. Even the capitalist does not suffer, for his railway shares are worth more and his dividends are larger than ever before. This increased cost of living argument worked in 1892, but it won't work in 1902. Neither the farmer nor the laborer wants to live over again the low priced. cheap, poorly paid labor days of free trade times from 1893 to 1897.



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

Corn For the Silo. Corn should be put into the silo when it is almost ready to cut and can be put in at the time it is ripe enough to cut with good results. Formerly it was thought best to cut corn when rather green for silage, but later prac- tice leans toward the stage of ripeness —just before it begins to dry out and the stalks become woody.
