

DIRECTORS ARE NOT LIABLE

A. J. Cassatt and Others Are Acquitted in the Celebated Case at Newark, N. J.

Newark, N. J., Sept. 4.-Chief Justice Gummere, in the Essex county court of over and terminer, announced that he had decided to grant the motion for the dismissal of the indictment for manslaughter against the directors and officials of the North Jersey Street Railway company, who were accused of having, by alleged neglect of their duties, caused the death of Ernestine Miller.

Among the defendants was A. J. Cassatt, president of the Pennsylvania railway and other noted railway men. In instructing the jury to find a verdict of not guilty, the chief justice said that in order to hold the defendants criminally responsible it must be shown that they had failed to perform some specific act. This the state had failed to do, he said.

FATAL LOOP-THE-LOOP

Another Man Gets Into Trouble While Doing the Dangerous Feat Inclosed in a Globe.

St. Paul, Sept. 4.-The "Loop-the-Loop" sideshow at the fair grounds has claimed its second victim. Frank Futzin, the latest man to try the dangerous experiment, was injured and may die. The operator curls himself inside a large ball, which rolls down a long chute and around the loop. This time the ball struck the loop all right, and went half way round, when it fell, strking the iron rafters at the bottom, and burst open. Futzin was taken out in an unconscious condition and hurried to the field hospital. The doctors fear that he has suffered concussion of the brain. 
### Lansing, Mich., Sept. 4.-State Game and Fish Warden Chapman reports twenty arrests for violations of the fishing and same laws during August. Nineteen offenders were convictcase. The fines and costs paid amounted to \$308.89. Says Wardon Chapman: "Twelve days were spent in visiting the most remote and least accessible fishing grounds in Michigan. The tug Dimick was chartered, and all of the fisheries on the south shore of Lake Superior were inspected, with the exception of those in Ontonagon county and at the extreme end of Kewcenaw Point.







Hotels at Kalamazoo Decline to Entertain Colored Delegates to a Conventiou.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Sept. 4.-Judson W. Lyons, register of the United States treasury, one of the leaders of the negro race, who was expected to take part in the convention of the Michigan Co-Operative Leaguein Kalamazoo next Monday, may find difficulty in securing hotel accommodations. A member of the local committee went to the Burdick House Tuesday and attempted to reserve a room for Lyons.

He\_was told the hotel management would not wish to reserve rooms so far in advance, as there was danger that all their rooms might be taken. The clerk of the hotel said that Lyons might find some difficulty in securing rooms, and thought that in the event of eventual refusal, the colored people would make a test and attempt to force the hotel management to give Lyons quarters during his stay.

His Arm Drawn Into the Press. Lansing, Mich., Sept. 4.-John Ralston, a well known young married man, suffered the amputation of his right arm as a result of an accident that happened in the Wynkoop, Hallenbeck, Crawford Co.'s press room. He attempted to brush some dirt from a form in the cylinder press, and his arm was drawn in, torn from its socket and crushed. The amputation was performed in the city hospital.

### STRIKES AT BRICKYARDS

Called in More Than Fifty Concerns Located in Five States.

Chicago, Sept. 4.—Brickmakers and the owners of the brickyards are at war. Strikes have been ordered in more than fifty yards in Illinois, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Indiana, and Ohio. Circular letters are being sent out from the office of George Hodge, national secretary, of the Brick, Tile and Terra Cotta Workers' alliance, at 155 Washington street, calling the attention of all organized labor to the long list of manufacturers on the "unfair list."
