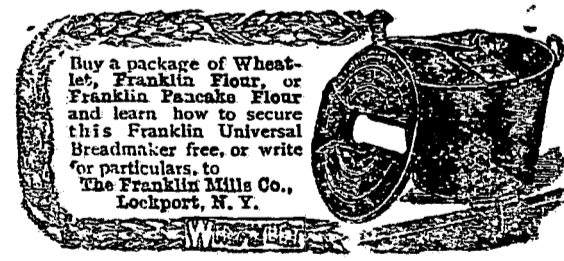

## A HIDDEN FORTUNE

Was Found in the Bed of an Eccentric Woman,

### MARTHA HAUSER WAS RICH

After a Diligent Search Treasures Long Cast Aside Were Revealed

The death of Martha J. Hauser occurred at Baroda a few weeks ago after suffering from a stroke of paralysis for several days. The lady, who was 65 years of age, lived by herself in apartments back of her millinery store in Baroda and the scantily equipped quarters were like those of a hermit. Her household goods were positively worthless and all her dishes could be packed in a lard can. It was surmised that the old lady had considerable means secreted some place about the house and after the funeral a search was made of the premises. In an old shirt hanging back of the bed was a purse containing some money, valuable jewelry and certificates of deposit on a Dowagiac bank for about \$4,100. Besides these a gold watch was found and evidences of the better days that had been enjoyed by the lady.

Not many years ago the woman disposed of a farm she owned near Pokagon and it was not known what she had done with the proceeds of the sale until the discovery of the certificates of deposit in the bank.

All of the property was brought to Probate Judge Ellsworth yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Brown, of Baroda and on the advice of the judge was deposited at one of the St. Joseph banks. An effort will be made to locate all the heirs of the deceased and to find the will of Mrs. Hauser, which it is believed will be unearthed in a few days.

Mrs. Hauser was an eccentric lady and was well known all over Berrien county for her peculiarities. In an unsuccessful damage suit in the circuit court a few years ago against Postmaster Hogue, of Baroda, she became known to everybody in the twin cities.

### A TRIBUTE TO HAY

Jews Will Celebrate Their Freedom on Coming Thanksgiving

Washington, D. C., Nov. 14.—On Thanksgiving day, the Jews of the United States will celebrate in every city and village the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the arrival of their race in this land of freedom and equality. It is proposed to celebrate the occasion and to express the gratitude of the Jewish race for the privilege and blessings they have enjoyed in America by erecting a memorial in honor of the late John Hay, who, as secretary of state, did so much toward the amelioration of the condition of their co-religionists in Russia, Roumania and other countries of Europe. Lest future generations may forget, it is also proposed to place in every synagogue in the United States a perpetual reminder of Colonel Hay in the form of a stained glass window or a tablet of marble or bronze suitably inscribed.

### A Turnkey to Wed Today

A license to wed was today issued to William Neer of this city and Miss Miranda Fuller of Buchanan. Neer is turnkey at the county jail and is very popular with the prisoners. He has lately given the prisoners pie securing it either from the bakery or of the cook at the jail, it is now an assured fact that it will be unnecessary for him to beg pie. The wedding will take place today. Neer has kept the particulars of his coming nuptials very dark and the members of the sheriff's force were unaware of the coming event.—Wednesday, News Palladium.

### SCALDED IN RED HOT TEA

Prisoner at County Jail Has Serious Accident.

Wm. Hill, a colored man from Niles who is serving a 90-day sentence at the county jail for assault, met with a serious accident Tuesday morning that may cause him the loss of an eye. The prisoners are allowed to set cans of water on the radiators to heat and make tea when they desire. Hill was doing this, but when he undertook to lift the can from the radiator, the hot water splashed into his face and burned him quite severely. Dr. Ed Taylor, of Benton Harbor, was called and dressed the wound. It is not yet possible to ascertain the extent of the injury to the eyes, but it is feared that one of them may be seriously injured.

### Teachers' Association Elect Officers for Ensuing Year

The closing sessions of the Berrien County Teachers' convention was held Saturday afternoon at the Methodist church in St. Joseph.

In the morning the reports of the several committees and officers were heard and the officers for the coming year were elected. The new officers who will look over the work the coming year are as follows: Pres. Supt E. P. Clarke, St. Joseph; Vice Pres., Supt. Wright, Benton Harbor; Secretary, Supt. Mercer, Buchanan; Treasurer, Supt. Harmon, Water-vliet.

All the sessions were well attended, teachers from all parts of the county being present. Every branch of education was touched upon and all teachers left for their homes much pleased with their annual convention. The next place of meeting was not decided upon.

### Progress in Sleeping Cars

On one of the Chicago railroad (Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway) there will be introduced within a few days a new style of sleeping car which will be recognized at once as a great improvement.

The improvement consists in locating the drawing-rooms in the center of the car instead of at the ends, as at present. As these drawing-rooms are often taken by people who are infirm or ill, such people are not much benefited if they must ride over the tracks. The noise and vibration are hardly offset by the luxuriousness of their immediate surroundings. Although some of the new cars will be used at once, many more are to be constructed, and that, of course will require time. When the new service is thoroughly in operation there will be a luxury in American railroad travel never known before and people will be able to bear railroad transportation who otherwise could not survive it.

Of course, when such service is the best in America it means that it is also the best in the world.—Chicago Chronicle, October 26, 1905.

### Another Prisoner Bids a Fond Farewell to Warden Vincent at Jackson

Jackson, Nov. 14.—Walter Van Duser escaped from prison farm yesterday afternoon, when there was a change of guard. Bloodhounds have died from poison, so only officers are in pursuit. Van Duser was sent here from Otter Lake for a term of from five to 20 years for criminal assault.

### All Boats Were in Shelter From the Storm

The steamers of the Graham & Morton fleet were all out of danger from the storm that swept the lakes Tuesday night and Wednesday morning. All are loaded with freight and will clear as soon as the sea goes down. The Argo loaded at Milwaukee and the No. 5 at Chicago; both of these steamers will sail for Lake Superior as soon as possible.

They will make two more trips if the weather is favorable and the freight business holds out as good as it is now. The City of Benton Harbor is in this port and the Holland is in Chicago.

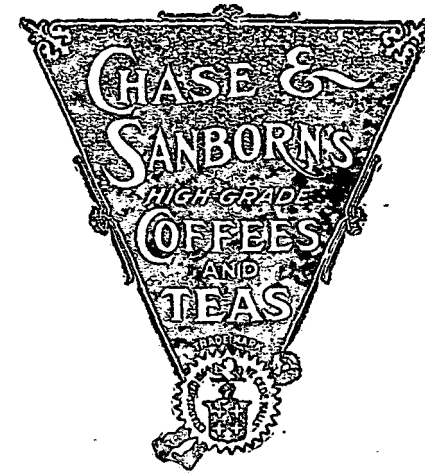

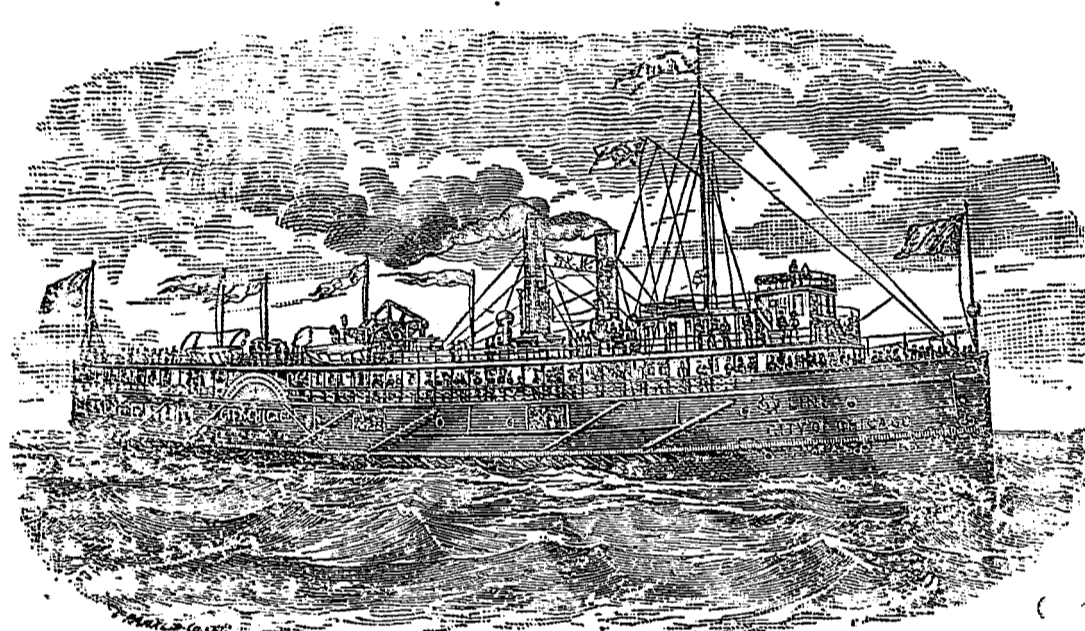
