IN MEMORIAM

JULIA ATWOOD SMITH

Who was the daughter of Horace and Samantha Atwood, was born at Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, April 14, 1837 and departed this life March 14, 1903 aged 65 years and 11 months.

She removed with her parents from Ohio to Indiana and from there to Michigan, when 14 years old. She was married first to Frank Colbetzor, who died in the service of his country and by whom she had two children, Milton and Charlie, neither of whom survive, both dying in youth. She later married Henry Smith. Mrs. Smith was baptized by Elder D. R. Mansfield over 40 years ago, and at the time of her death was a member of the Larger Hope church.

She leaves behind one sister and five brothers beside many friends, to mourn her departure.

The funeral services were held at the home of the deceased Tuesday morning and were conducted by Elder Charles Shook of the Advent Christian Church.

ORSON O. BRONSON

Was born near Akron, Ohio, on the twenty fifth day of August, 1841.

In the summer of 1852, his father, Dennison Bronson and family moved to Michigan, locating in Bertrand township, three miles west of Niles. Here Orson Bronson lived till he was thirty years of age. He enlisted in the artillery service of the Union army during the latter part of the Civil war and served till the close.

Later he spent nearly two years in Kansas. In December, 1871, he was married to Mary E. Sparhawk, at Carbondale, Kansas. Returning to Michigan, he resided on a farm in Niles township till 1890. In the spring of that year the family moved to Niles, where the wife and mother died.

During the past twelve years he lived at his home in Buchanan township, where he died March 11, 1903, at the age of 61 years, six months, and fifteen days. He is survived by three sisters, Ada and Minerva Bronson of Niles, and Ida Bronson of Rawlins, Wyoming, also by his four children, Harry Bronson of Elmira, Michigan, Velna and Maurice Bronson of Buchanan, and Arla Bronson of Los Angeles, California.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Niergarth at the home of the deceased, two miles west of Buchanan at one o'clock Sunday with interment in Niles cemetery.

The community has lost a peaceful neighbor and a good citizen. Much sympathy is expressed for all the bereaved ones especially for Miss Arla, who was so far away, and unable to return for the funeral.

MR. JOHN GOGLE

Son of Christian and Anna Gogle was born in Trown Stein, Ober Bayern Germany, January 1, 1829 and died in Dayton, Michigan, March 11, 1903, aged 81 years, 2 months and 11 days.

When twenty eight years of age he left his home in Germany and landed in New York City during the month of July 1850. Immediately he went to Indiana where he procured work in South Bend, as miller. In the year 1852 he was united in marriage to Miss Pheba Harding, who died in 1853 leaving one infant son, Carl, of three months. In 1856 he was married to Amarette Rose Williams and 1861 they removed to Dayton, Michigan and lived more than 40 years in the house where he died.

To this union two sons were born, George and John, who preceded the father into the better world. His second wife having died in 1867 he was again united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth C. Schmidt, who now survives him and deeply mourns a kind husband. To them was born one child who died in infancy.

Besides his sorrowing wife, he leaves to mourn for him two grand children, Maurice and Gladys, children of his son, John, who reside in Middletown, Michigan, a step daughter, Mrs. Alva Stryker, child of his second wife.

Mr. Gogle was a devoted father, a kind neighbor and was esteemed by all who knew him. Although on his arrival in America he could not speak one word of English, he mastered the language and by his perseverance gained distinction in the community where he resided. For many terms in succession he held the office of Justice of Peace and other offices of responsibility.

For some years he has been quite feeble but always ready to lend a

helping hand and to do his share in making a pleasant home. Only the day before his death he met a number of his acquaintances in the Post Office and greeted them with kindly cheer as of old.

In childhood he was brought up in the Catholic faith and had utmost respect for his parents because of their sincerity and belief in Christ. His wish had been to depart from this life without a struggle and it was granted. On Wednesday morning, day of his death, before he had arisen, his wife heard a moan and when she reached his side he had departed without one word.

The funeral services, conducted by Rev. R. H. Allsopp of Niles, were held at the home of the deceased, Saturday morning at ten o'clock. A large number of friends gathered to pay their respect. Those from abroad who attended were nieces, Mrs. Mina Myer of Grand Rapids, Miss Crisse Smith of Saginaw and his grandson, Maurice, of Middleville. Burial took place at Mt. Zion cemetery.




