



And, especially, which is better supported by such experience as has been had in our own state and in other states? This is the 1ssue, and it is perfectly clear. It is more important than anything else that can be talked about in Michigan now, and so it is of serious moment that it should be fairly presented and earnestly and frank ly discussed. But our opponents do not do that. They devote their time to foolish accusation that we are opposed to primary reform, and sillier and more senseless accusation of ma chine control, and baseless declara tions about state expenditures. Re publicans do not desire to doge or befog the issue. They desire to have it presented fairly, according to the authoritative declarations of the platforms, for the thoughtful decision of the voters.



Washington Letter

It seldom happens that a people enjoy the inauguration of an entire new ecconomic system, instituted by officials who have all the advantages of 200 years experience in shaping a progressive nation, at their command, but that is the advantage which the Filipinos are now enjoying and the results promise to prove of the utmost value to them. A striking inby reports on the work of the Philippine Bureau of Forestry which have just been received by the War Department. Instead of the reckless, extravagant and short sighted policy which has resulted in the devastation of the forests of this country and the grave enhancement of the price of lumber to the consumers of the present day, the American administrators of the Philippines have adopted a policy which warrants the belief that the vast forest resources of the Philippines will prove a perpetual and constantly increasing source of revenue to the islands and will, incidentally, contribute to the development of the archipelago in other directions.

No forest land is sold in the Philippines but twenty year leases are granted to lumbermen conveying the right to cut, not all the timber insight but only those trees which have reached maturity and have been marked by the expert foresters employed by the government. The forest lands are divided into classes according to their proximity to market and the trees are divided into groups according to the value of the wood, the tax varying from 5 pesos Philippines, the cost of adding a per cubic meter for the more valuable number of new ships of the most apwoods in close proximity to market, to one-half peso for the least valuable navy of maintaining the navy and of group in the most inaccessible locality. Russia, in time of stress, has used Chinese harbors as places of refuge, as in the case of the Russian vessel which sought refuge in the harbor of Shanghai and refused to disarm within the required time, and in the case of the Japanese seizure of the Russian ship in the harbor of Cheefoo, in spite of the grave violation of the neutrality laws involved, China being utterly powerless to maintain them. Sir William, who has visited the navy yards of this country, declared the present type of battleships, now building, to be the finest in the world.

The beneficial effect of the campaign is clearly observable in Washington already. The violent attacks on the present administration, based on allegations of extravagance are producing an effort to economize in all directions. Cabinet officers, who probably have not watched the pen nies as closely as they might, are keenly alive to fact that the least waste will be made the basis of severe strictures, and the order has already gone out in all departments of the government to pare the estimates for the coming year and economize in all directions practicable. It is the old story of radicalism in partisan attacks producing conservatism in administration.


