DEATH OF WELL KNOWN RESIDENT.

Aged Citizen Passed Away Saturday.

George Royal-Treat was born in Monroe Co. New York, Nov. 27, 1823, died June 27, 1903, aged 79 years,

In 1844 he moved to Modina Co. Ohio, where he worked at his trade as wagon maker. In 1850 he moved to Buchanan where he has since resided. His first twenty years here were spent in railroading, two years as section boss and eighteen years as freight agent, resigning this position on account of poor health. The balance of his active life was occupied in grocery business and farming.

He was married three times. The first time Jan. 1, 1845 -to Marietta Merrill who died May 6, 1849, and on April 10, 1853 to Theodalinda Cooper who died Aug. 28, 1855, and on June 17, 1858 to Mary E. Baker who died Sept. 7, 1902. Hermon L. Treat and Marietta Redden are children of the first marriage, Chas. B. Treat of the second, and Frank A., Willis W., Alta and Del Treat, Effie Hathaway and Lucy Wynn of the third, all of whom are living, except Hermon L. Treat who died June 11, 1863. He had two sisters and three brothers. All have died except Wm. Treat who now resides in Brooklyn, Ohio.

ESTABLISH AN ASYLUM

Flying Rollers Have Established One at Benton Harbor for Children.

The peculiarities of the chuch of Israel as they gather at Benton Harbor oftimes startles Benton Harbor people. This sect still insists that Benton Harbor will be the meeting point where Christ will, during the three years, greet his 144,chosen ones. Every week notes the arrival of a new party either from the western coast or some point in the extreme east or south.

The latest startling announcement made by this sect was that no children were allowed to remain in any home of the people but an asylum has been established on Colifax avenue where today twenty little ones ranging from one year to sixteen years of age, are housed. Over these an aged man and woman have charge, but the startling cries that come from the overcrowded house has brought complaints from neighbors and Humane Officer Whitehead has been called to investigate the condition of affairs. In as much as the representatives of the children of Israel are very humane in their appearance it is presumed that Whitehead found the asylum properly kept.

The parents are allowed to visit their children but the order from Benjamin, who is at the head, is that the little ones must be kept in this asylum The order is also issued that as far as possible no more children will be brought into the world but that the mothers and fathers will hereafter use their best energies in providing food and clothing for the masses who are gathering here from all parts of the globe.—Banner Register.

Hillsdale College Celebrates.

The celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the laying of the corner stone of Hillsdale College recalls the Political Campaign of 1857. The friends of the college sought the power to confer degrees, which had been to that time reserved to institutions supported by the state, and promoted the nomination and election of the President, Edmund B. Fairfield, as Lieutenant Governor. The general college law then passed by the Legislature primarily in the interest of Hillsdale has since then been applied to other colleges of the state. The founders of the college at Hillsdale did pioneer work of a fundamental sort both in this law and in equality of educational privileges regardless of sex, religion and race. The semi-centennial will elicit aftention because of its hearing upon the history of the state.
