New King of Servin Also Hears from Russia That the Regicides Must Ro Punished.

Geneva, June 19.-King Peter attended a solemn Te Deum at the Russian chapel here. The Russian consul general and many Russians and Servians were present. The arch-priest received the king at the entrance to the church and sprinkled him with holy water. The king then kissed the cross and the arch-priest prayed for the prosperity of Servia."

St. Petersburg, June 19.-An official note published in The Gazette recognizing Prince Karageorgevitch as king of Servia and welcoming his accession. In brief, the note declares that it is incumbent upon King Peter to avenge the assassins of King Alexander and Queen Draga, and expresses the conviction that he will know how to severely punish the regicides.





Proves an Ideal Resort Within Easy Reach of South Bend.
