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

Romē, July 10. — Since his illness the pope had not begun a day as satisfactorily as yesterday. Indeed, hopes of his recovery reached such a point as to make the general public believe the pontiff might soon be out of danger. No better synthesis of this view could be given than the words Dr. Lapponi uttered on leaving the sick room at about noon-that'although he did not yet date to hope he had perhaps ceased to despair. This promising outlook, however, was followed by the startling announcement that the pope had been attacked with diarrhoea, apparently caused by the large quantity of food he had taken, and that a consulting physician had been sent for. Dressed Himself with Little Help.

The patient when he began the day showed once more his iron mountaineer fiber by rising and dressing almost without assistance, walking across the room to his arm chair and having his toilet fully performed, even to the detail of being shaved. Throughout this procedure the pope showed no sign of being exhausted. Indeed, he jokingly alluded to the amount of nourishment which was being imposed upon him and said: "I ought to grow fat, as I have never had in my life as much as I get now."

His Mental Faculties Unimpaired.

This buoyancy of spirit was considered to be one of the principal coefficients in the struggle with death which this admirable old man has made in the last seven days. The doctors, previous to the alarming attack of the afternoon, said there was not the slightest diminution in the acuteness of the pontiff's mental faculties, as shown in a remarkable manner when the pope insisted on going over some of the larger questions of church policy laid before him by Cardinal Rampolla, the papal secretary of state.

NEWS WAS A THUNDERBOLT

Long Consultation Shows That the Worst is the Only Thing to Expect.

The news of the sudden relapse of the pope, the consultation of physicians, and the alarming bulletin which followed, was an unexpected thunderbolt in what had already become, in the public feeling, an unclouded sky. The idea now prevails that this brings to a definite end all of the bright hopes which were cherished. CONDITION OF ROADS.

Old Resident Tells how They Were Back in the 40's.

The roads leading from Buchanan in 1842 were so different from what they are now that a description of them would put some of the old settlers thinking and the younger part wondering. So we will go to Niles first. The best short way was to go to Bainton's mill as now known,then Dutton's saw mill,- and cross McCoy's creek, by driving across the dam and then southeast to the house on the Ogden farm,-there was no house there then,-and cross the road about 4 rods before turning northeast which course was kept about 25 rods up to a large beech tree, where one must leave the road long enough to tell of the large crop of beech nuts that tree produced nearly every fall. Myself and other boys would take sheet and while two held it one would go up the tree by the others lifting him so that he could get hold of the drooping limbs first and then he could go around and knock down 1 bushel of the nuts on the sheet in 30 minutes, of course they fell shucks and all and we had a job of picking them over and sorting them.

From that tree straight east 10 ro'ds and then went northeast enough to strike the road just south of the south line of the Vanderslice farm, theu straighteast 80 rods, then southeast 80 rods, then northeast 80 rods back to the present road at the corner of the field north of the first house east of Mr. Vanderslice's, then 4 mile straight east and then an other just such a bend south and back north as before described and one comes into the road just east of Lem Blake's house; then it was straight east to the brick school house on what was then called Brookfield's corner. From there one went southeast 80 rods to the top of the hill, to the brickyard, then north 'east to the river bridge just where the upper bridge now stands (not counting the one up by the dam.) The highway was laid out in a straight line east,

the street some 10 or 15 rods west of the brick school house, he will see an old fashioned frame house standing back, north from the street much faither than the rest, that was Job Brookfield's farm house then, and I think never has been moved,at the brick yard was, also a house. Dr. Richerson lived on the hill just east of Froot's grocery store and that was all the dwelling houses this side of the river at Niles at that time, but there, was a large frame house just south of Dr. Rickerson's place, said to have been erected by the state for a seminary. It was 40 by 60 feet on the ground and I think 3 stories high, and as I see no account of it in Cowles' history of Niles, published 1871, I mention it here;-the building never was finished but went to rain. I think I should tell something to explain why some of the houses were back off the highway so far, and what took others into the woods to clear up a farm when they could have been found on more open land; it was good spring water; 'Mr Pitman had a nice spring near his house, N Hathaway settled on his place for

UNION OF EMPLOYERS

Planned Under a Constitution Formulated for the National Manufacturers.

NO BUSINESS MAN TO BE BARRED

And All Organizations of Employers To Be Federated to Fight Aggressive Labor.

Indianapolis, July 10.-If the purpose of the committee on constitution of the National Manufacturers' association is approved by the executive committee and ratified by a vote of the members the organization will enlarge its scope and become the propaganda of aggressive ideas and methods in restraint of the tendencies of organized labo.; backed by a fund of \$1,-500,000. The executive committee, composed of President D. M. Parry. Indianapolis; J. W. Vancleve, St. Louis; John Ki by, Jr.; Dayton, O.; E. W. Du Bruel, Cincinnati; Major A. C. Rosencranz, Evansville, Ind., and Secretary Marshall Mushing, New York, finished a two days' session at the Claypool hotel after thoroughly going over a new constitution for the Manufacturers' association.

Takes in All Business Men.

The committee met responsive to a resolution adopted at the New Orléans convention last March, which p ovided for a new constitution, broadening the scope of the organization so that it would include employers other than manufacturers: Under the new constitution decided upon by the committee the name of the organization will be the National Association of Manufacturers and Employers. Instead of being limited to manufacturers it will open its doors to any one engaged in "legitimate business."

Also All Organized Business. There was much sentiment at the New O leans convention favoring the organization of the local and state organizations of employers into a national hody. The new constitution is intended to federate all. The Metal Trades' association and the Foundrymen's association and like organizatious may affiliate without minimizing their own work.

Then Comes the Tug-of-War. In short, it is a federation of the employers of the country to resist the aggression of organized labor through its federated organizations. It is in







but; owing to streams and ravines, was not completed, which made it necessary to take the round about course described.

The trees were all cut out of th highway, 4 rods wide, but in the road when winding around, the hills, only the under brush and old logs had been cut out of the way and every one had to around the trees as best he could the stumps were all left in the high way: as one came to the first crosswa or log road, in the hollow east of Storm's first place, about 8 rods long and very-rough, then 15 rods more just before one comes to the school house, there was a school house there then, though not so large as now. Then in the next hollow one encountered 60 rods in one line and rougher than any other. A person could leave Buchanan by going up the hill on what was called the angling road, now called Rynearson St. and follow the road until he crossed the creek just west of side track, then southeast before going up the hill and keep that course 80 rods, then northeast 100 rods and one would strike the other road about 20 rods east of Mr. Vanderslice's southwest corner. The first house on the road by the dam was on the Vanderslice place owned by N. Hathaway and another 80 rods from the road south owned by Benjamin Pitman, then ov er the hill, the first one stood 80 rods south of the road owned by David Fisk and one north of the road down close to the river owned by John Willett; the next on the first Storms' place, owned by Samuel Chambers, on the second Storms' place lived

That spring was used as a public watering place for teams on the road and nearly always there was a goard to drink from and a pail to water teams with, for the first 10 years aft ter 1842; then the travel became more divirsified, and the pails came

up missing so often the citizens near by could not afford to furnish them, but the spring was kept up in good shape for full 40 years; but now only the old settlers could tell just where the cold spring was that all teams after being once watered there, always looked for afterwards It is called 5 miles from Buchanan to Niles and that is the distance from Morley's corners at Buchanan to the 4 corners at the brick school house in Niles, by the government survey of sections of land and the spring was called half way.




