# **ACCIDENT**

Italian Has Both Legs Crushed | Committee on Sheriff's Claims on the Rail

And Fell over Backwards as Freight Train Bore Down upon Him at 30 Miles an Hour

A terrible accident occurred on the Michigan Central, two miles this side of Pokagon, about 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, when a westbound freight train, with Engineer George Binder at the throttle, ran down an Italian laborer, Zuccoras by name, crushing his two legs so badly that it was necessary for the attending surgeons to amputate them above the

Zuccoras, who was a member of the steel gang, was standing on the track with his back to the freight train, which was running at about 30 miles an hour, and when his attention was called to it, he became con fused and after a moment of fata hesitation, tumbled over backwards his feet dangling over the rail.

The engineer was powerless to avert the accident. The injured man was conveyed to the depot at Niles with all possible speed, was removed from there to a room that Mrs. Wurz kindly placed at the disposal of the railway officials. Dr. S. Belknap was hastily summoned, and everything possible was done to alleviate the poor fellow's sufferings.

The shock of the accident, however and the loss of blood rendered medi car assistance unavailing, and Zuccoras passed away at 1 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

Before his death Rev. Father Joos of Dowagiac was called and administered the sacrament.

## **ATTACK** ON BILLS

**Unearth Some Unusual** Charges

Of the Board of Supervisors Held Wednesday Morning. They Want a Limited Salary for Sheriff

Vigorous attack upon the charges that are piled up against the county by the deputies of Sheriff Tennant. Proposition to put office on salary

After an effort to raise the salary of the county superintendent of schools on motion of Supervisor Walker the salary was kept at \$1,200 by a vote of 26 to 5.

Chairman E. S. Kelley of the committee on sheriff's claims sprung a sensation at the forenoon meeting of the board of supervisors. In the report which was signed by the full committee, including Supervisors Miller a republican of St. Joseph, and Nixon of Lake, a democrat, it was recommended that the sheriff be put on a salary and that the fee system be abolished. The report was a lengthy one and went into detail into a system of either stuffing accounts or of reckless book keeping.

It was found that in some cases where men arrested had paid a large sum for the costs that the county had been asked for the costs in the same case; it was found that in one or more cases one deputy was able to charge up for five half days' work in one day, and a list of other irregularities.

As soon as the report was read Chairman Kelley moved its adoption. In making this motion Mr. Kelley stated that the sheriff's work was one of danger and that the officer should be well paid. He believed that the fee system was a back number and that Berrien should relegate it to the woods along with the larger counties of the state. The report was accept-

ed and placed on file. Mr. Daigneau, of Benton Harbor offered the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the chair appoint a committee of three to investigate the matter of placing our sheriff of ficers under stated salaries and thus doing away with the fee system. Said committee to report at the January session with such recommendation as they may deem best."

In offering this resolution Mr. Daigneau said that the salary system was the most satisfactory system to good officials while grafters and others liked the fee system the best.

Sheriff Tennant was present and he secured the floor to say that the fee system in Indiana was a failure. In the case of horse stealing, for instance, under the salary system, the officers would chase the thief to the edge of his own county and then

Supervisor Kelley interrupted the address of the sheriff by stating that he was out of order and that if he had anything to say he would be given a chance before the committee which will be appointed.

The investigation of the alleged overcharges by the sheriff's office will be watched with great interest. It is charged that each year the expense of the office had been growing out of proportion to the growth of population and the whole matter will be thorougly investigated before the board of supervisors is through with the matter. The committee on claims believes that the fee system is responsible for the leak.



BUILDING OF CONCRETE.

Suggestions for Obtaining Cheap and Durable Building Material Where Stone Is Scarce.

The absence of good building material in the shape of stone or wood in many districts has



brought before farmers the important question of building farm structures out of cement and sand The success of this

method of construction has been thoroughly proven in a great number of cases, in the large structures now standing, a number of which are very old and

quite beautiful buildings. Many of the most successful constructors of such buildings make building blocks by molding the concrete, when mixed in a simple mold of wood formed by nailing together four oneinch planks, which are eight inches wide, and setting these on a smooth surface, preferably of rough timber, then pouring the mixed concrete into them and allowing to stand until solid. The sketch illustrates one of these devices.

Many of the larger but roughly constructed concrete works are being built by pouring the concrete between the temporary walls built of one-inch boards. Practically all of the heavy foundation work now being constructed in the cities, under large buildings, is made in this way. For small farm structures this is perhaps the cheapest method to employ. The procedure of such building is about as follows:

First there is constructed a solid wal of one-inch planking on the inner side of the ground, where the foundation of a height of some four feet, with the smooth side out, being firmly braced within. Another wall of the same nature is constructed and placed facing it six to eight inches away, as the thickness of the wall is desired. When this has been constructed all around in the manner described, concrete is poured into this mold and allowed to harden. As often as the mold is filled some boards are added above and the concrete poured in, in layers of one to two feet deep. The board walls are allowed to remain until the concrete is quite

The double wall is by far the most practical, since it has an air-space extending from cellar to joist, which retards the passage of moisture, heat or cold and makes the building much more stable. The inside wall supports the the inner wall is five inches and the outer wall three inches thick, and the space four inches wide. The two must be fastened together, as they are built by the insertion of a number of small iron rods, which to prevent rusting should be galvanized. These may be placed in the concrete as the walls are

Several machines are on the market for building these walls, consisting simply of a frame for the two outside surfaces, with a mold for the cavity. But very good success has been obtained by the use of constructed molds, says Farm and Home. These walls are usually smooth enough on the inside to take a putty finish and paint without further treatment.

The concrete used for this purpose, which is meeting with widest success, is made of one part of cement, three parts sand and five parts of broken stone or nut gravel. This mixture is prepared as it is used, since if allowed to stand any length of time after mixing it will harden and not make a solid

Such a building is practically fireproof, and if the walls are not thick will be very dry within. If the walls are very thick, however, the moisture will collect upon the insides of them and will not allow the plaster to remain without | City, will have charge of the music cracking.

A comparison of cost between frame and brick construction is considerably in favor of concrete. In an estimate on a building 24x36 feet, two stories high, the frame cost \$520, brick \$723, while a similar construction of concrete, with two walls, the outer three inches and the inner five inches thick, would cost about \$432.

Machines for the molding of single and two-piece building blocks are on the market, ranging in cost from \$25 to \$500, but for ordinary frame structures the scaffolding molds are by far the cheapest and most practical. For fancy structures, dwelling houses, etc., molded concrete blocks are very serviceable and may be introduced in any part of the wall to decorate it.

Excellent Cosmetic.

The following is said to be one of the finest skin foods for eradicating wrinkles: White wax, half ounce; spermaceti, half ounce; cocoanut oil, once ounce; lanolin, one ounce; oil of sweet almonds, two ounces; half ounce each of alcohol and elderflower water. and four drops of benzoin. Cut up the wax and the spermaceti very fine and put in a porcelain-lined kettle; add the almond oil, the lanolin and cocoanut oil; set the kettle in a pan of hot water (it should not boil); have the alcohol and elderflower water hot (by setting the dish containing them in a dish of hot water), and beat them very gradually into the wax and add the tincture of benzoin, drop by drep, and the perfume, if any is to be used. #### BOTH PROVED INNOCENT

In Case of the Murder of Robt. Nodhruft, of Eau Claire

Goshen, Ind., Oct. 19.-Judge Dodge last evening instructed the jury in the trail of Bert Tidy of Benton Harbor, charged with murder of Robert Nodhruft of Eau Claire, while traveling on an excursion train returning from Marion, Ind., to return a verdict for the defendant.

William Griffin also under indictment on the same charge, was re-

Tidy and Griffin returned to their homes last night.

The court sustained the motion of defense to dismiss, on the grounds the evidence was circumstantial and not sufficient to convict.

Late yesterday afternoon it was believed that the case would last for days, and it came as a surprise that it closed so soon.

The prosecution made a picture of the events on the train on the night of the murder. He told how Tidy tried to pick a quarrel with Nodhruft, who was trying to defend a woman from insult, and how Tidy struck Nodhdruft. He told how Tidy swaggered back and forth in the car, drinking and talking fight. How Tidy and two others were seen to follow Nohdruft out of the coach which was the last seen of the latter. He also related the threats made by Tidey before the dead man's disappearance, and his brags afterwards. Leo Aldrich, landlord of a hotel in Benton Harbor, as did others, testified to interfering in an attack started by Tidy on Nodhdruft, and of Tidy's threats to "get his man," and of seeing three men following Nodhdruft out of the car at Elkhart He also testified that when Tidy reentered the car, the brim of his hat was broken as if in a melee.


