The following is said to be one of the finest skin foods for eradicating wrinkles: White wax, half ounce: spermaceti, half ounce; cocoanut oil, once ounce; lanolin, one ounce; oil of sweet almonds, two ounces; half ounce each of alcohol and elderflower water, and four drops of benzoin. Cut up the wax and the spermaceti very fine and put in a porcelain-lined kettle; add the almond oil, the lanolin and cocoanut oil; set the kettle in a pan of hot water (it should not boil): have the alcohol and elderflower water hot (by setting the dish containing them in a dish of hot water), and beat them very gradually into the wax and oils with an egg-beater, keeping all ingredients warm. When nearly cold, add the tincture of benzoin, drop by drop, and the perfume, if any is to be used. Beat all until it is smooth. Because of the oils, it will not attain the consistency of cold cream, but should aot be grainy. Cocoanut butetr is a fine fattener for the face and neck, but is rather coarse for constant use on the face.
