The pardon law only allows the members to draw pay for services six months in each year and although the six months has expired the board keeps at work, and is working without compensation, the state only paying the actual expenses of the members.

The man out on parole must be a good citizen. He has been sentenced at from two to fourteen years perhaps. He cannot make application for parole unless he has served the minimum sentence. If he is given a parole it is first necessary for him to find some citizen of standing who will act as his "next friend," and who will look after him and make monthly reports to the warden of the institution from which the prisoner was paroled.

While on parole, a man cannot drink, he cannot visit a saloon, and must not enter disreputable houses. He must be a good citizen, and the fact that there is hanging over him an unfinished sentence is an incentive that keeps 95 per cent of the men on parole on their good behavior and after their term is ended they settle down into good citizens.

The convict who serves out his prison term is given a suit of clothes by the state and enough money to take him to his old home. No employment is provided for him. The world does not offer him a welcome. Under the parole system no man can secure a parole unless his "next

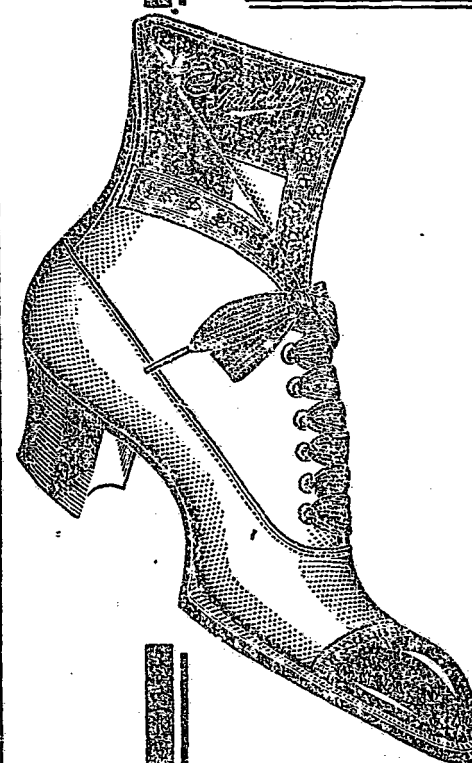

A Rear End Collision

A rear end collision between two freight trains on the Iron Mountain Railroad occurred at the crossing of the Texas & Pacific and Iron Mountain roads, just above the Enterprise Mill Tuesday afternoon at 5:40 o'clock, resulted in the death of Fireman Frank Sabin, of the rear train who was killed and Fireman Otto Horu, of the other one severely injured. From what we can learn of the affair, it happened as follows:

The train in front drawn by engine No 648; in charge of Engineer West, had stopped at the crossing to allow the Texas & Pacific passenger train which is due here at 5:09 to go by and while waiting a freight train drawn by engine No. 645 in charge of Engineer Beckley, which was a short distance behind came along and crashed into it with terrific force, with the result that the locomotive of the rear train and several cars were completely demolished and burnt up and the caboose of the other one wholly wrecked.

Fireman Frank Sabin of the rear train was caught between the engine and tender and literally burned alive before he could be extricated.

The above is a portion of an account of the death of Mr. Frank Sabin, taken from "The Daily Democrat," Alexandria, Louisiana.

The remains accompanied by Mr. S. Irving, of Alexandria, La., arrived in Buchanan, Saturday afternoon at 4:40 over the Pere Marquette and were taken to the home of his parents. The funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at the Presbyterian church, at 1 o'clock by the Rev. Bailey, of Sturgis, Mich.

State Items

To avoid a collision with a passenger train, D. L. Bell, of Menominee, a prominent business man, drove over a 50 foot embankment Thursday and was seriously injured: His carriage was wrecked, but the horses were unhurt.

In order to test the law which provides that no one shall have deer in his possession more than five days after the close of the season, Deputy Game Warden Hoyt has begun proceedings against the Grand Rapids & Indiana railroad. Thirty carcasses of deer were seized while in the road's possession, and some of the officers of the road will probably be arrested in connection with the case. The suit will be a friendly one, however.

Minnie, the 16-year-old daughter of Edwin Teskey, living southeast of Morley, suffered the loss of the index finger and the end of the other fingers of her right hand in a corn shredder, Friday. The girl was watching the shredder while in operation at her father's farm, and in trying to extricate an ear of corn which had become lodged, her fingers were caught by the rolls. Miss Teskey displayed some nerve, when she extricated her hand from the rolls without assistance and without making an outcry. Nobody saw the accident.

Suspended in midair from a telephone cable, at Bay City, Peter Dolaghan, a valley telephone lineman, hung for twenty minutes Friday, until rescued by the fire department. Dolaghan was working on the cable in a carrier and was midway between two poles when the carrier broke. He had one arm thrown over the cable and thus saved himself from falling. His cries for help attracted attention, but delay in telephoning caused a delay of twenty minutes before the fire department truck reached him. When rescued Dolaghan sank to the ground from exhaustion.

Julius Martinek, of Traverse City, aged 16, was on the Cass street bridge over the Boardman river Friday night with some companions. The bridge is just above the dam and the water is very deep. Suddenly the boy climbed to the top of the railing, cried, "Here I go," and jumped. He struck the ground fifteen feet below, just at the water's edge. He was picked up only slightly injured, and declared that he has no recollection of climbing to the rail or why he did it.
