MARRIAGE **INDUSTRY**

Investigated by Some of the State Legislators.

The following representatives were visitors at St. Joseph on Saturday; Representatives R N.Adams, of Chippeway; Gideon T. Werline, of Menominee; Archibald McEachern, of Mackinac; Nathan V. Lovell, of Eau Claire and James B. Knight, of Dickinson county. They spent the forenoon in the office of County Clerk Church, going over the marriage records. If reports are true the investigation will make votes against the Van Zoeren bill which is directed ragainst St. Joseph marriage industry. 'The impression has prevailed that the marriage industry at St. Joseph was pernicious which led us to investigate and we have discovered the follow ing: That the ages of those who come from Chicago and elsewhere to St Joseph to be married average 5 years older than those of the county.

It has been said that the divorce courts of Chicago are full on account of the Michigan Marriages. An affidavit from each of the clerks in the seven chancery courts of Chicago says that there has been no increase in the · divorce cases owing to Michigan marriages for the past five years

The persons procuring licenses from · abroad are asked their street address, . and a number have been communicated with, and in every case they are happy and contented There has never been a complaint from any relative of persons married at St. Joseph from sabroad while there are frequent complaints from those in the county. When the number of persons visiting St. Joseph each season are considered, the percentage of marriages are smaller than the average of home marriages. 

INJUNCTION REFUSED.

The United States Court at Grand Rap ids Refused a Temporary Injunction Preventing Chas. A. Chapin From Transmitting Power Pending the Hearing for a Permanent Injunction.

The village of Buchanan have through their attorneys applied to the Circuit court of Berrien County for a permanent injunction restraining Chas. A. Chapin from transmitting power from his power house on the St. Joseph river outside the corporate limits of the village of Buchanan. A number of citizen, taxpayers in the village of Buchanan, also applied to the U.S. Court for a similar injunction, also for a temporary injunction pending the hearing which was not allowed. In the mean time Chapin will go on transmitting the power pending the decision in the courts. It will not in any way affect the final







DEATH OF DR. COLLINS. Well Known Man Passes Away-Bu-

chanan His Home for Many Years.

The decease of this remarkable man is an event that should receive more than a passing notice. Almer Marsena, son of Nathanael and Caro line Collins, was born in Buchanan, Michigan May 18, 1844. December 17, 1857 he was baptized by the writer and at once took membership in the Christian church. He began to preach when 14 years old, and he continued in the ministry of the gospel until overtaken by his last sickness He spent considerable time in the

latter part of his life in the practice of medicine, but he almost invariably preached somewhere every Lord's day.

As a speaker and orator he was eminently gifted. In the judgement of the writer he never heard him excelled as a preacher or lecturer. As a lecturer on temperance he accomplished some of his most efficient and telling work.

When the writer was serving as pastor of the Christian church in thirty thousand inhabitants, Dr. A. M Collins was called by the ladies of the W. C. T. U to the city to lectare on Temperance. He lectured daily, and sometimes twice daily for six consecutive weeks and never repeat d a single lecture. Every lecture seemed new and was deeply instructive. His fund of knowledge

beaming upon the matter of temperance seemed to be inexhaustible. The city was stirred from center to circumference as never before. "The Silver Tongued Orator of Kentucky". John B. Gough of world wine reputation, Mrs. Ellen Foster and other most noted temperance lecturers had put forth their best efforts to create an interest on the temperance question in the city of Davenport, but Dr. Collins excelled them all. As an author Dr. Collins wrote several books on Temperance that are of more than ordinary value He also wrote a valuable treatuse on the name Christian. He was a fine mathematician and he prepared an interesting book that was for a time quite extensively used. He had planned to write a book of sermons that he might thus preserve many of the rich gems of thought that so grandly adorned his spoken sermons, but death cut short the execution of this noble intention and many will suffer loss on this account. I give some extracts from one of his last letters. My dear father in Christ: "Your good kind letter come this morning and it was read with great pleasure and awakened some of the most prec ious memories of life. It found me still sick. l do not know whether I will ever be able to preach again or not. Sometimes I give up all hope. I have been near to death and am not afraid to die. I do want to get well for the sake of my dear wife who is one of the noblest and best women God ever made, she has been so good to me duing my long sickness. I would have been well long ago if the doctor had not given me so much morphine, that is what has made my sickness so severe and so hard to manage. I have suffered a thousand deaths. I had a good cry when I read your dear fatherly letter, and thoughts of those happy days come up before me. Those were blessed days, but they are gone forever, we shall never see their like again. I do want to see you once more in the flesh. I would throw my arms around you and kiss your aged lips over and over again and tell you how to the last I have loved my dear. father in the gospel. During my sickness I have tried to reconsecrate myself to God and I feel that he has fully accepted me If I should live to preach again it will be with greater spirituality and power than ever before. Pray for me." The above letter was written to me by Dr. Collins.

borne for the past few years, for very rarely would he ever speak of his troubles. He was a great student and took great delight in reading good literature and good books and never was more pleased than when some friend would take to him some good book to read. He realized the past few days that he could not long survive and told his friends about him that all was bright for him ou the other side. He was conscious up to the last. Just before going he said: "I judge from appearances I am going to a land which has none of the inconveniences of this. Dr. Collins was a graduate of three medical colleges: The Old Ohio, The Eclectic Medical College of Cincinnati, Ohio, and the Miami Medical College of Ohio. 'He was also a classical graduate of Hillsdale

in the degrees of Bachelor and Master of Arts. While at Hillsdale he made his home with Schuyler Colfax who taking great interest in him; became his warm friend.

While in the state of Ohio he was made editor in chief of the Northwestern News, became leader of the prohibition party, made a vigorous Davenport, Iowa, a city of some canvas of the state upon that issue and carried the state for the prohibition cause.

He occupied a prominent place in the counsels of the brotherhood, being associated with such men as Isaac Errett, Benj. Franklin, Governor Bishop of Ohio, and W. T. Moore of London, England, and was on the firing lines with these men in all the battles for reform.

As a preacher he was always and eminently successful, believing strongly the Bible was the word of God and preached it without compromise ormental reservation; instrumental in leading thousands to the Christ way of the cross.

To Irish Tenants to Assist Them to Purchase Farms for Themselves.

WYNDHAM'S LAND BILL IS READ

Measure Intended to Assist in the tionalist members. Pacification of Ireland.

John Redmond Seems Fairly Well Satisfied with It, but Wants Some Changes-Political Love Feast.

London, March 26.—The Irish secretary, Wyndham, introduced the government's long anticipated Irish land bill in the house of commons yesterday afternoon. It proposes a free grant of \$60,000,000 for the purposes of the bill. Tenants are to pay 3¼ per cent. interest on loans from the government. Wyndham said he thought the scheme would not involve \$500,000,000, but that \$750,000,000 could safely be advanced on Irish land. The advances to tenants are limited to \$2,500 in the congested districts and \$5,000 elsewhere. The bill also provides that untenanted farms and grazing lands shall be sold to neighboring tenants, and that three commissioners, to be known as estate commissioners, shall supervise the sales.

Three Commissioners Are Named. The names of the three commissioners are Michael Finucane, secretary to the government of Bengal revenue, general and statistical department; Fredeick S. Wrench, now one of the Irish land commissioners, and William F. Bailey, one of the assistant commissioners on the Irish land question. They will be under the control of lord lieutenant of Ireland. . The bill will become effective Nov. 12.

House Full at the Introduction.

The keen interest felt in this new legislation, which, it is hoped, will promote peace and contentment in Ireland, was shown by the crowded house. 'The peers' gallery and the distinguished strangers' gallery were filled, and there has been no such gathering of members of parliament since the opening of the session. Almost every Irish peer listened to Wyndham'sexposition of the bill. From an early hour in the morning the stone benches from the house of commons entrance to the doors of the lobby were packed with impatient Irishmen, among whom were many priests. Inside the legislative chamber the galleries were crowded as has not been the case for many a day.

HE TAKES HIS OWN LIFE

HECTOR MACDONALD A SUICIDE

Tragic Sequel of the Charges of Immorality Preferred Against the Great Soldier.

Paris, March-26. — Major General Hector MacDonald, commanding the British forces in Ceylon, and one of the foremost officers in the British army, against whom charges based on immoral acts were filed some time ago, committed suicide yesterday at the Hotel Regina here. He shot himself in the right temple, shortly after noon, and expired in a few minutes later. The general was alone in his small chamber on the Mezzanine floor of the hotel at the time of the tragedy. One of the female attendants heard the pistol shot and opening the door saw the general's figure strethced out on the floor with the blood gushing from a bullet wound in the head. She ran screaming to the balcony overlooking the lobby of the hotel where many guests, including a number of ladies, were assembled.

No money or papers of any kind were found in Sir Hector's baggage. Two notes written in English were found lying on a table in his room, but it is understood that their contents have no bearing on the suicide. In the general's coat, lying on the bed.

Withdraws, His, Resignation and Is Still President of Venezuela by Request of Congress.

Caracas, March 26.-After reading his special message to congress yesterday. Gen. Castro withdrew his resignation of the presidency of Venezuela. President Castro's special message was delivered yesterday afternoon. He says: "When I abdicated it was not from any small-minded nor interested calculation, still less was it the result of any sorry or ridiculous farce which has no place in a heart warmed by the heat of great ideals."

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DAVITT HEARS THE BILL READ

Redmond Is Noncommittal, but Sympathetic-Notable People.

Michael Davitt, the "father" of the Land League, celebrated his 57th birthday by re-entering the house for the first time since he ceased to be a member, in order to hear the chief secretary for Ireland unfold his plans. For the most part the Liberal members sat glum, the applause coming from the Irish benches. A hush of expectation fell on the assembly as John Redmond, the Irish leader, rose to speak. If he refused to countenance the bill its death, and perhaps even the government's downfall, was decreed. When the galleries of the house found him sympathetic and noncommittal a feeling of relief pervaded on all sides.

What Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the Liberal leader, and the others said had little effect. Even T. W. Russell, who with others criticised the details and various alleged omissions in Wwndham's plan, wound up with a guttural and reluctant admission that "it is a great bill." .

The passage of the first reading of the bill was followed by a rush to the lobby, where ensued scenes that might well make the ghost of Parnell turn in his grave. The tall form of Lord Dudley, lord lieutenant of Ireland, could be seen amidst a crowd of Nationalists who scarcely a year ago would rather have suffered every penalty than associate with the official head of the Irish government. Beside Lord Dudley stood the grizzled little Sir Anthony McDonnell, the first Nationalist assistant Irish secretary. He it was who drafted the bill.

Horace Plunkett, Lord Iveagh, Lord Ashbourne and many Unionist members joined the group. The Duke of "Abercorn, the most powerful landlord in Ireland, asked to be introduced to John Redmond, and a mutual friend brought the duke to the leader of the Nationalist party, with whom the leader of the Irish landlords heartily shook hands and they patched up the peace of Ireland over the house of commons refreshment bar.



In San_Diego, California.

March 2, 1903. MR. EDITOR:--I promised a grea many friends when I left home that I would write to them about this country, but I find there is so much to see, so much that is new to learn and investigate, that my time has been largely taken up in sightseeing, so ask you to be generous and answer al my friends through the medium of your paper which reaches them all and many more beside, who will not object I am sure to hearing something about this wonderful country.

To begin with I came here much _prejudiced against the place as I had been told there was nothing to this end of the state but sand and fleas, no harbor, no back country, in fact nothing worthy a trip to see, but I have at every point been most agreeably disappointed. The first man I met said to me, "It is worth \$250 a day to live in such a climate," and I want to say that I never expect to find a more perfect one in any of my travels. You would not believe it, but here in February it is comfortable in one's shirt sleeves and the selfregistering theremometer shows that the warmest day of the year was in January and the next warmest in August when it touched 64. The weather is a perfect charm and the tention to do. I have not time, if I could in the radius of every ten miles east to tell you of all the strange trees, from the city of San Diego, which is admirably located on a bay some ly, it looks like a great greenhouse twenty-five miles in extent, where the commerce of the world might ride in safety. I will begin with a brief description of the country immediately, surrounding the city, which of course I can only imperfectly give in one letter. The city is built along the gently sloping hills that run down to the bay where the largest ships laden with coal, cement, and lumber from Australia and the coast with occasional steamers from the Orient that discharge their interesting cargoes for all parts of the United States. The city commands a delightful view of the bay, the protected entrance at Point Loma on whose precipitous sides is located fort Rosecrans with its great fortifications and disappearing guns, at the water front near by, The government is spending thousands in constructing military bar racks, quarantine station, and on the opposite North Island extensive military reservations are to be a part of the great work of future fortifications. and near by is the marine ways where vessels of large size are taken from the water and cleaned and repaired. War vessels, several together, are interest. often in the harbor. This is a favorite place for rest and pleasure for the crews of the Pacific squadron. The city is well laid out, has miles of paved streets and excellent electric street car service, equipped with modern conveniences and in addition observation cars, which I have not noticed in any other city. These transfer you for many miles each way and at one of the terminals you get a look at the Mission Valley, a glimpse of the buildings erected by the padres nearly two centuries ago; the San Diego River the unfailing source of the city's water supply. 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

At present we are having exceedingly high water, the Mississippi River, at this point is about thirty miles wide and we are now living on elevated places owing to the water being twenty inches in the house. The railroads at Birds Point are abandoned as the water is two feet over the rails.

We have not had any mails here since last Wednesday. Many people have been drowned owing to the river's rising so fast, the people could not get out of the bottom lands, all business is stopped. The river is slacking some now, it has risen but one inch in the last twelve hours. The river at Cairo, Illinois is fifty feet high today.


