Practical Illustration of What can be Done When An Effort is Made.

PHENOMENAL PROGRESS

When it is Considered That Only Three of the Members Ever Played in a Band Before.

About one year ago, less than half dozen of the young men of Buchanan had an inspiration that they ought to organize a band. Not one of them had ever played in a band before and but two of the originals, Chac. A. Phillips and Arlin Clark

A great deal of credit is due to A.

to other fields before the band was even started.

Sometime in March or April of 1902, the first meeting was held in a room back of Sunday's barber shop and those present were: A. W. Roe, Chas. A. Phillips, Clarence Runner, Mathew Beistle, Geo. and Jesse East. At this meeting was born a determination to organize a band. The boys started out to get recruits In about a week another meeting was held with more than twice the number present, who were willing to join the band even if they did not know a note;—for they wanted to join, and when a fellow wants to accomplish anything he generally succeeds

As only Phillips, and Clark had instruments the next thing to do was to secure some. Clarence Runner was the first; he bought a snare drum; then Mat. Beistle bought a slide trombone and Louis Runner an alto horn. So one by one the instruments were knew how to play. Geo. East and secured. > There was a man in the town who might be secured, but being naturally of a retiring disposition, with a modist opinion of his worth he was not in haste to accept the repeated invitation to become leader, but finally he took a look into the place and saw the zeal of the boys and decided to become their leader, a position he has held ever since. This person is Henry Dickinson. Mr. Dickinson has had about 15 years experience in band work, having been leader of several. He was born and reared in the vicinity of Colon, St. Joseph county, and he has shown remarkable skill in bringing the band from having absolutely no knowledge to its present state where all our people look upon it as something to be justly proud of. Mr. Dickinson is not only a master in his art but he is also a man of most exemplary habits, with a character that would be well for any of the boys to follow as they do his musical

One thing that is worthy of special mention is that a large number of the band are still under 21 years of age.

It is due also to mention that C. A. Hallock and his son, Eugene, joined the band early in its start and were a great benefit as they both had previous experience in other bands.

On Thursday, July 3, through in formation secured from one of the band the RECORD announced that the band would make its debut that evening and without a doubt one of the largest crowds on the streets, last year, gathered to hear them. 8 o'clock then 8:15 and 8:30 passed by and no band. A rumor was being circulated that they would not play, and a RECORD representative slipped into the hall to discover what was going to be done. Almost on getting inside he learned that they would play. Mr. Dickinson being away, the band was led by Geo. East and from that night the future success of the band was assured. When the Pere Marquette took over the Milwaukee, Benton Harbor & Columbus railroad company two months ago they changed the time in a successful mercantile business, of running trains so that the passenger trains would leave Buchanan in Master under Harrison. 



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
