



Lightning Rods and Wind Pumps Made to Look Cheap

Magazine Story Simply a "Polly" to · Work the Unsuspecting-Farmers, Be on Your Guard

A scheme that makes lightning ods and wind pumps look cheap is being worked among the farmers by a slick fellow and they are being entrapped right and left.

The fellow who claims to represent a magazine, works upon the vanity of the farmer and ordinarily find plenty of material.

The first thing he does is to get the names of all the farmers on a rural route and then send each a nicely worded letter. At about a certain hour on a certain day the agent purposes to call on the farmer to get a writeup of his farm. Pic tures of the members of the family, together with views of the premises are also wanted to illustrate the magazine article.

The idea of getting his own picture and that of other members of the household in a magazine touches the farmer in about the right place, and he is generally waiting for the agent when he arrives. Everybody is dressed up and looking his neatest.

The agents proceeds to take his notes for the writeup. He quizzes the farmer concerning his ancestors, and wants to know who Mrs. Farmer was before she married. He carefully notes the names and ages of the child-

ren. Then the pictures are taken. They prove to be good reproductions of the original, so the agent has no trouble in selling a set of his pictures to the family. He sells them for as much as \$1 up and then goes to the next farmer whom he works in the same way.




