### Republican Senatorial Convention for the Seventh Senatorial District of Michigan.

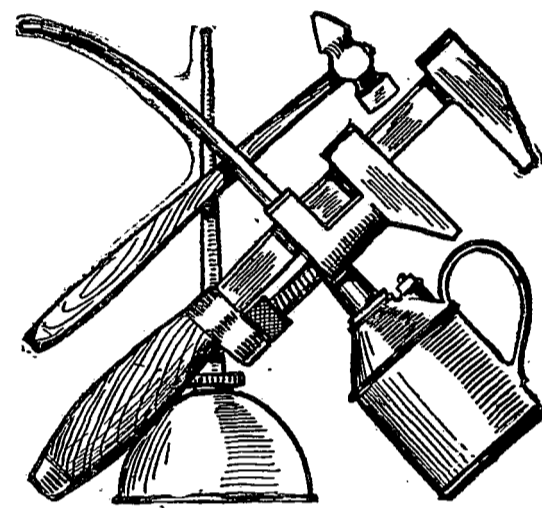
