Concerning the efforts that is being out forth to have a guardian appointed for Harry O. Pierce, who is non compos mentis, the writer is advised that this unfortunate gentleman's wife desires to have the will of the late Mrs. Almira Pierce, mother of H. O. Pierce, contested on the grounds that she was incompetent to make a will at the time the instrument was executed, which was in August, 1905, and that the matter of the guardianship is a preliminary step to the commencement of litigation.

The will provided that after her death, her property, which is said to amount to \$15,000 or \$20,000 was to be divided between one of her sisters in Iowa, and a niece of the testatrix, who resides near Niles, but about a month later, Mrs. Pierce added a codicil to her will, her son, H. O. Pierce, having been adjudged insane in the meantime, whereby she cut off her niece and substituted another sister of hers, who resides in Iowa, and made a provision to the effect that her son was to have the income from her property during his lifetime, and that John C. Dick, of Buchanan, was to act as trustee of the estate, which was to be divided between the two sisters of the testatrix, except that after her death Mrs.

H. O. Pierce was to get five dollars. which, by the way occurred a few weeks ago. It is said to be the intention of the

wife of H. O. Pierce and other interested parties, to have a guardian for Mr. Pierce appointed that he may commence proceedings against the estate to have the will set aside. And if the will were to be set aside, Harry O. Pierce would inherit the whole estate, and upon his demise his wife would inherit all that re-
