A thrilling rescue was that of Mrs. J. Shepard. Her 10-year-old son caught her about the waist when dreading death by fire she was about to leap out of a fourth-story window. 'Stop, mamma," he cried; "I know they will help us." The boy had only uttered this last remark when the firemen, under command of Captain Benjamin Conners, placed the ladder against the side of the building and started to the rescue. But as she stepped on the ladder it swayed and she fell two stories to the roof of Vogelsang's below. She was not badly hurt.

What can be done in a case like this by having a cool head is exemplified by what J. A. Westerland did. Edward Davenport occupied the same room with him. When he woke he threw a mattress to the roof of Vogelsang's and then forced Davenport to jump for it. Then he found E. G. Baker, of Nashville, Mich., and making a rope of sheets lowered him to the roof; Baker unconscious all the time.

HOW THE BLAZE GOT A START

There Were Several Ways, According to Experts-Warning the Imperiled.

How the fire started is at this writing any one of several ways. One expert says it was from a pan of sulphur fired to drive vermin away. Another says a lighted cigar stump was thrown into some shavings left by a carpenter. However it may have been one thing is certain, and that is that before the fire was detected an immense volume of smoke had spread through the rooms on the fourth floor, suffocating and blinding those who slept there. Coroner Traeger said: "The fire was

undoubtedly caused by the explosion of an oil stove in the rear of the third floor. The building is very carelessly constructed, the fire-escape is worthless, the rooms are outrageously small. and it is nothing short of a crime that such a building should have been used as a housing place for human beings." One hundred and one persons registered Wednesday evening, and these, in addition to the guests who arrived earlier in the week, filled the house. E. C. Weber was the night clerk. and it was just before 6 a.m. that Weber's nostrils detected the odor of smoke, and he looked about him. Down the stairway a thick cloud rolled and spread, itself throughout the of fice. In a minute Weber was awake to the situation, and he vaulted over the counter shouting "Fire!" at the top of his voice. But it was too late to carry the warning back among the sleeping rooms, so Weber hurried down the stairs to a fire-alarm box.






