PUT DOGS ON TRAIL

Fiends Mutilate Horses at Twin Springs by Cutting Out Tongues

THERE MAY BE A LYNCHING

If Enraged People Get up With Perpetrator of Fiendish Act

St. Joseph, Mich., Nov. 20.—The south end of Berrien county is worked up to a boiling point. The people are out in force tonight and have assembled at the various crossroad stores.

They declare that it is their intention to lynch the person who today destroyed a team of fine horses by cutting out their tongues with a knife. The horses belonged to Bert Talbot, of Twin Springs.

The officers believe that the people will attempt to make good their threat.

LATER

Two big bloodhounds from the Queen's Detective Agency of Battle Creek were taken through Niles Tuesday morning at 8:05 on the Michigan Central and were transferred to the Big Four over which they were taken by their keeper to Sodus, where they were put on the trail of the fiend who cut the tongues out of the two horses as above described.

The fiendish act is believed to have been prompted by revenge. The authorities are quite certain that they know the party, but if these two ferocious dogs should get their jaws fastened in his carcass, there will be no occasion for a lynching. However the dogs are so trained and guarded that mutilation of a captive would be most unusual.

The fiend who cut the tongues from the horses of Bert Talbot, the Sodus farmer, is likely to be brought to justice.

The pair of bloodhounds four times Wednesday were put on the scent and four times they made the same circuit indicating the path the human fiend took in leaving the scene of his crime. The suspicion of the officers and the neighbors are gradually centering down upon one individual and the work of the bloodhounds only confirmed the suspicion.

The two bloodhounds, which are named "Roosevelt" and "Fairbanks," were taken to their home Wednesday by C. P. Buckley, son of Deputy Sheriff Buckley, of Battle Creek, owner of the dogs.

Mr. Buckley says that the dogs accomplished the task assigned them and covered the trail in about two hours. They started from Mr. Talbot's place where the two mutilated horses are, and striking the trail at once they covered the entire stretch in just two hours, reaching the home of a well known farmer, living a considerable distance from the scene of the barbarous crime.

The unerring scent of the dogs led them up a highway and across fields by a somewhat circuitous route to this man's place.

Mr. Buckley, Deputy Sheriff Dwan Mr. Talbot, owner of the horses, and others followed the dogs which did not travel very fast.

Arriving at the home of the man where the trail ended the dogs ended their pursuit.

The work of the dogs constitutes the only evidence so far that would place this horrible crime at the door of the man whom the dogs ran down.

So far as the man himself was concerned he manifested a stolid indifference. He expressed neither surprise nor resentment that an atrocious crime had been traced to him. He refused absolutely to discuss the matter.

An arrest was not warranted and the sheriff will investigate the case further before taking any step to bring the offender to justice.

W. T. Robb, of Fair Plain, a relative of Mr. Talbot, has been helping trace up the clues, and he has in his possession the knife with which

The sheriff's force went to Sodus Thursday morning with the purpose of examining the body of the horse of Bert Talbot, which fell dead last summer. It is now thought that the animal was poisoned, and that by the same man who cut out the tongues of the team last Sunday night.
