CUP IS SPIKED DOWN

Final Race for the America's Trophy Is the Expected Happening Again.

SHAMROCK IS LITERALLY NOWHERE

For She Is Lost in the Fog at the End—Spectacular Finish of the Reliance.

New York, Sept. 4.—The Reliance, the America's cup defender, has won the third and final race and the series for that famous sea trophy. In a dense fog which prevented vision beyond 200 yards she finished the race at 5:30:02 amid the acclamations of the assembled fleet.

This victory means that the cup is destined to remain in the United States until England is able to produce a genius equal to Herreshoff in yacht designing.

Reliance's Spectacular Finish. Rarely, if ever, has there been a more spectacular finish than the Reliance's. After racing for more than an hour at terrific speed through a blinding fog the Reliance burst through the wall of mist upon the vision of the spectators on the fleet assembled at the finish line, and heeling under a great bellying balloon jib topsail until her lee rail was awash flew across the finish line, almost before the spectators could determine for a certainty that it was she.

Jeopardy Favors the Reliance. When the yachts reached the lightship a gentle southeast wind of five knots, that barely wrinkled the surface of the sea, gave but faint promise that it was to be the final day, but a shift of the wind to the south shortly afterwards revived the despairing hopes of the yachtsmen.



THE SKIPPERS began at the sound of the preparatory gun and continued through a series of brilliant maneuvers, in which Captain Barr kept the Shamrock blanketed most of the time, while the result was that the boats did not get over the line until the handicap gun was fired, the Reliance just saving herself and the Shamrock losing three seconds.

Same Old Story of the Race. The race was the same old story. The Reliance, with nearly 2,000 square feet more sail area, drey away from the Shamrock from start to finish, and at the outer mark, after both out-pointing and out-footing the British boat, she was 11 minutes and 10 seconds ahead.

MOONEY VS. MITCHELL

Lively Labor Fight That Is Developing in the Southwestern U. M. W. Jurisdiction.

MINERS VIOLATE AN AGREEMENT

And the Operators Want to Know Who Controls the Men—Crisis Is Approaching.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 4.—T. J. Lewis, vice president of the United Mine Workers, sent by President John Mitchell to persuade the 600 striking coal miners in northeastern Missouri to return to work and live up to the Chicago agreement, is in the Novinger district.

Mooney Would Displace Mitchell. James Mooney, the district leader, who is regarded as responsible for the Novinger coal strike, is asserted to be holding out against John Mitchell to further his alleged aspirations for the presidency of the United Mine Workers. Mooney has, it is stated, worked at cross purposes with President Mitchell ever since before the Pittsburg (Kan.) conference, two months ago, when Mitchell went so far as to tell Mooney to sit down and keep still.

Demands of the Operators. The operators, furthermore, have told the national board of the United Mine Workers that they expect the board to control its own men, and that if it fails to do so they will be unable to deal with the officers of the national organization at the Kansas City conference next week, when it was hoped all differences would be wiped out. Thus the situation has developed into a question of authority.

DIRECTORS ARE NOT LIABLE

A. J. Cassatt and Others Are Acquitted in the Celebrated Case at Newark, N. J. Newark, N. J., Sept. 4.—Chief Justice Gummere, in the Essex county court of oyer and terminer, announced that he had decided to grant the motion for the dismissal of the indictment for manslaughter against the directors and officials of the North Jersey Street Railway company, who were accused of having, by alleged neglect of their duties, caused the death of Ernestine Miller.

Among the defendants was A. J. Cassatt, president of the Pennsylvania railway and other noted railway men. In instructing the jury to find a verdict of not guilty, the chief justice said that in order to hold the defendants criminally responsible it must be shown that they had failed to perform some specific act. This the state had failed to do, he said.

FATAL LOOP-THE-LOOP

Another Man Gets Into Trouble While Doing the Dangerous Feat Inclosed in a Globe.

St. Paul, Sept. 4.—The "Loop-the-Loop" sideshow at the fair grounds has claimed its second victim. Frank Futzin, the latest man to try the dangerous experiment, was injured and may die. The operator curls himself inside a large ball, which rolls down a long chute and around the loop. This time the ball struck the loop all right, and went half way round, when it fell, striking the iron rafters at the bottom, and burst open.

Fast Train Across the Continent.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 4.—Backed by the Union and Southern Pacific, Northwestern, New York Central, and Lake Shore, a plan is now on foot to run a train from coast to coast, and for this purpose a company is being organized with a capital of \$1,000,000 to furnish the equipment and handle the train. The train, it is calculated, will make the journey from ocean to ocean in from ten to twelve hours less than it can be done with the best connections at present.

The sleeves may be made elbow length with the deep cuff used, same as the cut. Corticelli sewing silk is generally used on a waist of this kind, which is made over an unboned lining of thin idea silk, and is hooked under the arm.

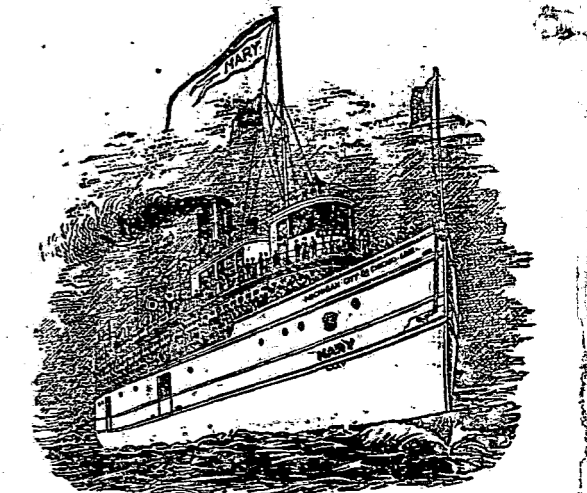
