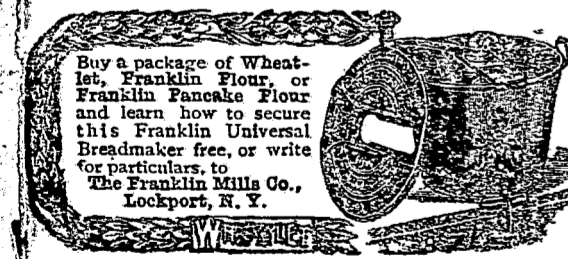

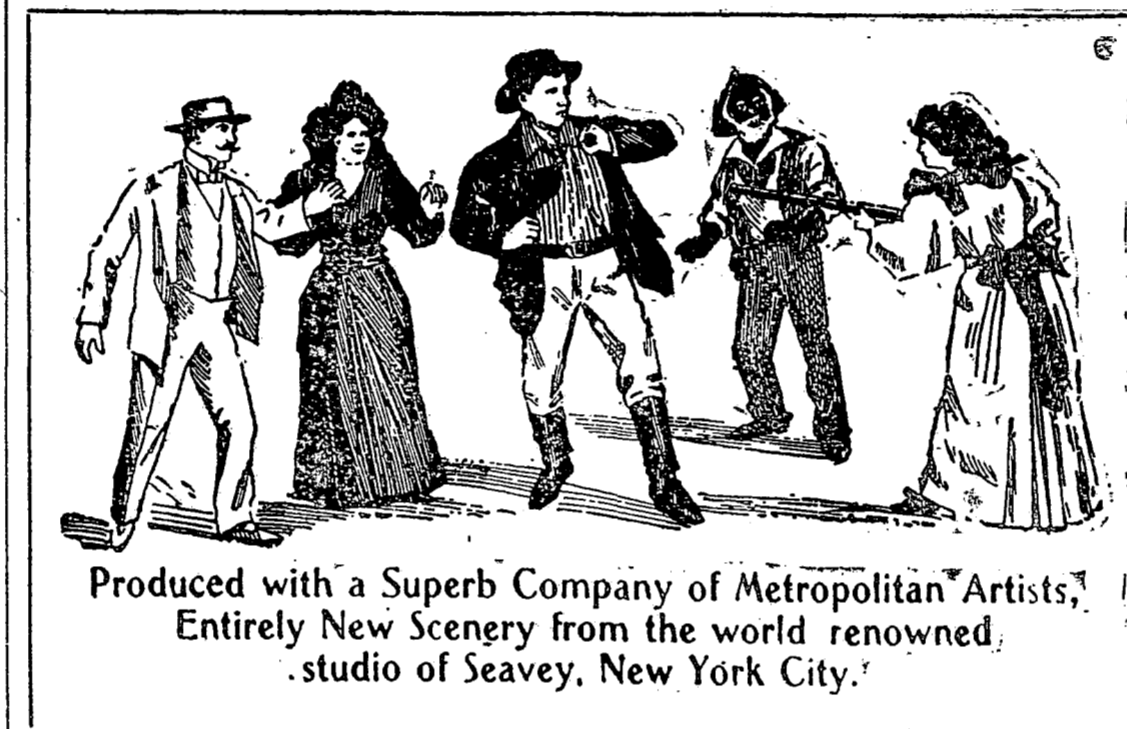

Two Thousand Have Wedded

In St. Joseph, Are Shown on the Records at the County Seat

County Clerk Miners has issued more licenses up to the present time than were ever issued before in the history of St. Joseph.

The number totals up to 1185, meaning that 2,370 people have taken the vows of wedlock. It is far greater than the number issued last year up to this time. The business has been conducted mostly in St. Joseph and the large proportion of the contracting parties were from Chicago and Indiana points. The ministers in St. Joseph have enjoyed the largest portiox of the business but the justices have not been forgotten.

County Clerk Miners said this morning that the fact that the attacks which were formerly made so vigorously against the St. Joseph marriage industry had ceased were due to the investigations which had been placed on foot and which had revealed nothing whatever of a sensational character. The marriages at the court house or in the justices offices are of as solemn a nature as if performed in the home or church. The contracting parties are aware of what they are doing and the state newspaper notriety which has given the business a bad name is gradually ceasing because there are no grounds upon which to fork a scandal with any truth.

He was highly respected and leaves a son and daughter. Coroner Burchfield summoned a jury and will hold an inquest.

She was in a critical condition from appendicitis and as the doctors decided an operation would prove fatal a fast until the attendant fever would leave was decided upon. 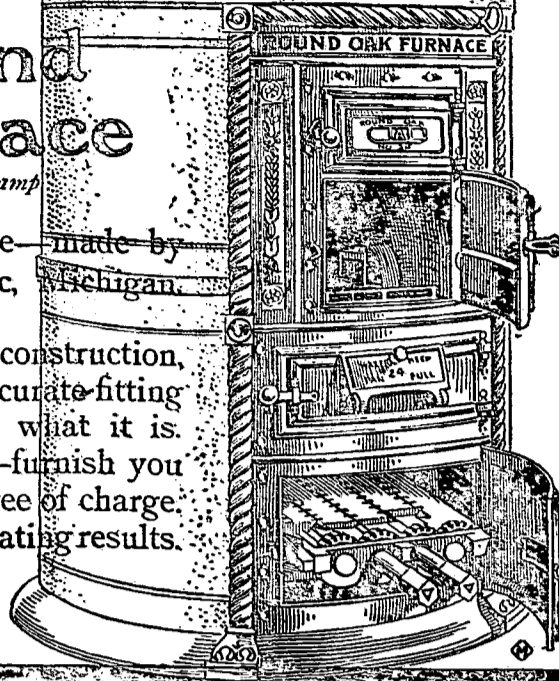

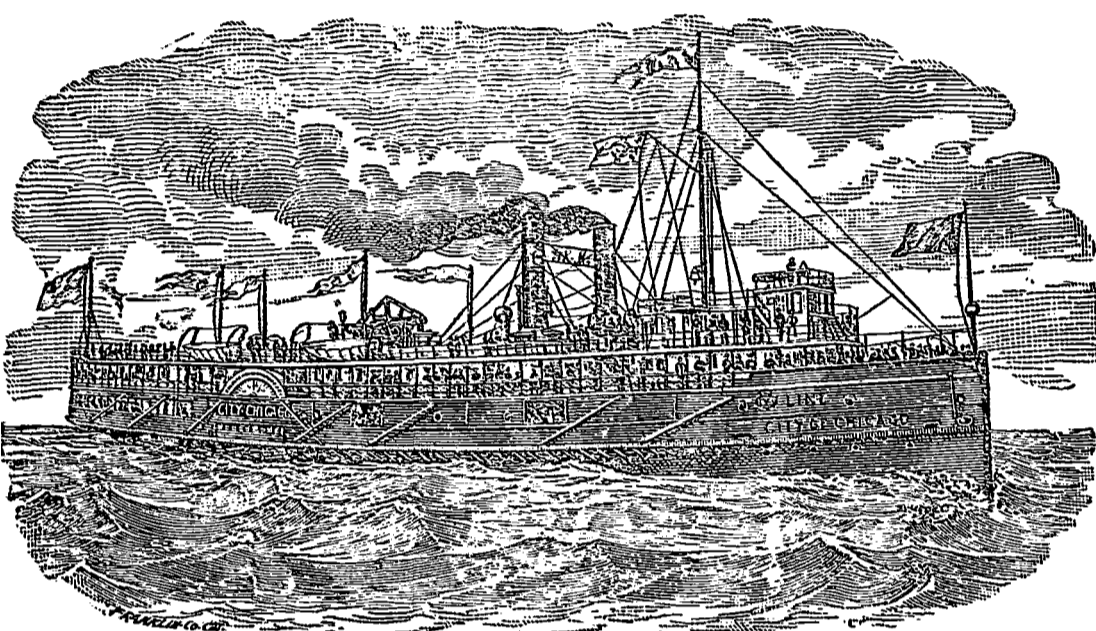

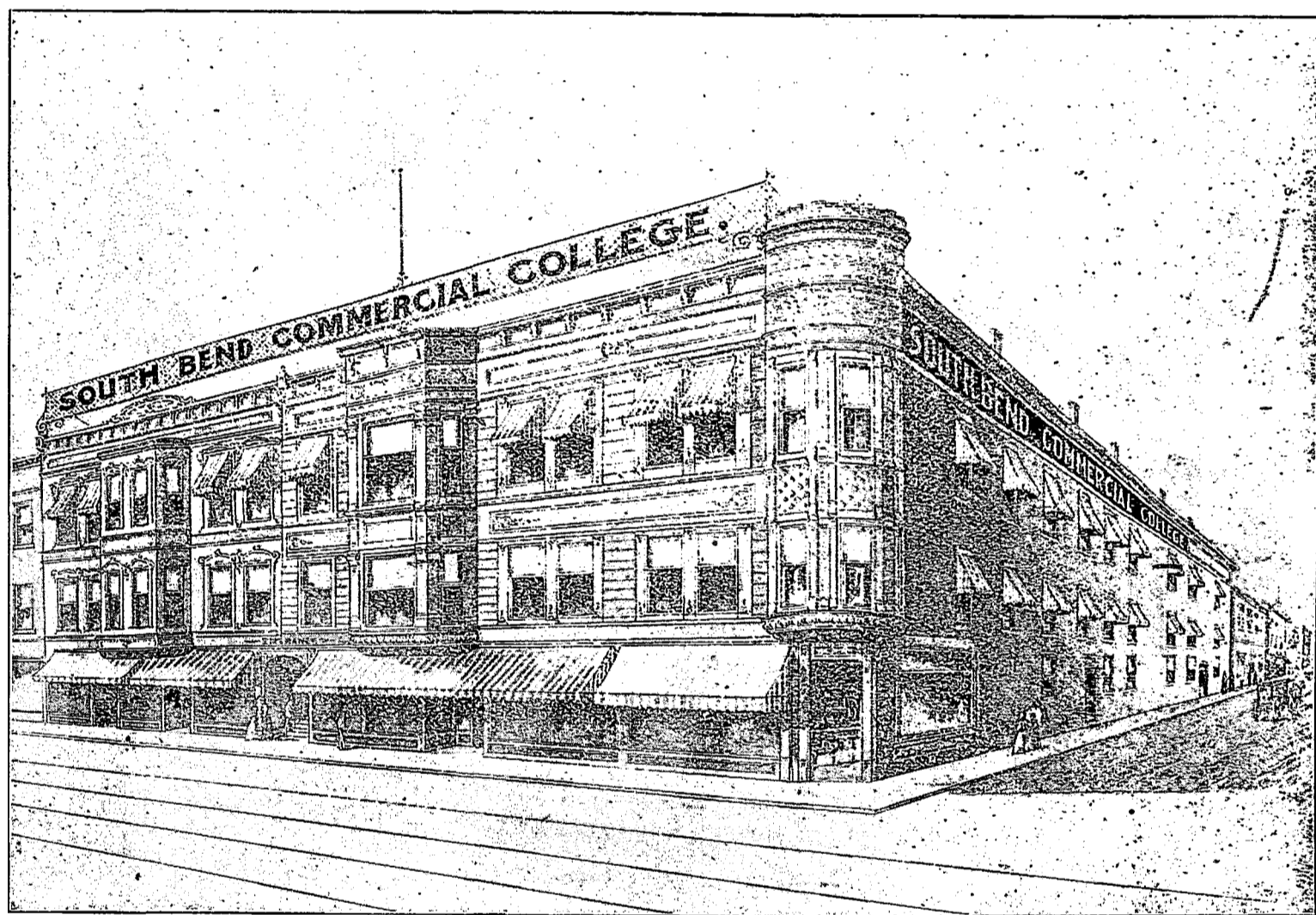
