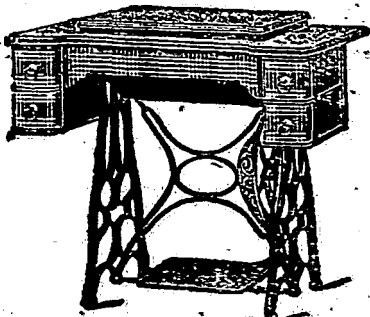

# Thanksgiving In Tslam

ONE might search the map for a week without finding the town of Tslam, though it is an important shipping port in the logwood district of Yucatan, that part of Mexico which is nearest to the island of Cuba—that is, it is quite important for a port without any people to speak of—and the reason why it would not be detected is that the first two letters of Tslam, the T and s, are replaced by an inverted C, which has the same "power" in pronunciation. The United States consul in Merida, the capital of Yucatan, promised me that if I would lie over another steamer instead of proceeding directly to Vera Cruz and the City of Mexico he would celebrate Thanksgiving day, which fell due in the interval, in a fitting and appropriate manner. He would not tell me exactly how he intended to do it, but I knew him well enough to feel assured of something novel in store and so postponed the trip to Vera Cruz and placed myself unreservedly in his hands.

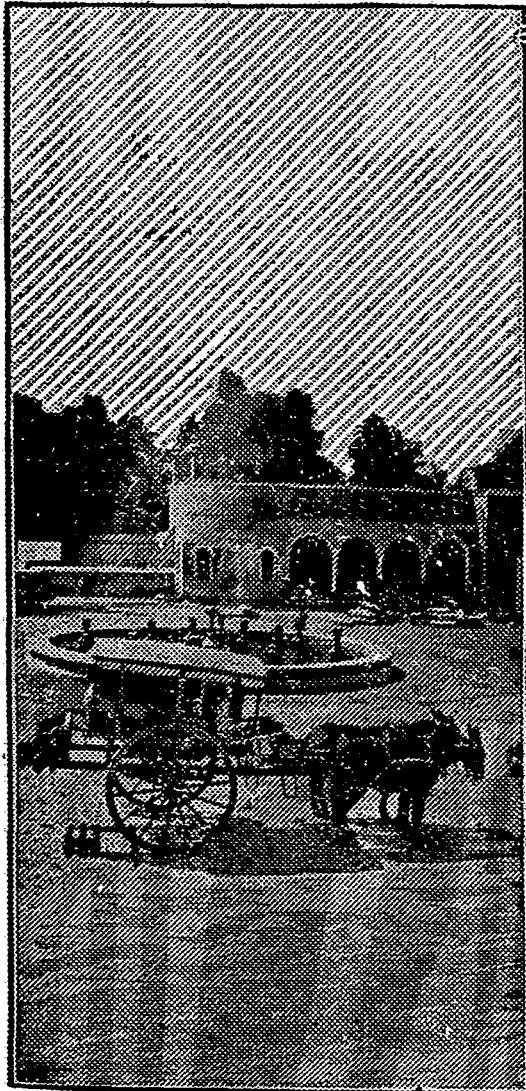
"Shows you've got sense," said he approvingly, "to trust me for the time being. Now, as a great and just reward I'm going to give you the time of your life. I've arranged for a grand 'poo,' which is the vernacular for a wild turkey hunt, and the native name for that turkey, by the way, is 'pavo del monte,' or the peacock of the hills. It is a smaller but more beautiful bird than the wild turkey of North America. Its meat has a finer flavor, and its plumage is glorious, every feather being tipped with a great golden 'eye,' like the peacock's, which fact has caused the naturalists to name it the Meleagris ocellatus.

"But enough of turkey terminology. You can hunt that up for yourself in the books on the subject. What I am going to do, wind and weather permitting, is to show you the bird and give you a taste of its flesh on the day set apart for the eating of turkey in the states. And, my official word for it, there will not probably be another citizen of los Estados Unidos del Norte, as the Mexicans call the United States, except perhaps myself, who will celebrate the day by devouring the succulent flesh of a pavo del monte."

Yucatan is a hot country, and when possible all long journeys are made between sunset and sunrise; so we started on the turkey hunt at midnight, climbing into our volan coche just as the last stroke of 12 sounded from the clock tower of the old cathedral.

"Quien vive?" yelled the sentinel on duty at the city gate as we dashed through the arched portal and sped into the country district.

"Amigos!" (friends) we shouted, but by this time we were half a gunshot away and our mules were going at such speed that if the sentinel had taken a shot at us he couldn't have hit our flying coche. But perhaps the reader has never seen, much less had a ride in, the volan coche, or flying coach, of Yucatan. Know, then, that it is a two

wheeled vehicle without springs and without seats, but in their stead a mattress, upon which the passengers stretch out and are supposed to snooze as the three mules in harness speed over the roads. The roads are about the roughest in the world, but the driver doesn't mind a little thing like that. His orders are to make time, and so he stands out on the shafts and plies the whip regardless, shouting at the top of his voice, "Moola, moola, moo, moo, moo, moo-lah!" And away we go, like the wind on a spree.

In this manner we traveled all that night and the next morning, halting only to change the mules every four hours or so, lying up from noon till 6 o'clock in the evening, when away again, alternately sleeping, eating, drinking and smoking, all the time on wheels, and at daylight the second morning we finally stopped for good, with a general assortment of "wheels in our heads." If there was a spot on my body not sore or bruised black and blue I do not remember having found it, and my legs were so stiff from dis-

use that at first getting on them I could hardly stand.

The town has one long street lined with one story dwellings of stone, and as everybody seemed to be asleep our muleteer began at one end of the street and pounded on every door, then repeated the performance back again until finally somebody poked his head out of a hole in the wall and told us to go to el diablo. An old woman showed herself at last and then a younger one, and both set to work most industriously grinding corn between two stones and cooking tortillas for us over an open fire.

I thought this might be the end of the journey, but the consul said no, there yet remained half a day's jaunt on horseback, but all the way through turkey country, so the time would pass more quickly and pleasantly than if we were in the volan. At last the old woman brought us a stack of tortillas a foot high and spread them out on a board for us to eat, while the younger female, a comely mestiza,

played on the guitar and sang to the popular tune of the "Toro." This was our Thanksgiving breakfast, tortillas and frijoles, the latter being beans fried in fat and the former just plain everyday flapjacks. We had no knives save our hunting knives and no forks or spoons, but we rolled up the thin tortillas into scoops, with which we laded in the beans, with another tortilla as a plate, and after the beans were gone devoured both plate and spoon as well. So, there being no dishes to wash, the two women saddled our horses for us when the repast was over, saw to it that the girls were tight and the riatas coiled on the pommels and then gave us "adios" with much grace.

Four Maya Indians tramped the trail ahead of us and led the way through the logwood forests, where we wound between the crooked trees and among immense ant hills big as houses. Each Indian was naked to the waist, wearing nothing but a pair of pantaloons cut short at the knee, and in the hollow of his left arm carrying a wicked looking machete. When well into the forest they spread out like a great fan, ranging for turkeys, and not an hour passed before the consul and myself each had a shot, and each brought down a plump gobbler with plumage of golden bronze shining like the sun. When at last we reached the palm thatched hut on the coast where we were to pass the night each of us had three fine turkeys at his saddlebow, and the consul carried behind him a venado, or native deer, which he had shot on the jump as it plunged beneath the logwoods. The camp was reached late in the afternoon, but our four Indians went to work with such energy that by sunset they had our table spread with the viands smoking hot. It was set near the beach beneath the golden roof-trees of the cocoa palms, where a cool breeze tempered the heat of this tropic region and banished the mosquitoes.

As our friend had promised, our Thanksgiving dinner comprised the golden turkeys, two of them adorning our table, their heads neatly tucked beneath their wings, and which, stuffed with bread nuts and acajou, were more delicious to the taste than tongue can tell. Then we had venison, with guava jelly; faisán, or native quail; two kinds of fish peculiar to the coast of Yucatan; such fruits as the mango, orange, pineapple, and vegetables like the yam, eddoe and sweet potato. For drink we had amolli, a gruel made by mixing maize meal in water, pulque, bottled, and mescal, from the highlands of Mexico, and vino tinto, or claret, from Spain. All the drinks and comestibles had been brought by the Indians in hampers on their backs, all except the game, which they were instrumental in securing by acting as guides to the haunts of the pavo del monte. As we ate and drank we heartily agreed that Thanksgiving day in Tslam was indeed a day on which to be thankful.

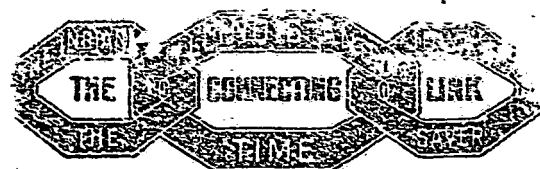

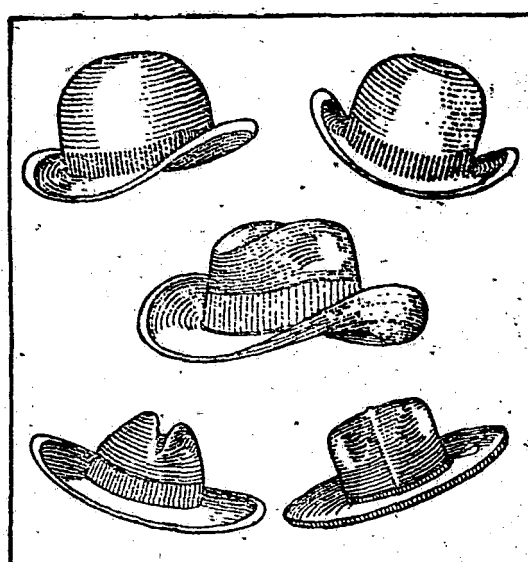

### Recruiting for the Navy.

Geo. R. Petingill, Lieutenant U. S. navy, will have an office at Grand Rapids from November 23 to 28 for the purpose of enlisting men from 17 to 35 years of age, as seamen, ordinary seamen, landsmen for training, clerks, electricians, carpenter's mates, ship fitters, shipwrights, blacksmiths, boiler makers, copper-smiths, machinists, firemen, coal passers, mess attendants, cooks, bakers, plumbers and fitters.

The young men in the service nowadays are mostly Americans of good, intelligent, moral standards, high ideals and self-respect. They are in a legitimate, respectable business, and they take a pride in the cleanliness of it. They receive every consideration at the hands of their superiors, and are given valuable opportunities and encouragement for advancement.

Under the present laws, it is possible for a young man to become an officer in the regular line of the navy; twelve are appointed every year from the ranks, after an examination. This, of course is a hard one, but not too hard for the energetic young men, who have attained their commissions in this way.

Young men are enlisted every day, with very little skill or training, for instruction. Many common places higher up in the list are vacant, and skilled men are wanted in mechanical, clerical, electrical engineering and pharmaceutical duties. Everybody is encouraged to study and work and schools are established at all naval stations, and aboard the larger ships, to give these young men a chance. Somebody must get these good billets—somebody with energy and ability.

Lieutenant Petingill will be very glad to answer any questions about the navy, and would be glad to help the people of the interior get a better idea of the navy.

Applicants residing at a distance should in all cases, communicate with the nearest recruiting station for a list of qualifications before reporting for examination, and upon receipt of same should consult a physician and ascertain the probabilities of their being able to conform to the requirements. If favorably advised, the recruiting officer should be immediately informed and request made that the applicant's name be entered on the list to be notified, after which, complete instructions will be given as to the proper time to report for examination. This course is suggested, as no allowance is made for the traveling expenses of applicants and they should be as certain as possible of their ability to pass the examination before incurring any expense. Transportation is furnished only to accepted applicants from the recruiting station to place of assignment.

### Postal Things You Shouldn't Do.

Don't forget to put your name and address in upper left hand corner of envelope or package, so that it may be returned to you in case mail is not deliverable.

Don't use poor paper, envelopes or wrapper.

Don't use weak ink, have it blue-black if you can

Don't leave off the name of street, postoffice, state or county when addressing country mail.

Don't say "city" on "town" when you mean Chicago.

Don't let the address take up all the space. Leave some for postage stamp and postmark.

Don't forget that all letters on rural routes requires two cents postage, and the slightest fraction over the exact weight requires another rate of postage.

The patrons on rural routes should not forget to provide themselves with stamps and stamp their letters for it is a mean job to fish about the box for money on a cold day.

Don't put valuables or money in unregistered letters.

## Magazine Reviews

Next to air and food in the human economy comes exercise. We may have plenty of fresh air, and a proper allowance of the right kind of food, and yet, without helpful daily exercise, these will not avail to keep the body in good condition. In answer to the question, "Why do we grow old?" a French writer gives these three reasons: "We do not get enough physical exercise in the open air, we are poisoned by microbes which the phagocytes have not succeeded in destroying, and we are depressed by fear of death." Of the three reasons it will be noted that he gives the place of first importance to lack of exercise. There is nothing else which can take the place of physical activity as a preserver of youth and energy. "Grow younger as you grow older by cultivating a moderate love of good, healthful, honest sport," is sound advice. Walking, running, jumping, rowing, playing golf, tennis, or croquet, or any other mild form of exercise in the open air, keeps the muscles supple and prevents the joints from stiffening, fills the lungs with life-giving oxygen, and keeps the blood from becoming sluggish or the liver torpid. In short, it is exercise that keeps the body in tune and "up to concert pitch," just as exercise keeps the voice or a musical instrument in perfect tone. "Success."

## A Fruitful Vision

There rises before me the wraith of a village church in the far-off mountains of Pennsylvania. It is Sunday morning at midsummer. In the pulpit a young clergyman is preaching from the text: "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of these my brethren, even the least, ye did it unto me." The sun peeps through the windows, where the climbing roses nod. In the tall maples a dove is cooing; the drowsy hum of the honey bee is on the air. But he reck not of these, nor of the peaceful day. His soul has seen a vision of hot and stony streets, of squalid homes, of hard-visaged, unlovely childhood, of mankind made in His image twisted by want and ignorance into monstrous deformity; and the message he speaks goes straight to the heart of the plain farmers on the benches; His brethren these, and steeped in the slum! They gather round him, after the service, their hearts burning within them.

I see him speeding the next day toward the great city, a messenger of love and pity and help. I see him return before the week's end, nine starved urchins clinging to his hands and the skirts of his coat, the first Fresh Air party that went out of New York, twenty-seven years ago next summer. I see the big hearted farmers take them into their homes and hearts. I see the sun and the summer wind put back color into the wan cheek, and life in the shrunken and starved frame. I hear the message of one of the little ones to her chums left behind in the tenement: "I can have two pieces of pie to eat, and nobody says nothing if I take three pieces of cake"; and I know what it means to them. Laugh? Yes! laugh and be glad. The world has sorrow enough. Let in the sunshine where you can, and know that it means life to these, life now and a glimpse of the hereafter. I can hear it yet, the sigh of the tired mother under the trees on Twin island, our Henry street children's summer home: "If heaven is like this, I don't care how soon I go."

For the sermon had wings; and whithersoever it went blessings sprang in its track. Love and justice grew; men read the brotherhood into to sunlight and the elds and the woods, and the brotherhood became real. I see today Willard Parsons, the minister, no longer so young, sitting in his office in the "Tribune" Building, still planning Fresh Air holidays for the children of the hot, stony city. But he seeks them himself no more. A thousand churches, charities, kindergartens, settlements, a thousand preachers and doers of the brotherhood, gather them in. A thousand trains of many crowded cars carry them to the homes that are waiting for them wherever men and women with warm hearts live. The message has traveled to the farthest shores, and nowhere in the Christian world is there a place where it has not been heard and heeded: Wherever it has, there you have seen the heart of man laid bare; and the sight is good. —December Century.

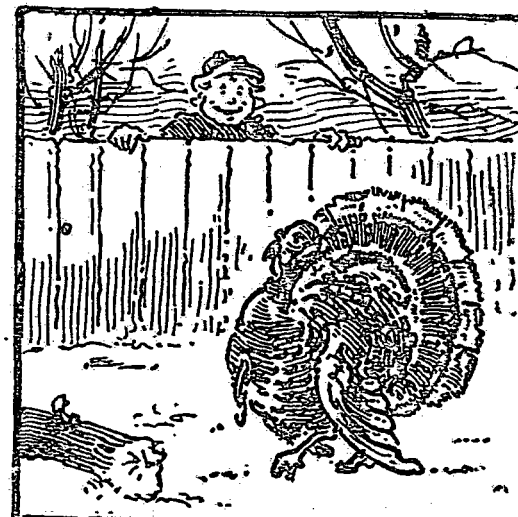

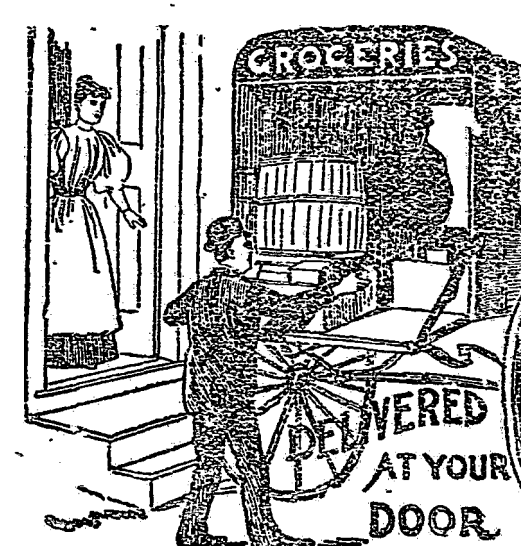
