Grand Rapids Looks Askance at Some Bills Presented for Printing.

SEEM TO HAVE BEEN EXPANDED

Accused Man Says It Is an Error in Bookkeeping-Saginaw Trouble Ended.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Feb. 16.-Warrants have been issued for the arrest of ex-City Comptroller Leo A. Caro and Eber Rice, of the West Michigan Printing company, charging false pretenses and conspiracy to defraud the city in printing city reports. It is charged that Rice, who has done the city printing for several years, has duplicated his bills, collecting \$657 more than was his due, and that this was made possible through the help of the ex-city comptroller, who is now a resident of Battle Creek. During the period of investigation Rice has not denied the overcharge, but has declared that it was due to defective bookkeeping.

New Explanation for "Graft." Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 16.-Figures proving that much municipal "graft" is mere ignorance were given to the Michigan Political Science-Municipal League allied convention by John F. Bible. In a list of sixty-five Michigan cities he showed that the price of one electric light a year ranged from \$25 to \$140. One of the smallest Michigan towns-Ypsilanti-pays the minimum rate. Bible's investigation showed that this 50 per cent. difference in lighting cost had not gone into corrupt aldermen's pockets, but to shrewd business agents, who charge immensely different rates for the same service in different cities.

NEW HOSPITAL PLANNED

Ann Arbor at a Cost of \$30,000.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 16.-Plans for the new \$30,000 hospital for contagious diseases, have been submitted by Architect H. W. Bipp. If the people decide to raise the money for the erection of the hospital it will be with the understanding that the university will pay the running expenses. The proposed structure is modern and complete, being 111 feet by 48 feet, and will have threestories besides the basement.

Founder Is the First Patient.

Holland, Mich., Feb. 16. - A. F. Henken, who recently arrived from the Netherlands, where he has been interested in hospital work, has finally succeeded in establishing a hospital in this city. While Henken was getting the building ready to be occupied as a hospital he tried to start a fire in the range in the kitchen. using gasolice, thinking it was kerosene. An explosion followed, scattering the burning gasoline all over him. When his garments were removed the burned flesh adhered to them. He may not recover.

"Thumb" Frost-Bitten Again.

Detroit, Feb. 16.—Reports from the "Thumb" district of Michigan show a renewal of the snow blockade of two weeks ago. Train service is at a standstill between Port Huron and Almont, between Bad Axe and Grindstone City. and between Harbor Beach and Palms. At Midland the mercury dropped to 10 below, at Cadillac to 28 below and at Calumet to 35 below.

Michigan Railway Appraisement. Lansing, Mich., Feb. 16.-The state board of review of railroad assessments has completed its session and finally fixed the railroad appraisement for the current year at \$222,066,000. This is an increase of \$23,405,000 over the total appraisement of last year.





as to what system shall be adopted This, it seems to me, represents the true principal of self-government. Personally, I believe a primary lay

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should be passed by the next legis lature, and I trust that every citizen in the state will become interested and carefully study any proposed law, and compare it with the primary laws of other states, which have been

in operation for several years. The mandatory, in all cases, direct primary voting laws of such, states as Mississippi, Florida and Texas should be compared with the optional laws of Ohio. Indiana, California and many other northern and western states. It is true that in the latter with all conventions, and I feel free to say at this time, what I have so of ten said before, that after carefully investing the primary laws of all the states, and their practical workings I very greatly doubt whether Mich igan needs such an extremely man datory direct voting law as some peo ple are urging. No such extreme

measure has been tried as yet except in some of the southern states, where the conditions not only are very different from those existing here, but where the chief purpose of the enact ment was also entirely different. If the politics of a county have been debauched by the use of money or patronage, or in any other way, a stringent law should be enacted to take care of such a case. But I believe that in a large majority of the counties of this state the politics are practically clean, and I do not think that such counties should be compelled against their will to make an entire change in their manuer of making

nominations, simply because a change is needed in other counties. Especially is this true where those needing or those desiring such a change can

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sure the change, they should by all means, be afforded the opportunity. But in townships where the present system of township nominations has long been in use, in many instances for upwards of fifty years, with no a just cause for complaint, and where the people still prefer to nominate their township officers by the majority vote of those present at the primaries, rather than to make radical changes or open the way to unnecessary changes, I say let the people in such townships settle these matters for themselves. However, I do not wish to be understood as opposing any primary law which the people of this state, as a whole, or which a majority of the people of the state desire, and were I governor of the state I should feel it my duty to sign and assist in every way in carrying out whatever effective primary election law the legislature should see fit to pass.

Death Writes "Finis" 1n Marcus A. Hanna's Book of Life

# AT THE END OF A WEARY DAY

Ohio's Warwick Gives Up His Fight Against Dissolution.

Last Day Was One of Unconsciousness and Waiting for the End-Scene at the Passing of the Senator.

Washington, Fe. 16. — Marcus A. Hanna, United States senator from Ohio, and one of the foremost figures in American public life, died last evening in his apartments at the Arlington hotel at 6:40 p. m., of typhoid fever, after an illness of two weeks. He passed away peacefully and without pain, after being unconscious since 3

host of others associated with Hanna politically and personally. When the death was announced to them there was a moment of absolute silence. "It is a great loss," murmured General Dick. Then Postmaster General Payne rang the telephone and the White House responding to his call he said: "Senator Hanna has just passed away," this conveying the news to President and Mrs. Roosevelt.

LAST WORDS OF THE SENATOR

Maintained to the Last His Characteristic Humor-The Funeral.

The last intelligible words spoken by Senator Hanna were pathetic in his humor which was characteristic of his life. He moved his head slightly, and his eyes rolled a little to the right and then to the left. The nurse anticipated his want and bending to the patient's ear asked if he was looking for his handkerchief. "I think my wife has my handkerchief," the senator whispered. It was a good-natured plaguing in which he often indulged with his wife, when he missed anything, of expecting "that my wife has it."

The flags on the Capitol are at halfmast and will remain so until after the funeral. The desk of Senator Hanna in the senate chamber is draped in mourning. There will be an official funeral in the senate chamber at noon tomorrow, the body lying in state in the senate marble room in the morning. The body will be taken to Cleveland, where it will be buried on Friday.

Washington, Feb. 16 .-- Both houses of congress adjourned today immediately upon the announcement of the death of Senator Hanna. No business was transacted in either house.

#### TRIBUTES TO THE DEAD Universal Regret Among Public Men au Washington and Elsewhere.

Washington, Feb. 16. - There are universal expressions of regret among public men at the death of Senator Hanna, all of them - without distinction of party - saying the country had lost one of its most forceful and useful citizens. To Secretary Hay the death of Senator Hanna came as a great loss, and he paid him a warm tribute. Secretaries Shaw, Wilson and Hitchcock and Postmaster General Payne also expressed their sorrow at the nation's loss and their appreciation of the senator's qualities of brain and heart.



Justa Fight to Prolong Life. During the whole day practically the effort of the doctors was a fight for prolongation of life, without the faintest ray of hope. The watchers at the bedside expected the end momentarily. Shortly before 4 p. m. Senator Scott, of West Virginia, an associate of the stricken statesman on the national Republican committee, was closeted with Dr. Carter, the family physician, who told him that the senator was then sinking gradually; that the end might come at any moment, but might be prolonged for two or three hours.

#### Too Weak to Retain Food.

The senator passed the day practically without nourishment of any kind, being too weak to retain it. The household had become resigned to the inevitable outcome, and sadly waited the final summons. Elmer Dover, the senator's secretary, when he left the sick room at 5:30 p.m., said there was then a perceptible decrease of strength over the hour before, and that life was fading very fast. The patient's pulse was so faint that it could not be detected at all at the wrist, and the heart barely fluttered.

#### **HE SIMPLY "WASTED AWAY"**

Final Sinking Spell Admonishes the Watchers of the "Last of Earth."

Shortly after 6 p. m. word came from the sick room that the sick man was "simply wasting away." Mrs. Hanna, worn out with the unceasing watch she had kept by the senator's side since the inception of the illness, had been persuaded to go into another room, and tired nature had forced her to sleep just before the end came. She was not present when her husband passed away. At 6:30 p. m. there was a severe sinking spell. Dr. Osler realized that dissolution was at hand, and he hurriedly summoned the family.

"The end is very near," he said to them. Sorrowfully they passed into the chamber just before life flickered out. Around the bedside were ranged Mr. and Mrs. Dan Hanna, Mr. and Mrs. McCormick, Mr. and Mrs. Parsons, Miss Phelps, H. M. Hanna and Elmer Dover, the secretary to the senator. Beside them were Drs. Osler and Carter and two trained nurses. For ten minutes life ebbed slowly, and finally, at precisely 6:40 p.m. the senator breathed his last.

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Those in the death chamber wept, and Dover quietly passed out and down along the long corridor of the hotel to the waiting crowd of newspaper men. "The senator died at 6:40," he announced, and in a moment the news

NAVAL BATTLE AT CHEMULPO

London, Feb. 16 .-- A Seoul dispatch dated Feb. 12 gives the following account of the battle off Chemulpo which resulted in the loss of the Russian cruiser Variag and the gunboat Korietz:

During the night of Feb. 8 the Japanese landed 1,300 men at Chemulpo, and on the morning of the 9th three Japanese cruisers, four gunboats and eight torpedo boat destroyers, under ously wounded his stepson, Vincent command of Admiral Uriu, approached the harbor, but did not enter. The Japanese admiral gave them until noon to come out. Both Russian vessels cleared for action. All the shipping in the harbor was notified by Admiral Uriu to get out of the firing line. There was in the harbor also the British cruiser Talbot, the French cruiser Pascal, the Italian cruiser Elba and the United States gunboat Vicksburg. The Variag and Korietz got under way and steamed out of the harbor. The crew of the English warship cheered them as they went out to fight.

When the Russians were four miles out the Japanese threw a shot across their bows, but they did not stop. Heavy firing then began on both sides: The Variag turned her broadside loose at 11:55 a.m. Then the Variag turned at right angles to the westward and steamed a short distance as if to make the beach, but was seen to suddenly turn again east and give the enemy her other broadside.

The Japanese continued firing until 12:22, when the Variag was seen to be on fire near the stern. The Russian vessels then turned back toward the harbor and ceased firing. The Japanese followed almost to the entrance of the harbor, firing on the Variag, which had a heavy list to port and was evidently in a sinking condition. The Korietz was practically untouched. The Variag lost thirty men and seven officers killed, and forty-two wounded. Midshipman Niron was killed on the bridge. The firing was not very accurate, and the Variag was hit in only six places, but one shot struck her on the water-line amidships and







