Game Laws for 1903-4.

The following dates will be of interest to local sportsmen, as indicating the open season.

Deer—Nov. 8-30.

Fox, black and grey squirrels—Oct. 15 to Nov. 30.

Mink, racoon, skunk and muskrats—Nov. 1 to May 1.

Partridge, quail, spruce hen and woodcock—Oct. 20 to Nov. 30.

Ducks and geese and all wild water fowl—Oct. 1 to Nov. 30.

Jacksnipe, bluebill, canvasback, pigeon, pintail whistler, spoonbill, butterball and sawbill ducks may be killed from March 2 to April 10.

Mourning doves must not be killed at any time.

ELDER VEACH PREACHES

From the Steps of the Church on Sunday Morning.

The sun rose bright and clear on Sunday morning, and the church bells rang out peace on earth and good will to men, but the Christian church bell did not ring. As the hour of service arrived the only thing animate or inanimate around the Christian church sign, "keep off the grass."

Finally several persons arrived but Elder Veach was not in sight and it was thought perhaps he had decided to change his program, but a short time after the bells on the neighboring churches had ceased ringing the Elder was seen wending his way to the church. The door was found to be locked, but quickly and quietly a table and chair were secured from the residences nearby, while the audience began increasing, and the services proceeded as though nothing had happened.

Elder Veach made a statement saying that he had no intention of wrong doing and that this service was not for effect, but because of principle. There were perhaps twenty-five or thirty present with possibly as many more who were gathered around in the neighborhood out of curiosity, some who possibly had not heard a sermon for some time. Elder Veach announced that the services would be held as usual and if the church was locked they would be held at the parsonage. After the congregation was dismissed they stood about, a short time, then some one came and unlocked the door and about 50 persons gathered for Sunday school. The remainder of the day the church was closed.

A Correction.

As a correction to the items published in various papers, stating that the Trustees or Official Board of the Christian Church, were aroused to "anger and wrath," the members of the board wish to state that such was not the case, and that all they did was done with the kindest intentions, and with no thought of malice, and that which they were in duty bound to do, and considering that about seventy-five percent of the attending and contributing members of the congregation representing about eighty per cent of the support of the church, stated that they would not support Elder Veach, financially or otherwise, and in view of this he persistently refused to resign, the official Board took formal action on Thursday evening, Sept. 19, and dismissed him from service.

In regard to the contract by which Elder Veach was engaged as our pastor, he was engaged for one year, providing that he gave satisfaction, and we were able to meet our obligations in way of salary. Elder Veach, on being spoken to in regard to the terms of contract, stated that he did not care to see or hear them, and that he had fulfilled his part of the agreement, and intended to stay the remainder of the year, consequently the Official Board were forced to take the action they have taken.

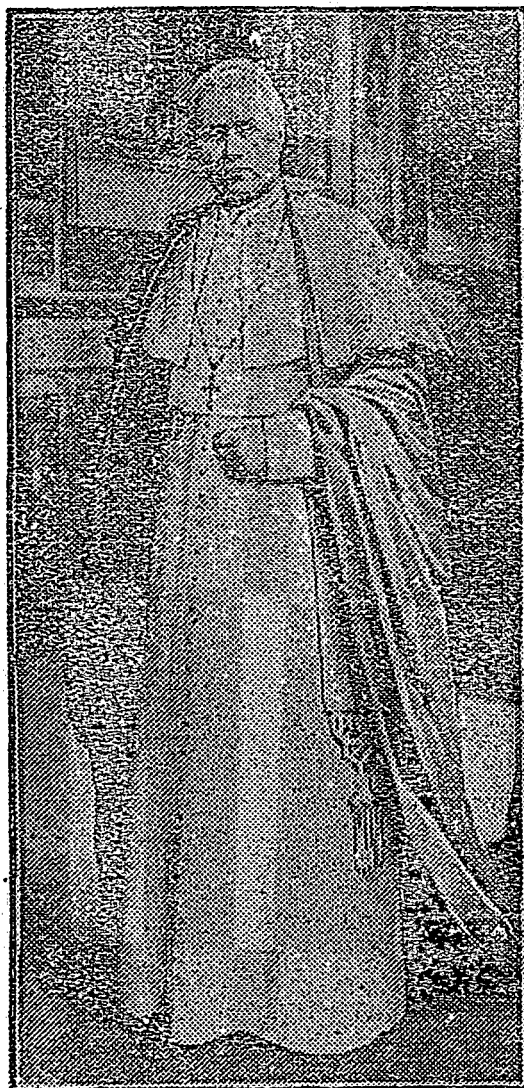
