John Bloink, aged 59, of 1377 Concord avenue, Detroit, was robbed and possibly fatally slugged while returning home from a reception at St. Anthony's school Wednesday night. He was found unconscious Thursday morning on the sidewalk at the corner of Helen and Palmer avenues,

Miss Hilda Rogers, the Kalamazoo girl who was taken from a train at Buffalo last Wednesday, in a critical condition from poisoning, is still delirious and in a serious condition Wednesday. The attendants have been unable to secure from her any statement as to the cause of her condition.

The ill-fated schooner, Thomas Hume; which left Chicago 14 years ago loaded with lumber for Muskegon accompanied by the consort, Hans Simmons, has been found in 56 feet of water, ten miles northeast of Michigan City. Seven sailors were on the schooner when she foundered in a terrible storm, but none ever were found. Fishers, while dragging last week caught the wreck in their nets.
